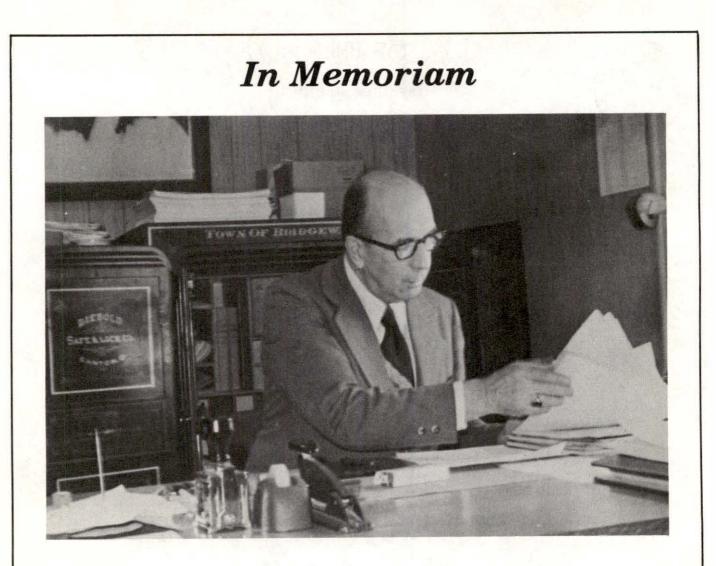

Selectmen

To the Citizens of Bridgewater:

The following Town Report is hereby submitted to the citizens of Bridgewater for the year 1980. It is the pleasure of this Board of Selectmen to present a brief synopsis of the activities in 1980. Due to Proposition 2¹/₂ all municipal spending must be reduced including Town Reports which will be much shorter than other years.

The Board of Selectmen held regular posted meetings every Monday evening at 7:30 p.m., in the Selectmen's office, as well as many other meetings, public hearings, and conferences as required during the year.

The following portion of this report will give the citizens some knowledge of the activities carried out by our Board this past year. Fire Department. The Town replaced the 1948 Mack Forest Fire truck with a modern and well needed Forest Fire truck valued at \$23,620.00. In addition, the long awaited reality of a 100 foot ladder Maxim Fire truck was granted to our Town through State funding for the purpose of serving the State College and dormitories including service to our Town. Many thanks must go to our former State Representative Peter Y. Flynn and our Fire Chief Clarence A. Levy.

Housing. We worked very closely with the Housing Authority and its Executive Secretary, Mrs. Ellen Arabasz. The Board has approved housing applications for many families under Federal guidelines of Section 8 and Chapter 705 who needed housing assistance.

Energy Conservation Grant. An application for a \$61,576.00 Federal grant was prepared and submitted by Selectman David A. Canepa, the Town's Federal Grant Coordinator. \$31,550.00 would be expended on the Academy Building and \$29,824.00 on the Town Hall. The plans call for the installation of weatherstripping and insulation material, and storm windows at the town buildings. The first round went to the City of Brockton but the grant will be submitted for the second round for consideration. Due to the inflationary cost of fuel oil these energy improvements are vitally important to reduce the outrageous cost of fuel and light bills.

New Construction. The center of Town had a very rewarding face lift this past year with Cumberland Farms acquiring the old Bassett Garage property across the Bridgewater Savings Bank. Over \$150,000.00 was spent to purchase, tear down, and rebuild a new professional business complex. In addition to giving the Town a beautiful look, additional tax revenue is also being generated.

Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$. Fiscal belt tightening became a reality this past year with the overwhelming vote of Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ at the November election. As the leaders of our Town we have the heavy and sometimes unpopular responsibility to put this referendum vote in action. There will be considerable cuts that will have to be made to reduce our fiscal 1982 budget spending down to \$5,722,000.00, which is over \$1,400,000.00 less in local revenue than this past year. It is the Board's position to minimize this reduction the best way we can, trying to retain our valuable and professional services to the best our ability.

Public Commuter Parking. After much deliberation and many meetings our Town received approval of a State funding project amounting to \$51,000.00 for the renovation and reconstruction of a public parking facility to be located on the abandoned Pleasant Street near the State Department of Public Works facility across from Lake Nip. State grant co-ordinator, Selectman David A. Canepa, is overseeing this project and working towards the completion for calendar year 1981. Other Areas. Committee appointments and reports have continuously been submitted this past year. A Computer Needs Study Committee was appointed and Selectman John R. Hickey serves as liaison from our Board with its report to be submitted in the future.

A final Audit Report was submitted to the Board and necessary changes and recommendations are being considered pertaining to the practices and procedures concerning the Accounting, Water & Sewer, and Treasurer Departments.

A Town Engineer's Study Committee was appointed with Selectman Donald C. Buron as liaison for our Board, and after several meetings the committee submitted a final report recommending that the Town Engineer's position be reduced to a possible part-time position.

According to State Statute Towns have to perambulate boundaries every five years with contiguous towns that surround them. Bridgewater has five towns that we have perambulated boundaries with.

Several meetings were held with the College Community officials and students to bring a better understanding and relationship between our Town and the College. The College Internship Program has had continuing success with student aides David Woods and Gerard Dumas, two college seniors majoring in Political Science who were assigned to the Selectmen's office.

The Board wishes to thank all Commissions, Boards, Committees, Departments, town employees, and all the citizens of the Town who have unselfishly given of their time and effort during this past year. Special thanks to our secretarial staff, Chief Clerk Frances K. Ticchi and Clerk-Stenographer Joan C. Leombruno, for their professionalism and efficiency in which they handle all of the daily and important matters including the everyday communication with our citizens.

In closing we wish to state as we have stated in the past, "That this Board shall work together to carry out the responsibilities which we were elected to do, and to this end we have tried to do our very best."

