History of the University

Founded by American public education pioneer Horace Mann in 1840, Bridgewater State University has grown from its first home – a single room in the basement of Bridgewater Town Hall – to become the largest of the nine Massachusetts state universities and the third largest of the 29 public college and university campuses in the commonwealth.

Approximately 11,000 full-time and part-time undergraduate and graduate students are enrolled at Bridgewater; the full-time faculty numbers 309, representing a net gain of more than 50 since fall 2002; and more than 90 undergraduate and graduate programs are offered by the university's five colleges (College of Business, College of Education and Allied Studies, College of Humanities and Social Sciences, College of Science and Mathematics and College of Graduate Studies). The 270-acre campus is home to 38 academic, administrative and residential buildings.

Alumni and friends have raised more than \$17 million to support faculty and student research, a myriad of undergraduate and graduate scholarships, international study opportunities and awardwinning publications. These private investments complement growing levels of public support for the institution.

In recent years, the university and the commonwealth have committed nearly \$3 million for classroom upgrades, \$7 million for an extensive library renovation, \$38 million for a new residence hall and a top-to-bottom renovation and expansion of two residence halls. The university is constructing a \$98.7-million science facility.

Vital to the long-term success of the institution is its recognition throughout the state and nation as an educational leader in the use of technology to improve teaching and learning. The first step in that direction took place in 1992, when Bridgewater secured a \$10-million federal grant to build the John Joseph Moakley Center for Technological Applications. For two consecutive years, *Yahoo! Internet Life* magazine named Bridgewater among the "100 Most-Wired Universities and Colleges in America," and the university earned the number six spot on Intel Corporation's "Most Unwired College Campuses Survey."

Together, these developments have combined to strengthen the university's academic mission and expand its public service role. They were built on a series of initiatives that trace back to 1960, a watershed year in the life of the institution when a full-scale transition from an exclusively teacher-training institution to a comprehensive liberal arts university began.

Until that time, Bridgewater had been relatively small – approximately 500 students – but enjoyed a national and international reputation for excellence in teacher preparation. The preparation of the next generation of quality teachers remains a top priority, as evidenced by the institution's 50-plus years of continuous accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

During its time as a normal school, countless faculty and administrators nurtured the school carefully, despite varying degrees of support from the state, and overcame a host of difficult and sometimes dire

situations, including a disastrous fire in 1924 that destroyed several of the few buildings that existed on the campus at that time.

While the institution's earliest years were times of great challenge, the efforts never flagged to continue strengthening the curriculum, and each succeeding generation left Bridgewater State University stronger than the generation that went before. The thriving and dynamic institution we see today is the best evidence of the success of that enduring commitment.

Mission of the University

As the comprehensive public university of Southeastern Massachusetts, Bridgewater State University has a responsibility to educate the residents of Southeastern Massachusetts and the commonwealth, and to use its intellectual, scientific and technological resources to support and advance the economic and cultural life of the region and the state.

While maintaining its historic focus on the preparation of teachers, Bridgewater provides a broad range of baccalaureate degree programs through its College of Humanities and Social Sciences, its College of Science and Mathematics, its College of Education and Allied Studies, and its College of Business. At the graduate level, the university offers the Master of Arts and Master of Science in select disciplines, as well as the Master of Arts in Teaching, the Master of Education, the Master of Public Administration, the Master of Science in Management and the Master of Social Work. In addition, Bridgewater State University prepares current and future educators for post baccalaureate and post master's licensure.

Through the extensive information technology and distance education resources available at Bridgewater State University, including the unique John Joseph Moakley Center for Technological Applications, the university has made technology an integral component of teaching and learning on campus, and seeks to become the regional center for the enhancement of teaching through technology for PreK-12 teachers and university faculty.

The university's growing number of innovative academic programs helps to ensure that Bridgewater State University students are prepared to think critically, communicate effectively and act responsibly within the context of personal and professional ethics. For example, BSU's Academic Achievement Center, and particularly its first-year advising program, is often cited as a model for other institutions to follow. At the same time, the Adrian Tinsley Program for Undergraduate Research represents unparalleled opportunity for students to work closely with faculty mentors and to present research and creative work at regional and national conferences.

Bridgewater State University benefits greatly from Connect, its regional partnership with other public higher education institutions in the region – the University of Massachusetts at Dartmouth, Massasoit Community College, Bristol Community College and Cape Cod Community College. Connect functions as a vehicle for coordinating the academic, administrative and development activities of public higher education in Southeastern Massachusetts, and introduces shared activities and programs among member institutions.



Freshman Admissions Fall 2006 – 2010



Students of Color Admissions Fall 2006 – 2010







Profile of First-Time Freshmen Fall 2010




Distribution of SAT Scores of First-Time Freshmen Fall 2010




Verbal SAT Scores



Average SAT scores at BSU remain comparable to national averages and slightly lower than state averages.




