History of the University

Founded by American public education pioneer Horace Mann in 1840, Bridgewater State University has grown from its first home – a single room in the basement of Bridgewater Town Hall – to become the largest of the nine Massachusetts state universities and the third largest of the 29 public college and university campuses in the commonwealth.

More than 11,000 full-time and part-time undergraduate and graduate students are enrolled at Bridgewater; the full-time faculty numbers 316, representing a net gain of 64 since fall 2002; and more than 90 undergraduate and graduate programs are offered by the university's five colleges and one school – Ricciardi College of Business, College of Education and Allied Studies, College of Humanities and Social Sciences, College of Science and Mathematics, College of Graduate Studies and the School of Social Work. The 270 acre campus is home to 38 academic, administrative and residential buildings.

Alumni and friends have raised more than \$19 million to support faculty and student research, a myriad of undergraduate and graduate scholarships, international study opportunities and award-winning publications. These private investments complement growing levels of public support for the institution.

In recent years, the university and the commonwealth have committed nearly \$3 million for classroom upgrades, \$7 million for an extensive library renovation, \$38 million for a new residence hall and a top-to-bottom renovation and expansion of two residence halls. The commonwealth's investment of \$98.7 million for Bridgewater State's new Science and Mathematics Center constitutes the single largest capital project ever undertaken by an institution in the state university system.

Vital to the long-term success of the institution is its recognition throughout the state and nation as an educational leader in the use of technology to improve teaching and learning. The first step in that direction took place in 1992, when Bridgewater secured a \$10 million federal grant to build the John Joseph Moakley Center for Technological Applications

Together, these developments have combined to strengthen the university's academic mission and expand its public service role. They were built on a series of initiatives that trace back to 1960, a watershed year in the life of the institution when a full-scale transition from an exclusively teacher-training institution to a comprehensive liberal arts university began.

Until that time, Bridgewater had been relatively small – approximately 500 students – but enjoyed a national and international reputation for excellence in teacher preparation. The preparation of the next generation of quality teachers remains a top priority, as evidenced by the institution's 50-plus years of continuous accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.

During its time as a normal school, countless faculty and administrators nurtured the school carefully, despite varying degrees of support from the state, and overcame a host of difficult and sometimes dire situations, including a disastrous fire in 1924 that destroyed several of the few buildings that existed

on the campus at that time.

While the institution's earliest years were times of great challenge, efforts never flagged to continue strengthening the curriculum, and each succeeding generation left Bridgewater State University stronger than the generation that went before. The thriving and dynamic institution we see today is the best evidence of the success of that enduring commitment.

Mission of the University

As the comprehensive public university of Southeastern Massachusetts, Bridgewater State University has a responsibility to educate the residents of Southeastern Massachusetts and the commonwealth, and to use its intellectual, scientific and technological resources to support and advance the economic and cultural life of the region and the state.

While maintaining its historic focus on the preparation of teachers, Bridgewater State University provides a broad range of baccalaureate degree programs through its Ricciardi College of Business, College of Education and Allied Studies, College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and Bartlett College of Science and Mathematics. At the graduate level, the College of Graduate Studies offers Master of Arts and Master of Science in select disciplines, as well as Master of Arts in Teaching, Master of Business Administration, Master of Science in Accountancy, Master of Education, Master of Public Administration and Master of Social Work. In addition, Bridgewater State University prepares educators for post-baccalaureate and post-master's licensure.

Through the extensive information technology and distance education resources available at BSU, including the John Joseph Moakley Center for Technological Applications, the university has made technology an integral component of teaching and learning on campus, and is a regional center for the enhancement of teaching through technology for PreK-12 teachers and university faculty.

The university's growing number of innovative academic programs helps to ensure that Bridgewater State University students are prepared to think critically, communicate effectively and act responsibly within a context of personal and professional ethics. For example, the Academic Achievement Center, and particularly its first-year advising program, is often cited as a model for other institutions to follow. At the same time, the Adrian Tinsley Program for Undergraduate Research represents an unparalleled opportunity for students to work closely with faculty mentors and to present research and creative work at regional and national conferences.