Section 1. Use of Water. No person shall, without permission of the Commissioners of the Water Department of the Town of Bridgewater, make an opening in or connection with, or turn off or draw off water from, a water pipe, standpipe, well or reservoir owned by the Town, or accept in accordance with a written permit from the Commissioners in case of fire in the neighborhood, allowing water to be taken from the premises, or use the water from any purpose other than that for which he pays; or unscrew or open a hydrant attached to the water pipes of the Town; or, excepted in accordance with the regulations of the Commissioners discharge water through a hand held hose; nor shall any person interfere with the registering apparatus of water meter put in by the Town or damage or injure such meter. Violations hereof upon conviction may be punished by a fine not exceeding two hundred (\$200.00) dollars.

Section 2. Water Systems, Malicious Interference With. If any person or persons shall wantonly, maliciously, intentionally or negligently divert the water, or any part thereof, of any of the water sources, used by the Town of Bridgewater for water supply purposes, or shall corrupt the same or render it impure, or destroy or injure any dam, aqueduct, well, standpipe, pipe, conduit, hydrant, machinery or other property. held, owned or used by the said Town, every such person or persons, shall forfeit and pay to the said Town, three times the amount of the damages that shall be assessed therefore, to be recovered by any proper action. And every such person may, on complaint and conviction of either of the wanton and malicious, negligent or intentional acts aforesaid, be punished by a fine, not exceeding two hundred (\$200.00) dollars.

Amendment: On a motion by John Noonan and duly seconded. Any other Town department is excluded from Section 1 and 2 in the ordinary course of their duties upon a phone call notice to the Water Department Officers.

In addition the Police Department received the following donations for special projects and implemented the following programs.

1. Bridgewater Business men donated \$1,300.00 for a photography darkroom and related equipment.

2. Bridgewater Business men donated \$600.00 for materials to build a workout room in the basement of the police station with the police officers donating much of the equipment.

3. The workout room was built by students from the Bristol-Plymouth Regional Vocational School who also reventilated the police firing range at no cost for labor.

4. Completely remodeled the communications room adding the new Emergency (911) phone system utilizing CETA help for construction.

5. Established a model Crime Prevention program and a very successful safety education program.

6. Instituted Oral Board Interviews similar to those used by the Mass. State Police for all new Police Applicants in an effort to select the very best personnel.

7. Regained our authorized complement of Police Officers after having lost nine men through retirements, promotions and terminations.

8. Regained our authorized complement of Sergeants in addition to filling the newly created Lieutenants position.

9. Instituted Team Policing on all shifts and a form directed patrol for Traffic Enforcement.

10. Implemented a Special Weapons Team which was invited to the F.B.I. Academy at Quantico, Virginia for training.

11. Implemented a Photography Unit, a Rape investigation unit and trained Officers in the following specialized fields. Crime Scene Search, Arson Investigation, Auto Theft, Hostage Negotiations, Hazardous Materials, Investigative Hypnosis, Breathalizer Operation and more than 150 other police schools dealing with just about every phase of Law Enforcement. In addition, all staff personnel, Sergeants, Lieutenant and Chief successfully completed the Command Training School at Babson College in Wellesley, Mass. dealing with management and leadership in Law Enforcement.

Out of a complement of 26 full time personnel, three officers have at least one year of college and thirteen others have two or more years of college in a law enforcement field.

I do not want to lure you into a false sense of security due to the reduction in crime during the past couple of years. However these results were brought about through the efforts of a small group of dedicated policemen who maintained an aggressive patrol and followed through on investigations.

The crime rate goes up much easier than it comes down and any change in the work force can drastically effect this.

In comparison to other college communities of similar size and geographical make-up our department is under manned.

Last year the taxpayers at our annual town meeting voted to add another policeman to the department; however due to proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ I will not be able to fill the vacancy as this money will be needed to offset part of my budget reduction due to proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$.

I do hope you the taxpayers and final decision makers at the annual town meeting will support your police department as you so often have done in the past.

In closing I would like to thank all of the members of the Police Department and those who are not; but contributed towards another fine year for the Police Department and its Town.

Fire Department

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I herewith submit the annual report of the Bridgewater Fire Department for the year ending December 31, 1980.

PERSONNEL

The permanent personnel of the Department consists of the Fire Chief, Deputy Chief, Two Captains, Three Lieutenants, Nine Firefighters, Thirteen E.M.T. Firefighters, Call Firefighters and the Chief is also the Forest Warden for the Town.

APPARATUS

Consists of Engine #1, a 1972 Maxim 1,000 G.P.M. Pumper, Engine #2, a 1967 Maxim 1,000 G.P.M. Pumper, Engine #3, a 1979 Maxim 1,000 G.P.M. Pumper, Ladder #1, a 1979 Maxim 100 ft., Aerial Ladder, Rescue #1, a 1963 Metro, a 1962 Boat with an outboard motor (for water rescue), the Chief's car, a 1977 Ford, Forest Fire #1, a 1965 Dodge (with 4 wheel drive), Forest Fire #2, a 1980 Ford (with 4 wheel drive), and a 1976 Chevrolet (Horton) ambulance.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

The fire alarm system is a Gamswell closed circuit that has at present 79 fire alarm boxes, 27 of which are connected to the internal circuits of certain buildings. The central station panel is a 10 circuit unit with 7 circuits now in use. The system has a battery back-up system plus the emergency stand-by generator. About 90% of the fire alarm wiring is overhead on the Telephone Company's poles, the remaining 10% is underground. This past year on Circuit #5, we replaced approximately one mile of the old iron fire alarm wire with new wire. I hope to be able to continue replacing about one mile of wire each year until all of the old iron wire (now more than 50 years old) has been replaced. All boxes were tested, lubricated and necessary repairs were made. All circuits were patrolled regularly and corrections were made. The system was kept clear from all grounds.

RECORD OF ALARMS

The Department responded to 929 calls for the ambulance, 877 calls for fires and 117 service calls for a combined total of 1,923 runs for the calendar year 1980. A more detailed breakdown is as follows:

INSPECTIONS

Inspections as required by State Law were made of schools, public buildings, the Massachusetts Correctional Institution, nursing homes, college and other specified establishments. Fire drills were held and observed at all schools.