Average Math Scores



Average Verbal Scores


SAT Scores: Comparisons by Gender Fall 2006 – 2010

For 2010, on average, men scored 29 points higher than women on the Math test. The difference is less pronounced for the SAT Verbal test scores.




Average Math SAT Scores





Transfer Admissions Fall 2006 – 2010



Profile of First-Time Full-Time Freshmen BSU Students and National Peers, Fall 2010 Based on Results of the CIRP (American Freshman) Survey

For the past 19 years, Bridgewater State University has participated in the study of new college students sponsored by the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) at UCLA's Higher Education Research Institute (HERI). Begun in 1966, CIRP is a longitudinal study that forms the basis of the *American Freshman* series of books. For the Fall 2010 study, 201,818 first-time full-time students from 279 colleges and universities participated. At Bridgewater State University, 1,438 first-time, full-time freshmen completed the CIRP survey during their freshmen orientation session the summer prior to starting school.

The Fall 2010 results of the CIRP survey are reported on the next several pages. Results are reported for Bridgewater students and their "national peers" -- students attending other public, medium selectivity, fouryear colleges. In Fall 2010 Bridgewater's peer group was comprised of 8,891 students from 25 institutions. Comparisons are made between Bridgewater students and their national peers; when relevant, trends over time and gender differences are also reported.

Background Characteristics of BSU First-time Freshmen and National Peers Fall 2010


Overall, the personal and family characteristics of BSU's first-time freshmen are very similar to those of their peers at other similar institutions nationally. They are similar in age, gender, race, citizenship, native language, type of high school, family income, parents' education, and political orientation. They differ, however, in race, religious affiliation, and distance from home to college. BSU freshmen are more likely than their national peers to be white, to live within 100 miles of the college, and to be Roman Catholic.

High School Grades Reported by BSU First-time Freshmen and National Peers Fall 2010

While the median self-reported high school grade average is the same (B) for both BSU freshmen and their national peers, there are differences at the margins. BSU freshmen are much less likely to report having grades of A- or higher. Twenty-eight percent of students in the national group report an A/A- average compared with only 19% of BSU students.




Percentage Reporting a High School Grade Average of A- or Higher


Academic ability: Men in both groups tend to rate themselves higher on academic ability than their female counterparts.



Percentage of BSU Freshmen Rating Themselves "Above Average" or "Highest 10%" on Academic Ability



Intellectual self-confidence: Men's self-ratings of intellectual self-confidence are higher than women's, both at BSU and nationally, and the national peer group tends to rate itself higher on this trait than do BSU students overall. The difference between BSU students and their same-gender peers was at its greatest in 2004 and has decreased in recent years.

Drive to achieve: This is a trait on which women tend to rate themselves higher than men, both at BSU and nationally. The difference between BSU students' self-perceptions and those of their same-gender peers has decreased over the past decade.

Self-Assessments of BSU First-time Freshmen and National Peers Fall 2010

BSU freshmen give themselves lower ratings than their national peers on most items. The largest differences come in the areas of emotional health and spirituality.




About half (53%) of BSU's first-time freshmen say that BSU is their first-choice college, compared to 59% nationally. When asked why they enrolled at this institution, BSU students are more likely than national peers to say that the cost of attendance at BSU was "very important" factor in their decision, and about one fourth of BSU freshmen said that they chose BSU because they could not afford their first-choice college. Early Action/Early Admission is also a more important factor for BSU students than for their peers nationally. However national rankings, size of the college, and success of graduates in the workforce were more important factors for their national peers.



Highest Degree Aspirations of BSU Freshmen & National Peers, Fall 2010


The graph below shows the percentage of students whose highest degree aspiration is at least a master's degree. Women in both groups are somewhat more likely than men to have higher degree aspirations.





Total Enrollment by Headcount and FTE




Total Enrollment by Status



Undergraduate Enrollment by Headcount and FTE




Graduate Fall Enrollment Fall 2006 – 2010

Graduate Enrollment by Headcount and FTE














Distribution of Undergraduate Credit Loads Fall 2010

Credit Loads of All Undergraduates (Average credit load = 12.9 credits)




Credit Loads of Matriculated Undergraduates (Average credit load = 13.0 credits)




Distribution of Graduate Credit Loads Fall 2010









Gender Distribution of Full-Time Faculty (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) by Rank








Full-Time Faculty (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) with Terminal Degree by Gender, Rank


Percentage of Full-Time Faculty (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) with Terminal Degree, by Rank, Gender, and Overall




Age Distribution of Full-Time Faculty Fall 2010






Classroom-Integrated Bibliographic Instruction 2006/07 – 2010/11








Gate Count Monthly Summary July 2010 – June 2011







Need-Based Aid 2006/07 – 2010/11








Non-Need-Based Aid 2006/07 – 2010/11




Student Loan Volume 2006/07 – 2010/11






Percentage of Students Receiving Aid* 2006/07 – 2010/11

Academic Year - Consecutive fall and spring semesters. For example: AY 10-11 refers to the interval from Fall 2010 to Spring 2011.