Bridgewater State University benefits from Connect, its regional partnership with other public higher education institutions in the region – the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, Massachusetts Maritime Academy, Massasoit Community College, Bristol Community College and Cape Cod Community College. Connect coordinates the academic, administrative and development activities of public higher education in Southeastern Massachusetts, and introduces shared activities and programs among member institutions.



Freshman Admissions Fall 2007 – 2011



Since Fall 2007, the number of freshman students of color enrolled has increased by 69 percent.





Profile of First-Time Freshmen (N=1,495) Fall 2011







Distribution of SAT Scores of First-Time Freshmen (N=1,361) Fall 2011



Verbal SAT Scores




SAT Comparison: BSU/MA/US Fall 2007 – 2011

Average Math Scores




Average Verbal Scores




SAT Scores: Comparisons by Gender Fall 2007 – 2011


Average Math SAT Scores

Transfer Admissions Fall 2007 – 2011







Profile of Transfer Students (N=1,044) Fall 2011







Profile of First-Time Full-Time Freshmen BSU Students and National Peers, Fall 2011 Based on Results of the CIRP (American Freshman) Survey (N = 1,368)

For the past 20 years, Bridgewater State University has participated in the study of new college students sponsored by the Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) at UCLA's Higher Education Research Institute (HERI). Begun in 1966, CIRP is a longitudinal study that forms the basis of the *American Freshman* series of books. For the Fall 2011 study, 203,967 first-time full-time students from 270 colleges and universities participated. At Bridgewater State University, 1,368 first-time, full-time freshmen completed the CIRP survey during their freshmen orientation session the summer prior to starting school.

The Fall 2011 results of the CIRP survey are reported on the next several pages. Results are reported for Bridgewater students and their "national peers" -- students attending other public, medium selectivity, four-year colleges. In Fall 2011 Bridgewater's peer group was comprised of 6,742 students from 15 institutions. Comparisons are made between Bridgewater students and their national peers; when relevant, trends over time and gender differences are also reported.

Background Characteristics of BSU First-time Freshmen and National Peers Fall 2011

Overall, the personal and family characteristics of BSU's first-time freshmen are very similar to those of their peers at other similar institutions nationally. They are similar in gender, citizenship, native language, type of high school, family income, parents' education, and political orientation. Overall BSU student's have a slightly higher percentage of students who are 19 or older. BSU freshmen are more likely than their national peers to be white, to live within 100 miles of the college, and to be politically moderate.



Students' Self-Perceptions of Academic Abilities, 2005 - 2011

The following three graphs display trends in the percentage of BSU freshmen and their national peers who rate themselves as "above average" or in the "top 10 percent" in the areas of academic ability, intellectual self-confidence, and drive to achieve.

Academic ability: Men in both groups typically rate themselves higher than women by about 10 percentage points.


Percentage of BSU Freshmen Rating Themselves "Above Average" or "Highest 10%" on Academic Ability

Intellectual self-confidence: Men's self-ratings of intellectual self-confidence are higher than women's, both at BSU and nationally. The national peers have historically rated themselves higher on this trait than BSU students overall, although this year BSU men and their same-gender peers are equal.


Percentage of BSU Freshmen Rating Themselves "Above Average" or "Highest 10%" on Intellectual Self-Confidence

Drive to achieve: This is a trait on which women typically tend to rate themselves higher than men, both at BSU and nationally. This year BSU men increased slightly while BSU women have stayed relatively consistent through the years regarding their drive to achieve.

Self-Assessments of BSU First-time Freshmen and National Peers Fall 2011

BSU freshmen, on average, rate themselves lower than their national peers on many of the following items, with several exceptions. BSU students rate themselves higher on cooperativeness, leadership ability, popularity and understanding of others. The largest difference, this year and historically, comes in the area emotional health.

Percentage Who Rate Themselves "Above Average" or "Highest 10%" on Each Trait



Gender Differences in Self-Assessments of BSU First-time Freshmen, Fall 2011

Nationally men tend to rate themselves higher on most traits than women do. This pattern holds true for BSU students as well. BSU women's self-assessments exceed men's on artistic ability, cooperativeness, creativity, drive to achieve, understanding of others and writing ability. This year there is an increase in the categories where women's self-assessment is higher than their male counterparts. Men's self-assessments most exceed those of women in physical health, popularity, intellectual and social self-confidence.