There were 301 wood burning stove inspections and permits issued. All new homes prior to occupancy were inspected for fire alarms and oil burner installations as required by law. Many other inspections were made in conjunction with Mr. Walter Zaverucha, the Town Building Inspector, Mr. Charles Herbert, the Town Engineer, and Ms. Nancy Oliveira, the Board of Health Agent. Their cooperation and that of their respective departments is herewith acknowledged.

FIRE PREVENTION

Fire prevention programs were held at the local schools and at the Public Library, along with the film "Learn Not to Burn" and Smokey the Bear as added attraction in presenting the program again this year.

All complaints of violations of fire prevention rules and regulations were investigated.

During the year the officers and men have attended fire related and E.M.S. seminars. They have also attended schools offered by the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy. Five men have been enrolled in the Fire Science Program at the college level. All firefighters are first responders and have been recertified in C.P.R. as mandated by State Law. The E.M.T.'s are continually working toward their recertification as required by law.

Donald Buck and James Wood attended many hours of school to become E.M.T.s (Emergency Medical Technicians). They passed the National Registry exams on May 31, 1980, and were certified as E.M.T.s.

BUDGET REQUESTS

I have again recommended and requested funds in the fiscal year budget for 1981-1982 to have the fire alarm extended from Box 48 at Winthrop Avenue to the Scotland Store area. In light of the anticipated growth of the Scotland area which includes the Industrial Park, the new Route 495 and the housing developments, I feel that the alarm system would be a vital safety factor. I have also requested funds to replace the 1976 ambulance. Funds are also being requested for pages for the men.

SPECIAL NOTES

On Oct. 31, 1980, the new Forest Fire truck was delivered. This is a Ford 4 wheel drive built by the Continentel Fire Apparatus Co. in Hopkinton, Mass.

During the year of 1980, I collected and turned over to the Town Treasurer the sum of nine thousand eight hundred and seventy dollars (\$9,870.00). This money was collected for some of the false alarms that we responded to during the year.

In conclusion, I wish to thank your Board, the various Town Departments, the townspeople and the officers and men of the Fire Department for their loyal support during the past year.

FACILITIES FOR THE PEOPLE

Highway Department

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens:

The Highway Department is pleased to submit its annual report for the year ending December 31, 1980.

Our goal throughout the year has been to fulfill the needs of the citizens of Bridgewater. The numerous calls received by my office to assist the taxpayers were attended to as quickly as possible, however, I would like to add that without the cooperation afforded by my men to myself and to the general public, this could not have been accomplished. At this time I wish to acknowledge and express my thanks to my men for their untiring efforts throughout the year.

The workload for the year was as follows:

DRAINAGE: Complete or partial systems were installed on the following roads:

Forest Street—Phase I of a drainage project has been completed on the following road—(from Forest Street cutoff to Vernon Street) where 13 catch basins and 11 manholes were installed with approximately 1200' of various drain pipe.

Vernon Street-(from Beach Street to Crosby's)-Phase II was completed this Spring and Summerr where three additional manholes, eight catch basins, and two headers were installed with approximately 930' of 12" pipe laid out. Drainage and Cross Trenches in these areas were filled with Bituminous Concrete in preparation for resurfacing next year. In the vicinity of 411 Laurel Street two catch basins were installed with approximately 100' of 12" pipe thus alleviating a water problem that had been predominant in this local. At 54 Flagg Street a sluiceway was prepared by the men. At Summer and Laurel Street (by the railroad tracks) one manhole was installed with approximately 20' of 12" pipe. On High Street two catch basins were installed with approximately 60' of 12" pipe. Throughout the year our drainage systems are kept in proper working order with the continual cleaning by men and machines.

ROAD RESURFACING: After weeks of preparation, and utilizing a new process of crack filling, the following roads were then resurfaced with Type I surface material:

Marianne Drive, Green Street, Vernon Street, Fruit Street, Carver Drive, Atkinson Drive, Forest Street, Plymouth Street (Chapter 90), Crapo Street, Darlene Drive, Laurel Drive (Water to Auburn Street), Water Street (Flynn's Pond to Laurel Street).

Many tons of mix were used to lay berms along many of the Town roads, and the newly resurfaced areas.

Also, the Infrared Heater Method was utilized in the following areas:

East Street, Vernon Street, Main Street, Spring Street, Spruce Street (1 driveway), Plymouth Street, Park Avenue Area.

ROAD SEALING PROCESS: A number of roads had to be sealed. Whenever we are unable to use Type I Mix, we supplement with this process, which helps hold the existing road surface together, until such time as monies are allocated for Bituminous Concrete. Having sprayed the road edges and gutters with herbicides the following streets were then patched, oiled, sanded, and rolled:

Depot Street, Water Street, Auburn St. Bridge, Cherry Street, Oak Street, Conant Street, Winter Street, Forest Street, Green Place, Cross Street, Hayward Place, Alden Square, Sylvan Terrace, Plymouth Street Extension.

ROADSIDE MAINTENANCE: A finish top of Bituminous Concrete was laid on the following sidewalks:

Burrill Avenue, Fiske Drive, Douglas Drive, Arrowhead Drive, Marianne Drive, Broad Street (from K. of C. Hall to railroad tracks) & Main Street (from Hemlock Drive to the Square). The sidewalk on School Street was repaired and a cement finish was applied.

Other maintenance work that was done by the Highway Department included the following: laying of curbing at the curve at Plymouth and Mill Street (Chapter 90); mowing; fertilizing; liming of the Towns seven abandoned cemeteries, and Alden Square; trash pickup from the roadsides and Common area; weekly sweeping of the Common Area and other Town Roads; mowing the sides of the road, loaming and seeding road shoulders. Also, during the month of November the men and machines of the department cleaned the sidewalks and gutters of leaves and picked up all bagged leaves throughout the precincts on a rotating system.