Accepted - Admitted by the institution.

Census Date - Date on which official enrollment data are extracted from the student information system. This generally occurs in the fourth week of the semester.

Class - Alumni who graduated in a fiscal year (between July 1 in one year and June 30 in the next year). For example, a student graduating between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011 belongs to the class of '10.

Cohort - All students who entered the institution at the same time; usually designated by matriculation year.

Cumulative GPA - The grade point average calculated on all work completed at BSU.

Enrolled - Registered at time of semester census date.

First-Time Freshmen - Freshmen attending any college for the first time, including those with Advanced Placement credit and those who have earned college credits prior to high school graduation and/or during summer session between high school and college matriculation.

Fiscal Year - Funding year that includes July 1 through June 30. For example: FY 2011 refers to the fiscal year from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011.

Freshman - An enrolled student with fewer than 24 accumulated credit hours.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Enrollment - Full-time equivalent enrollment is based on the following formula: <u>Undergraduate FTE</u>=semester credit hours/15; <u>Graduate FTE</u>=semester credit hours/12.

Full-Time Equivalent Faculty - Each full-time faculty member is counted as one FTE; however, adjustments are made for alternative responsibilities. For part-time faculty, FTE faculty = (total credit hours)/15.

Full-Time Faculty/Staff - Faculty/staff employed 100% time; faculty on annual sabbatical leave not included.

Full-Time Student - <u>Undergraduates:</u> Students registered for 12 or more credit hours at the census date; <u>Graduate Students:</u> Students registered for 9 or more credit hours at the census date.

Graduate Division - Courses numbered 500 and above.

Gross Square Feet (GSF) - The sum of all areas on all floors of a building included within the outside faces of its exterior walls, including floor penetration areas, however insignificant, for circulation and shaft areas that connect one floor to another.

HEIRS – The Higher Education Information Resource System is a data warehouse developed by the Massachusetts Board of Higher Education.

Junior - An enrolled student with 54.0 - 83.5 accumulated credit hours.

Lower Division - Courses numbered 000 to 299.

Matriculated - Enrolled in a degree program.

Monograph - A separate treatise on a single subject or class of subjects or on one person, usually detailed in treatment but not extensive in scope and often containing bibliographies.

Need-Based Financial Aid - Aid in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment awarded to students on the basis of demonstrated financial need.

Net Assignable Square Feet (NASF) - The sum of all areas on all floors of a building assigned to, or available for assignment to, an occupant or specific use.

Non-Matriculated - Not enrolled in a degree program.

Non-Need Based Financial Aid - Aid in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment not based on demonstrated financial need.

Non-Resident - A student paying out-of-state tuition.

Net Square Feet (NSF) - The sum of all areas on all floors of a building assigned to, or available for assignment to, an occupant or specific use, or necessary for the general operation of a building.

Part-Time Student - <u>Undergraduates:</u> Students registered for fewer than 12 credit hours at the census date; <u>Graduate Students:</u> Students registered for fewer than 9 credit hours at the census date.

Residency - Either in-state or out-of-state, determined for tuition purposes.

Resident - A student paying in-state tuition.

Retention Rate - The percentage of students enrolled from fall semester to fall semester.

SAT Score - Scholastic Aptitude Test score.

Senior - An enrolled student with at least 84 accumulated credit hours.

Serial - Any publication issued in successive parts appearing at intervals--usually regular ones--and as a rule intended to be continued indefinitely. The term includes periodicals, newspapers, annuals, numbered monographic series, and the proceedings, transactions, and memoirs of societies.

Sophomore - An enrolled student with 24.0 - 53.5 accumulated credit hours.

Student Credit Hour (SCH) - The sum of credits attempted by students enrolled in a course as of the census date.

Student/Faculty Ratio - The ratio of student FTE to faculty FTE.

Staff - Non-faculty appointments including executive, professional secretarial/clerical positions, technical/paraprofessional positions, skilled crafts, and service maintenance positions.

Student Level - An indication of a student's progress toward a degree: freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, unclassified.

Titles - The number of bibliographic records in the library's on-line catalog.

Transfer Student - A student who earned 12 or more credits at another higher education institution prior to enrolling at BSC.

Unclassified - A non-degree seeking student who cannot be classified into a student level because he or she is not pursuing a degree.

Undeclared - A student who has not specified a major program.

Upper Division - Courses numbered 300-499.

Volumes - The number of item records in the library's on-line catalog. BRIDGEWATER STATE UNIVERSITY • FACTBOOK 2010-11