Self-Ratings on Traits Related to Diversity

Student's are asked to rate themselves on a series of characteristics that relate to diversity. On each item BSU students' self-ratings varied slightly to their national peers, but overall on average to all questions BSU students rated themselves similarly compared to their national peers.

Political and Social Opinions of BSU First-time Freshmen & National Peers Fall 2011

BSU students are similar to their national peers in their political and social opinions, except in the areas of same-sex marriage, federal military spending, and undocumented immigrants being denied access to education. BSU students had a higher percentage response rate to these items. However they had a lower response rate on students from disadvantaged social backgrounds to be given preferential treatment in college admissions compared to their national peers. This difference in response rates on same-sex marriage is likely attributable to the fact those BSU students live in a state where same-sex marriage is legal, and most of their national peers do not.



BSU women are more likely to have some concern compared to their same-gender peers nationally.

BSU freshmen rely on many of the same sources used by their national peers to finance their education. However, BSU freshmen continue to be more likely than national peers to report reliance on income generated from summer work or work-study jobs, parental or family aid, grants and scholarships, and loans.

Expected College Activities of BSU First-time Freshmen & National Peers Fall 2011

BSU freshmen are similar to their national peers in their educational plans and academic and interpersonal expectations. BSU freshman are more likely than national peers, however, to work on a professor's research project, to participate in Study Abroad, to expect to work to help pay college expenses, and to expect to participate in student clubs and play club, intramural, or recreational sports. BSU freshmen are less likely to expect to have a roommate of a different race or ethnicity.



Highest Degree Aspirations of BSU Freshmen & National Peers, Fall 2011


The graph below shows the percentage of students whose highest degree aspiration is at least a master's degree. Women in both groups are somewhat more likely than men to have higher degree aspirations, whereas BSU women are 9 percentage points above their same-gender national peers on aspirations for at least a master's degree. As a group BSU freshmen rated 7 percentage points higher than their national peers on the same guestion.

Future Education Majors and Teachers, Fall 2011

BSU women are 16 percent more likely than BSU men and 12 percent more likely than their same-gender national peers to expect to major in education or to pursue a career in teaching. Since Massachusetts professional teaching certification requires a Master's degree, this may help to explain why BSU women are also more likely to aspire to graduate school, as shown above.



Life Objectives of BSU First-Time Freshmen & National Peers Fall 2011

The top five life objectives of BSU freshmen are identical to those of their national peers, though they appear in a different order. These have been the top five objectives every year for the past 20 years. This year "being very well off financially" remains the top spot among BSU freshmen and the same holds true for their national peers.





Total Fall Enrollment Fall 2007 – 2011

Total enrollment and FTE increased from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011 by 1 percent and 2 percent respectively. From Fall 2007 to Fall 2011, total enrollment increased by 14 percent and FTE increased by 17 percent. The number of full-time students increased by 1 percent from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011, and the number of part-time students enrolled decreased by 1 percent. In Fall 2011, 74 percent of BSU students enrolled full-time.




Total Enrollment by Headcount and FTE Total Enrollment by Status




Undergraduate Fall Enrollment Fall 2007 – 2011

Overall undergraduate enrollment increased by 2 percent from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011. From Fall 2007 to Fall 2011 undergraduate enrollment increased by 17 percent and FTE increased by 18 percent. Full-time undergraduate enrollment from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011 also increased 2 percent and part-time undergraduate enrollment increased by 6 percent. In Fall 2011, 83 percent of BSU undergraduates were enrolled full-time.

Undergraduate Enrollment by Headcount and FTE




Undergraduate Enrollment by Status




Graduate Fall Enrollment Fall 2007 – 2011

Graduate student enrollment decreased by 7 percent from Fall 2010 to Fall 2011 and FTE decreased by 7 percent. From Fall 2007 to Fall 2011, enrollment decreased by 2 percent while FTE increased by 9 percent. The number of part-time graduate students decreased by 8 percent the number of full-time graduate students decreased by 3 percent. As of Fall 2011, 73 percent of Bridgewater's graduate students study part-time.