SIGNS: The Vacuum Applicator (sign machine) which was acquired through the Governor's Highway Safety Program, has proven itself to be invaluable to the Highway Department. To date we have made up approximately 250 street and regulatory signs. However, this continuous replacement of signs, because of excessive vandalism, and traffic accidents, have become acutely expensive to this department due to the spiraling cost of material.

SNOW AND ICE: Despite having had an extremely mild winter during the first three months in 1980, the Highway Department had sanded the roads 22 times. This would be approximately 4,384 tons of sand with a 20% salt mixture. Plows were called out only three times during the same three months. The last months had little or no accumulative amounts of snow, however, because of rainfall, coupled with freezing temperatures at night, our sanding crews were out much more often. PLANNED SUBDIVISIONS: Many inspections were conducted by Town Engineer, Charles Herbert, and myself due to uncompleted items in the subdivisions. Minimal work still has to be completed before acceptance of these roads can become finalized. The Planning Board is withholding funds to cover completion work. I have attended many meetings of the Planning Board and have made myself readily available to assist the Board whenever needed, with suggestions and recommendations in reference to subdivisions.

I have worked in conjunction with Town Engineer on various easements and drainage problems throughout the Town. I have attended many meetings with State and County officials on programs for the benefit of the Town of Bridgewater.

MECHANIC: Our mechanic has worked diligently throughout the year overhauling and doing preventative maintenance on our trucks and equipment, thereby keeping them in excellent operable condition. He has proven himself to be a great asset to the Highway Department.

CONCLUSION: In conclusion I express my profound appreciation for the support afforded me by the Board of Selectmen, Boards, Commissions, Department Heads, all Town Departments and Town Employees for their cooperation and assistance during the year 1980.

Lastly, in reference to Proposition 2½ it will be very difficult to continue all the services and requests which we have been able to fulfill in the past, but we will do our utmost to give the services that the citizens are accustomed to with the greatest emphasis for the welfare and safety of the public.

Water Department

The year 1980 was unusually busy for the Water Department. Service crews worked diligently to repair the many leaks which developed. There were several major line breaks during 1980 where department personnel worked around the clock to repair damages. The water ban was finally lifted in July upon completion of the Nitrate Removal Plant at High Street. The removal process has allowed the Town to return to service its largest producing well which was closed several years ago due to the concentration of Nitrates.

Although our water supplies have remained adequate, the Water Department in conjunction with its consulting engineers is continuously searching for new sources of supply for the future. Currently the search has brought us to Lake Nippenicket, more commonly called the "Nip." The well drilling company has located a new well field in the "Nip" area. Tests are now being conducted to determine the quality of the water. In response to the lifting of the ban, there have been numerous requests for new domestic service installations and renewals. The lifting ban also allowed the Water Department to initiate a flushing program to try to alleviate "rusty" water conditions in several areas of Town. The Department has been unable to flush for many, many years due to inadequate water supplied. With the ever increasing demands on the need for water, and with the high cost of maintenance and development of new well fields, the Board of Water Commissioners would like to stress the need for water conservation in the Town of Bridgewater. Our proposal for new water rates reflects this belief.

At this time, the Board of Water Commissioners would like to thank its employees and the many Town Departments and Boards for their cooperation and help during the year.

Town Engineer

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the year of 1980, although actual housing starts declined due to high interest rates, and additions and alterations increased, there was a very steady and health activity in the subdivisions through the Town.

Aside from the predictable number of gravel removal renewal requests, involving investigations and reports to the Board of Selectmen by both the Town Engineer and the Building Inspector, there was considerable activity in several other categories that necessitated investigatory procedures, plans, and written reports. We are continuing to pursue the status of our previous applications to the State DPW on the renewal and reconstruction of certain Town bridges under the State Federal Bridge Replacement Program.

Other special projects for the Selectmen included an energy audit of town-owned buildings; Jon Ridder property on Cross Street for the developing a pond for fishing, skating, etc.; study of land off Roberts Road; Chaffe Farm; Scotland Industrial Park; Traffic and Parking Commission regarding Central Square; and meetings with Old Colony Planning Council pertaining to Flood Plain Districts.

Meetings were held with Planning Board, Board of Health, Highway Department and Building Inspector involving subdivision plans, septic systems, Cannons, drainage easements.

It has been a pleasure serving as Town Engineer with all Town boards and personnel.

Sewer Department

This past year, 1980, has been one of numerous breakdowns and problems due to usage and to age of equipment. There was a breakdown with the mixing motor for the vacuum filter, which made the filter inoperable for three months, due to waiting period for the parts. With a breakdown of the Moyno-pump, the Stator support had to be replaced. Numerous problems arose with a 30 year old Carter piston pump. These problems have caused a sludge overload at the treatment plant that will be carried over into 1981.

The department also was required to replace comminutor screens, which work as shredders for incoming raw sewage. Painting and maitenance of the plant structure were also completed, but, due to the age, an overhaul of some of this equipment is in the foreseeable future. All tests required by Environmental Protection Agency and Water Pollution Control were performed, as were the daily chores and operation that are required to operate the plant.

This year more sludge is being died per day than in the past years. It is believed that this is due to an increase in solids coming into the plant, although the incoming flow has not increased considerably. This increase has meant operating the vacuum filter for longer periods of time. One improvement at the plant has been an addition of a chlorine alarm system. When completely installed, this system will notify the department if a chlorine leak occurs. This proves to be a precautionary safety feature for the plant. In addition to these duties at the plant, some of the plant personnel have assisted the Water Department in water line breaks, sewer plugups, water service leaks, etc.

In spite of the numberous mechanical problems and operating problems this past year, we were still able to maintain the plant in acceptable working order to meet the discharge permit requirements, as stated by the Environmental Protection Agency and the Water Pollution Control.

Plumbing & Gas Inspector

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

During the 1980, 153 Plumbing Permits and 122 Gas Permits were issued. While the number of plumbing permits showed a slight decrease over 1979 figures, the number of gas permits increased more than 50%. All applications were filed in the Building Inspector's Office by licensed plumbers and licensed gas fitters and are inspected by the Plumbing & Gas Inspector to insure that all work conforms with the Massachusetts Code for Installation.

Report of the Library Director

1980 marks the beginning of a decade of scarcity of resources. This period will be a challenge for every institution. Management must be creative and innovative to operate efficiently. The public library, as a center for the sharing of information and materials, is becoming even more valuable to the community. As demands for library must look ahead to greater cooperation with other libraries and institutions to meet the informational needs of this community. (A complete edition of this report is available at the library).

PROGRAMS. In continuing the effort to not only be a center of information, but a place for recreation, the library sponsored many programs of significance during the year. Of special interest in the spring was an exhibition of photographs, clippings and other memorabilia honoring the late baseball star Gordon "Mickey" Cochrane. His life in Bridgewater and his baseball career were recalled in a program "Memories for Mickey Cochrane" presented by Harold Goodnough, noted baseball promoter and former Bridgewater resident. The third in our successful series of ethnic programs was also held in the spring. This year, the Italian-American community was honored. Selectmen David Canepa and Chief of Police Willian Ferioli reminisced about the Italian Community of Bridgewater: and the OSIA dancers performed the Tarantella and Quadrille. Another program of note was a special guest appearance by Amy Sue Linder, the reigning "Miss Massachusetts."

The 1980 edition of the library's Referral Directory funded by local banks, was made available to the community. It has also become necessary for the library to take stronger methods to insure that additional tax dollars not be expended to replace long overdue library materials. With the assistance of the Bridgewater Police Department and the Clerk of the Brockton District Court, the library has successfully retrieved many long overdue materials from delinquent borrowers.

CHILDRENS ROOM ACTIVITIES. Programming for preschool children included weekly story and toddler hours, as well as bedtime and holiday story hours. School age children enjoyed the many other special activities. Other continuing programs this year were school visits, story hours, Friday afternoon films and programs for nursery and special needs classes.

FRIENDS OF THE LIBRARY. Funds raised from the book fair were used to purchase equipment for the Childrens room. The Friends also funded the publication of the library's newsletter "Common Knowledge." Other projects of the Friends included the updating of the Master Calendar of town events and helping with the revision of the Referral Directory for 1980. Jean Novotny was elected president of the Friends for 1980; and elected to serve with her were Christina Ajemian, vice-president; Marion Phaneuf, recording secretary; Carolyn Meaney, corresponding secretary; and Joyce Leung, treasurer.

PUOSTO (A Place to Stand)

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, and Citizens of Bridgewater:

Reviewing the basic goals and philosophy of Puosto during the past year brings light upon the fact that we have continued to follow in the same spirit as those community members who founded PUOSTO eight years ago. We have remained dedicated toward involving community members in all facets of our programs so that we are able to provide the services needed in Bridgewater.

During the course of the year our agency employed 15 staff persons, including a coordinator/family counselor; female youth counselor; youth counselor; two youth workers; hotline coordinator; hotline worker and other office workers. PUOSTO's Board of Trustees are made up of six local community members. We have also been fortunate to recruit 50 hotline volunteers during the course of the year. The volunteers came to us from the Bridgewaters and college communities. We have also received two student interns from the local colleges.

The services provided by PUOSTO includes a general hotline, family and youth counseling, and a community education program. The primary focus of our counseling and educational program is the prevention and intervention of substance abuse. Our records show that the following has been recorded in this office in 1980:

The Zoning Appeals Board

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens and Taxpayers of the Town of Bridgewater:

The Zoning Appeals Board had approximately the same number and type of appeals for the calendar year 1980 as it did for the year 1979.

During the year 1980, the General Court passed, and the governor approved, the so called "Hazardous Waste Disposal Act," whereby a person, if all of the necessary permits have been granted as proscribed by the new act of the legislature, is entitled to a permit for the disposal of hazardous waste as a matter of law.

There is a question whether or not a zoning by-law is applicable and whether a zoning by-law can be amended requiring a special permit after a hearing by the Zoning Board of Appeals.;

The Board, therefore, strongly suggests the Selectmen appoint an ad hoc committee to study and report back whether or not this law is subject to local zoning ordinances, and, if so, to submit the necessary article requiring a special permit to issue by the Board of Zoning Appeals with necessary conditions and restrictions spelled out in detail by the amendment.

The Board suggests a Special Permit due to the fact that the question of "hazardous waste" is under the control of the state is a new statute and cannot be completely prohibited.

The Board further suggests the said ad hoc committee be composed of a member from the Selectmen, Planning Board, Board of Health, Conservation Commission, Industrial Development Commission, and four other members representing the geographical areas of the Town.

Conservation Commission

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

1980 was another exciting year for the Conservation Commission, In addition to having regular monthly meetings, there were numerous wetlands hearings and some complaints from Town Citizens.

We were most fortunate to have Mr. Jon Ridder propose the conversion of his sand pits off Vernon and Cross Streets into conservation areas. After meeting with Mr. Ridder, the Selectmen, Recreation Commission, Highway Department, Town Engineer, and Building Inspector, many thoughts were pooled and plans made for the acceptance of Mr. Ridder's offer. Mr. Charles Herbert, Town Engineer, prepared a detailed contour map showing the proposed twin ponds with a brook running between. At the present time, it seems that the most advantageous plan would be for conservation and passive recreation, with the option of developing the land later for active recreation.

In other exciting events cited, we have held hearings on the alteration of wetlands for Mr. Robert Gabriel and his industrial land at the old fireworks site on Bedford Street, and Milebrook Estates off North Street.

We have been asked to look into wetlands matters on the corner of Plymouth and Orange Street, Wood Street, Vernon Street, Old Forge Road, MacDonald's Landfill in Halifax, bordering on Bridgewater, and rare and endangered species at Lake Nippenicket.