Graduate Enrollment by Status










Distribution of Undergraduate Credit Loads Fall 2011

Credit Loads of All Undergraduates (Average credit load = 12.9 credits)




Credit Loads of Matriculated Undergraduates (Average credit load = 13.0 credits)




Distribution of Graduate Credit Loads Fall 2011

Profile of Degree Recipients by Program Level 2011

The overwhelming majority of BSU graduates are Massachusetts residents; only 7 percent of degree recipients are from out of state. Approximately 29 percent of baccalaureate degree recipients are at least 25 years of age or older; 10 percent are 30 or older. The majority of degree recipients at both the baccalaureate and graduate levels are female; at the graduate level 77 percent are women.







Full-Time Faculty by Tenure Status and Gender



Gender Distribution of Full-Time Faculty (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) by Rank



Percentage of Full-Time Faculty of Color (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) by Gender, Rank, and Overall



Percentage of Full-Time Faculty (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) with Terminal Degree, by Rank, Gender, and Overall




Age Distribution of Full-Time Faculty Fall 2011

Percentage of Full-Time Faculty (Tenured or on Tenure-Track) By Age




Full-Time Faculty by Years at BSU Fall 2011


Maxwell Library Collection Statistics Print, Audiovisual, Micro format, and Electronic Books

Maxwell Library has witnessed a slow decline in the total number of items checked out of its collections. This is a trend occurring in nearly every academic library across the Commonwealth. Offsetting these statistics is the ongoing and increasing use by students and faculty alike of the library's electronic resources. The library's wide array of electronic content—from e-journals and e-books to digital learning objects and streamed audiovisual content--is readily available and convenient to use. Discovering resources and satisfying information needs are underscored by the more than 1.5 million hits to the library's web site and the more than 200,000 PDF downloads from the library's e-resources.

Virtual Common Statistics

In February 2012, the library unveiled the new digital institutional repository: The Virtual Commons. We have conceived of the Virtual Commons as the University's "open-access repository for the scholarly works, research, publications, creative activity, and reports produced by the faculty, students, and staff of Bridgewater State University and its collaborative partners. Coordinated by the Maxwell Library, the Commons promotes the discovery, dissemination and preservation of this intellectual capital." The repository includes thousands of pages of scanned documents and images. All can be discovered through the index structure or a search box. Because this is an open access repository, all other repositories built on the same platform can be searched at one time. Over time, more digital objects will be added, from learning objects to manuscripts—all celebrating the history of the institution and the accomplishments of its community of learners and teachers.



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
Classroom-Integrated Bibliographic Instruction 2007/08 – 2011/12







Gate Count Monthly Summary July 2011 – June 2012





The first section of the statistical analysis is a five (5) year comparison of the number of Borrowing, Lending, and MaxEpress transactions.


Borrowing Transactions


Lending Transactions Items Requested by Other Institutions




Percent of MaxExpress Transactions filled







Need-Based Aid 2007/08 - 2011/12





Need-Based Aid on a Percentage Basis




Non-Need-Based Aid 2007/08 – 2011/12




Student Loan Volume 2007/08 – 2011/12






Percentage of Students Receiving Aid* 2007/08 – 2011/12

Glossary of Terms

Academic Year - Consecutive fall and spring semesters. For example: AY 11-12 refers to the interval from Fall 2011 to Spring 2012.

Accepted - Admitted by the institution.

Census Date - Date on which official enrollment data are extracted from the student information system. This generally occurs in the fourth week of the semester.

Class - Alumni who graduated in a fiscal year (between July 1 in one year and June 30 in the next year). For example, a student graduating between July 1, 2011 and June 30, 2012 belongs to the class of '12.

Cohort - All students who entered the institution at the same time; usually designated by matriculation year.

Cumulative GPA - The grade point average calculated on all work completed at BSU.

Enrolled - Registered at time of semester census date.

First-Time Freshmen - Freshmen attending any college for the first time, including those with Advanced Placement credit and those who have earned college credits prior to high school graduation and/or during summer session between high school and college matriculation.