HUMAN RESOURCES

Coordinator of Elder Affairs

The Coordinator of Elder Affairs is located on the second floor of the Town Hall, and the hours are 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Knowing the elderly population needs and trying to fill these needs is our goal and no problem is unimportant. We are able to reach our elderly through the monthly Newsletter, telephone calls, visitations, reassurance calls, outreach work, interviews, referrals, and personal contact. We offer assistance through our brochure, craft classes, health programs, crisis intervention, provider service agencies, information and referral work. Also available are recreational and seasonal bus trips. Seniors may partake of hot meals at Hemlock Drive three days a week when school is in session for luncheon meals. Home delivered meals are provided for the homebound. Elderly may seek help through our job bank, legal services and a telephone pal line.

We have a Senior Men's Group, Senior clothing Exchange Room, and a Project Room. This past year our "Friends of the Council on Aging" organization was started. The primary function of this group is to raise monies to be used in helping Seniors. The Council On Aging cannot raise money because they are a branch of town government, receiving funds as voted at the Town Meeting.

A variety of workshops are set up in this area to stimulate interest and to educate our Senior population in an effort to permit independent living for as long as possible.

The Coordinator appled for and received a grant in the amount of \$9,000.00 from the Department of Elder Affairs for a Coordinator's Aide.

Housing Authority

To the Citizens of Bridgewater:

Although the State has had another round of funding for Fiscal Year 1980, the Bridgewater Housing Authority was unsuccessful in their efforts to secure more housing for the elderly. The Federal Government, Department of Housing and Urban Development funded the Housing Authority thirteen additional Section 8 units, bringing the total to 39 units under the supervision of the Bridgewater Housing Authority. This program funds some elderly, but is mostly geared towards families of low income, which meet the federal guidelines. The Bridgewater Housing Authority will continue their efforts this spring to secure more elderly in the next round of funding.

Although funds for reconstructing the walks and curbs have not come through as yet, some detectors have been installed in all the apartments at Hemlock Drive as well as the 705 family housing.

The Bridgewater Housing Authority sincerely thanks the Selectmen for all their cooperation in helping the Bridgewater Housing Authority secure funds for housing, whether it be for elderly or low income, for without their cooperation it would be impossible. For this we are sincerely grateful. Our thanks also to the many departments for their help, including Mr. Beninati of the Highway Department, Mr. Zaverucha, our Town Inspector, Miss Nancy Oliviera, of the Board of Health, the Police and Fire Departments and to the excellent ambulance service who certainly had a very busy year.

Council on Aging

The Council on Aging was established by vote of a special town meeting on August 24, 1970. Since that time more than 50 people have served as volunteer members of the Council.

The COA has had to curtail some of its recreational activities during 1980 due to the increased costs and limited budget. Because of the high cost of transportation it was necessary to eliminate the fall foliage trip but a very successful holiday trip was held with a visit to LaSalette Shrine. The fall barbecue was not held in 1980 because of budget restrictions and it was decided to make Senior Citizens Day in the spring the major event for this fiscal year. The Council will continue to provide whatever recreational and educational programs the budget permits and will strive for maximum participation. However, seniors, like all other age groups, have differing needs and many simply do not wish to be involved in group activities. Special efforts are made regularly to interest new seniors in activities sponsored by the Council.

For all seniors, the information and referral service is always available to help with problems with social security, welfare, medical and many other areas where some assistance is needed or direction is required.

Our thanks to the Board of Selectmen and other boards and individuals in the town, as well as our many volunteers, for their continued cooperation in our efforts.

Veterans Services

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The low unemployment figure ending at 4.7% had a somewhat ameliorating effect on expenses in 1980, although this is not generally a significant factor in Bridgewater, disability and illness being the predominant reasons for seeking benefits.

The cost of the program is only part of the total expended on behalf of local veterans. This cost is kept at the current level by the continuous pursuit of funds from supplementary sources such as Social Security, Supplementary Security Income, Medicare, Medicaid, fuel assistance and the placement of non-disabled veterans in CETA and the Division of Employment Security. One of the larger contributory sources which tends to reduce our expenses involves grants from the Veterans Administration. These include compensation, pensions, hospitalization and medical and psychiatric treatment. The monetary benefit to the Town gained by taking advantage of these V.A. services exceeds our total expense.

Despite all these efforts to keep the bill down, the cities and towns still are charged with half the cost. How will the problem be handled in view of $2\frac{1}{2}$? It is inconceivable that the veterans undergoing extreme hardship and who are not eligible for the above programs will be left with but a small hope in the future as the only salve to their suffering.j

To date, the State office has given us no information as to probable future procedure and it is unlikely that the department or any other State authority knows what the future will bring.

Possibly some change in Chapter 115 which governs the dispensing of services to veterans will help the situation.

2. No-school announcements will be given on Stations WBET and WCAV-Brockton, WBZ-Boston, WHDH-Boston and WPLM-Plymouth; also, WCVB-TV 5, WATD (fm 96)-Marshfield and WBIM (fm 91.5)-Bridgewater State College.

3. Please:

a. DO NOT seek no-school information the night before the day in question; a decision is not reached until roads are checked out early in the morning.

b. *DO NOT* call the Police or Fire Departments; jammed lines could prevent an emergency call from reaching either department.

DISMISSAL POLICY

Parents are alerted to the fact that occasionally because of severe weather or other emergency conditions school may be dismissed during the day.

It is impossible for the School Department to notify the parents of over 2,100 children prior to any emergency dismissal. Therefore, we suggest that parents work out plans with friends or relatives to care for their children in anticipation of such emergency dismissals.

Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee:

I submit for your consideration the Annual Report "of the conditions" of the Bridgewater Public Schools for calendar year 1980. This report is based on information gathered from the reports of the principals, supervisors and the director of pupil personnel services which are on file and available for your inspection. In addition, the School Committee minutes were reviewed in order to provide an accurate reflection of all activities. It should be noted that the Board of Selectmen requested a brief report from all town departments so that printing costs could be kept to a minimum. I, therefore, commend to the attention of the Committee and the citizens of the town the detailed reports of the administrators and supervisors which are incorporated herewith as a part of the annual school report.

This past year witnessed the continuation of the curriculum development programs initiated several years ago in the Reading and Mathematics content areas. The process of refining our curriculum objectives is a time-consuming and never-ending process. It is, however, an effort that must be undertaken in all curriculum areas. The committee on Basic Skills completed its task and submitted a plan for implementation which was approved by the Department of Education. Because of the fiscal situation, the quarterly elective subject program in grades seven and eight was significantly curtailed which resulted in the elimination of four teaching positions. In addition, Industrial Arts and Home Economics were dropped from the program in grades five and six. Grade five was reorganized into selfcontained units at the Middle School.

With the opening of the new school year in September, an additional one hundred and seventy-five pupils were accommodated at the Burnell School thus returning the library at the Middle School back to its primary purpose. Enrollment dropped off slightly but is not dropping at significant rates as is the experience of neighboring communities. The maintenance department, augmented by the additional help in the summer, continued its excellent work in keeping the school buildings and grounds in good repair and appearance. The major project, the complete replacement of the gym floor in the Middle School Addition, was finished to the satisfaction of the physical education teachers.

I am continually impressed by the dedication of all the employees of the School Department. The degree of success that the schools have had has been due to the interaction, communication an dcooperation between the staff and the community.

Because of the brevity of this report, it would be impossible for me to express the gratitude and appreciation to all of those individuals who contributed to the successful operation of the public schools. However, I would be remiss if I did not recognize the retirements of Mrs. Cora-lou Root, Mrs. Mary Chambers and Mrs. Nina Auglis. They had a significant impact on the lives of countless numbers of students and colleagues.

In conclusion, may I remind the citizens of Bridgewater of the many hours that the School Committee has spent in its deliberations over budgets and the policy-making concerns related to the Committee's responsibilities. The communication betwenn the staff, the School Committee and the citizens has been healthy and productive. We will continue to pledge ourselves to providing an educational program that is of the same quality as in the past.

Annual Report of the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School Committee

This is the first annual report that a Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School Committee has written since the founding of the school. It has traditionally been the superintendent who has reported to the public. We write now because of the challenge of the implementation of Proposition 2½, and, as of this writing, the unknown full effect upon the excellence of education that Raynham and Bridgewater have enjoyed. The people of both communities voted in favor of this proposition, and it is, therefore, the intention of this committee to meet this obligation, hopefully, without destroying either the academic disciplines, or the varied activities and sports programs, both of which have resulted in recognition for our students. The three superintendents have been meeting to coordinate their efforts and provide an articulated program K-12 for our students. More than ever, the need exists for cooperation at all levels: from School Committees, administration, teachers and the citizens of the two communities.

Soaring property taxes caused this revolt. Yet the primary cause of this rise has been the failure of the state government to fund fully the mandated educational programs and the formulas for reimbursement so painstakingly established. Chapter 70, which reimburses towns and cities for their educational costs, has been revamped, but the resulting effect has been to punish the small towns who are making a Herculean effort to sustain their educational systems. In addition, regional school districts have had to fight to receive full reimbursements for Chapter 492 and transportation, the past five years. We are now anticipating only 92% of the first and 53% of the second this year. At the same time, in the middle of this fiscal year, substantial tuition increases permitted by the state, have been announced for student placements under Chapter 766. This account has increased from \$18,500 to \$63,000 this present year.

The School Committee proudly notes the achievements of many of its pupils. The Wrestling, Girls' Soccer, Boys' Soccer and Baseball teams have all won League Championships. Our Cheerleaders have been successful in their competitions, both at camp and locally. Our Newspaper, The Regional Sound, won the Boston University Competition and received the Highest Achievement Award in Writing and Publishing in 1978-79 and again in 1979-80. Seven of our seniors received Service Academy nominations last June. Of our present senior class, David W. Cornwall is a semi-finalist in the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Negro Students, and ten others have been commended. They include: Thomas A. Gallagher, Alexander D. Gray, Vera Hoffman, Mark D. Iafrati, Meri B. McIntyre, Christine F. Park, Kathleen M. Rocha, Jonathan M. Rubin, George W. Skogstrom. Three of our students were elevated to Eagle Scout rank: David McCabe, Andrew Niles and Frank Verhoorn III. Six of our students were selected to play in 1980 for All-State Music organizations: three for the orchestra, two for the band and one for the jazz ensemble. Thirteen students

successfully auditioned and participated in the Southeastern Massachusetts Music Educators' Association District Festival. Mary Vacher was selected to represent the state of Massachusetts as a member of the clarinet section of the 1981 All Eastern High School Band. Others of our student body took part in the New England Science and Humanities Symposium at the University of Massachusetts and the Presidential Classroom in Washington.

We can also point to community involvement in many areas. The dedication of the Cassiani Field House of the Edward F. Cameron Athletic Complex took place in November 8 in recognition of the family's contribution to our Region. This event was under Chairman James Dupont, Jr. and George Gurley. Parental concern focused upon proposed athletic policies and resulted in a two-community committee, augmented by administrators, coaches and students to review the athletic policies of the school, the coaches, the Old Colony League and to report to the School Committee in March. The Energy Audit Committee composed of chairman Arthur Wyman from the committee and several citizens from the two communities, in particular, Daniel Rumrill and John Dolan, recommended the services of Alonzo B. Read, Inc. The study cost \$10,000 and will result eventually in a savings of \$46,000 per year. We have been awarded a grant of \$48,633 to put the study into effect and are now eligible for further funding.