First Generation Student - A student for whom the highest educational level of both parents/guardians is less than a four-year degree.

Fiscal Year - Funding year that includes July 1 through June 30. For example: FY 2012 refers to the fiscal year from July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012.

Freshman - An enrolled student with fewer than 24 accumulated credit hours.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Enrollment - Full-time equivalent enrollment is based on the following formula: <u>Undergraduate FTE</u>=semester credit hours/15; <u>Graduate FTE</u>=semester credit hours/12.

Full-Time Equivalent Faculty - Each full-time faculty member is counted as one FTE; however, adjustments are made for alternative responsibilities. For part-time faculty, FTE faculty = (total credit hours)/15.

Full-Time Faculty/Staff - Faculty/staff employed 100% time; faculty on annual sabbatical leave not included.

Full-Time Student - <u>Undergraduates:</u> Students registered for 12 or more credit hours at the census date; <u>Graduate Students:</u> Students registered for 9 or more credit hours at the census date.

Graduate Division - Courses numbered 500 and above.

Gross Square Feet (GSF) - The sum of all areas on all floors of a building included within the outside faces of its exterior walls, including floor penetration areas, however insignificant, for circulation and shaft areas that connect one floor to another.

Junior - An enrolled student with 54.0 - 83.5 accumulated credit hours.

Low Income Student – A student who is eligible for federal Pell grants.

Lower Division - Courses numbered 000 to 299.

Matriculated - Enrolled in a degree program.

Monograph - A separate treatise on a single subject or class of subjects or on one person, usually detailed in treatment but not extensive in scope and often containing bibliographies.

Need-Based Financial Aid - Aid in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment awarded to students on the basis of demonstrated financial need.

Net Assignable Square Feet (NASF) - The sum of all areas on all floors of a building assigned to, or available for assignment to, an occupant or specific use.

Non-Matriculated - Not enrolled in a degree program.

Non-Need Based Financial Aid - Aid in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, and student employment not based on demonstrated financial need.

Non-Resident - A student paying out-of-state tuition.

Net Square Feet (NSF) - The sum of all areas on all floors of a building assigned to, or available for assignment to, an occupant or specific use, or necessary for the general operation of a building.

Part-Time Student - <u>Undergraduates</u>: Students registered for fewer than 12 credit hours at the census date; <u>Graduate Students</u>: Students registered for fewer than 9 credit hours at the census date.

Residency - Either in-state or out-of-state, determined for tuition purposes.

Resident - A student paying in-state tuition.

Retention Rate - The percentage of students enrolled from fall semester to fall semester.

SAT Score - Scholastic Aptitude Test score.

Senior - An enrolled student with at least 84 accumulated credit hours.

Serial - Any publication issued in successive parts appearing at intervals--usually regular ones--and as a rule intended to be continued indefinitely. The term includes periodicals, newspapers, annuals, numbered monographic series, and the proceedings, transactions, and memoirs of societies.

Sophomore - An enrolled student with 24.0 - 53.5 accumulated credit hours.

Staff - Non-faculty appointments including executive, professional secretarial/clerical positions, technical/paraprofessional positions, skilled crafts, and service maintenance positions.

Student/Faculty Ratio - The ratio of student FTE to faculty FTE.

Student Credit Hour (SCH) - The sum of credits attempted by students enrolled in a course as of the census date.

Student Level - An indication of a student's progress toward a degree: freshman, sophomore, junior, senior, unclassified.

Student of Color – A student who identifies himself/herself as Hispanic or Latino, American Indian or Alaska Native, Black or African American, Asian, Cape Verdean, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, or two or more races. Excluded are international students of color.

Titles - The number of bibliographic records in the library's on-line catalog.

Transfer Student - A student who earned 12 or more credits at another higher education institution prior to enrolling at BSU.

Unclassified - A non-degree seeking student who cannot be classified into a student level because he or she is not pursuing a degree.

Undeclared - A student who has not specified a major program.

Upper Division - Courses numbered 300-499.

Volumes - The number of item records in the library's on-line catalog.



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