Recognizing that the computer is and will continue to grow as an all-important tool of our modern, technological society, a committee was formed under the chairmanship of Clifford Bettencourt, the superintendent and Dolores A. Trautman to solicit proposals for an analysis of Bridgewater-Raynham's needs in the matter of pupil literacy, department, central office, and business affairs usage. Price Waterhouse and Company was selected. They have provided the committee with a five-year phase-in program to provide the student body with a basic computer literacy, either to facilitate the students' entry to the job market or to prepare them for related postsecondary education; and, two, to realize the potential management improvements through computerization of certain school district administrative and business functions. The cost of the study was \$13,500 for the EDP Requirements Definition and \$11,500 for the EDP Systems Evaluation. We have delayed the implementation of the report because of the cost. Bridgewater-Raynham at the moment spends \$23,000 for computer services. This line item will probably increase.

The administrators and School Committee have agreed upon objectives for this year. They include among others: better public relations and the implementation of the energy report. The administrators have been available to our citizens two Thursday evenings per week from 7-9. An Open House will be conducted in the spring with Parent-Teacher Conferences.

The one great objective of your School Committee is to preserve as much as we can, the programs which have gained Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District its reputation these past 18 years. To do this, we need continued help and support from you, the public. We are now in crisis.

During 1980 Bridgewater State College observed the 140th anniversary of its founding with a number of special activities, including a week-long series of events in October which were shared by many of our friends and neighbors in the Town of Bridgewater. The interest and support of the people of Bridgewater in the life of the College has always been and will continue to be of great importance to us, and the College Community is grateful and appreciative to the citizens and officials of the Town.

In this year of anniversary and celebration it was especially fitting that the College and the Town could cooperate in a project of immense value to each. Through the combined efforts of students and faculty and townspeople, more than 500 households in the Town of Bridgewater received low-cost, no-cost energy savings ideas through "B.E.S.T."—"Bridgewater Energy Savings Task."

The project, based on similar successful programs in other communities in New England, was designed to acquaint people with various ways to reduce heating costs and conserve energy. HEALTH

Board of Health

To the Citizens of Bridgewater:

The year 1980 has been a year of changes in the Health Department. Mr. John J. Colford became a member of the Board of Health in April, replacing Mr. John Meadows who did not seek re-election. Mrs. Margaret McGinn retired in November after thirteen years of dedicated service as Board of Health secretary and was replaced by Mrs. Virginia Matusen.

The past year has been a busy one for the Board of Health. A total of 47 applications for on-site disposal were issued by our office. Restaurant inspections have been conducted and will continue on a regular basis. Housing inspections have doubled over 1979 and has necessitated in a larger portion of the Board of Health's time being devoted to Housing Code enforcement.

In June, the Board of Health, along with DEQE representatives, held an informational hearing to discuss problems and complaints regarding Cannon's Engineering. Local residents and townspeople voiced serious concerns regarding the status of the operation which. was placed under the direction of a court appointed receiver. The Board of Health has kept in close contact with state officials and will continue to monitor the activities of the operation in the future.

In conclusion, the Board of Health would like to express appreciation to all Board and Departments for their cooperation during the year.

Statistics for the fiscal year of 1980 show a utilization of the services of the Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association by 1.1% of the population. In 1979 the utilization was .6% showing an increase of .5%. Bridgewater is growing in population and the BVNA growth is shown in this utilization of services, the expanded hours of service and our community programs.

The problems inherent in such dissimilar agencies resulted in the Board of Directors voting in January 1981 to withdraw from the merger program at this time. The agency will continue to seek a broader based home health care program.

Approximately 1,000 children and adults participated in the 1980 Bridgewater Summer Swimming Program conducted at the Bridgewater State College pool from June 12 through August 8th.

A total of 128 American Red Cross certificates were earned during the season in the following classifications: 82 beginners, 16 advanced beginners, 14 intermediates, nine swimmers, two in basic rescue and water safety, and five in advanced life saving.

Bridgewater Arts Council

Since House Bill #6861, signed into law by Gov. Assessors Report

The Town now has a valuation of \$154,344,241. The increase in the Tax Rate is due to the increase in the amount to be raised over last year of \$283,141.82 which amounts to about \$1.83 on the tax rate. The Assessors picked up \$4,067,156.00 in new valuation which amounted to a \$1.13 drop in the Tax Rate. The \$1.83 minus the \$1.13 picked up by the Assessors accounts for the \$.70 raise in the Tax Rate of \$44.00. This past year we issued 108 abatements for persons over 70 years of age; 144 Veterans; 6 Clause 17; 8 Clause 18; 2 Clause 22A; 8 Clause 22E; 2 Clause 22A; 8 Clause 37, and 2 Clause 41A. This year we will inspect and assess 308 permits that were issued by the Building Inspector. These permits are for new houses, garages, additions, sheds, swimming pools, etc. We also have many partials from last year that have to be assessed. With the enactment of legislation, better known as "Proposition 2½," property taxes levied by local government units will be limited beginning in fiscal 1982. Chapter 580 requires the limitation to be measured against a community's full and fair cash value; and since its provisions will first be effective with the fiscal 1982 tax bills, the determination of value will be made as of the assessment date of January 1, 1981.

The preliminary full and fair cash valuation of each city and town as of January 1, 1981 has been determined by using its final 1980 Equalized Valuation updated to January 1, 1981 by a uniform inflation factor of thirteen (13%) percent except in those communities where an approved revaluation program has or will be completed for fiscal 1981 or fiscal 1982, in which case those new certified full and fair cash value figures will be substituted for the preliminary numbers.

After eighteen years of dedicated service to the Town, both as Assessor and Selectman, Henry L. Cormier retired December 31, 1980. During his years of service to the Town, Mr. Cormier was well respected for his abilities, dedication and fairness. He will be missed by his associates and office staff. Upon his retirement, John L. Revil was voted by the Board of Assessors to Chairman of the Board and full time Assessor. Mrs. Rose J. Bevis, Chief Clerk in the Assessors Office was appointed Assessor to fill the vacancy created in the Board.

Mr. Revil, Mr. Anacki, and retired assessor, Henry L. Cormier, wish to express their appreciation to Mrs. Rose J. Bevis, Chief clerk, and Vincent Damon, Assessors Clerk, as well as to all others who have in any way been of assistance in the Assessors Department during the past year.
