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

#### DOROTHY L. MANN 1905-1988

Lifelong resident of Bridgewater, local historian, civic activist and member of Bridgewater School Committee for 15 years (1962-1977); helped organize the P.T.A. in the town; member and past president of Bridgewater Historical Collectors which published the "Crane History of Bridgewater and the Crane Family" and the "Pictorial History of Bridgewater." She was in the process of completing a third book with the Bridgewater Historical Collectors "Tales Around the Common" which was completed by her daughter, Louella B. Mann. Fondly remembered by family and friends.



### CHARLES E. HATHAWAY 1942-1988

Seventeen year member of the Bridgewater Fire department (3/15/72-2/20/88). Served in the Air Force during the Vietnam Conflict. Fondly remembered for his dedication to duty, professionalism and courage under adverse conditions.



#### A. EVELYN NOURSE 1910-1989

Lifelong resident of Bridgewater. Served the citizens of Bridgewater for over 53 years as Town Accountant, Acting Town Clerk, Secretary to the Board of Selectmen and Secretary to the Board of Health. Served as Treasurer to the Bridgewater Veterans Memorial Committee and the Old Bridgewater Historical Society. Named Woman of the Year by the Bridgewater Jaycees in 1970. Fondly remembered for dedication, devotion and loyalty at the highest level.

DISTANCE FROM BOSTON: 27 Miles South

Bridgewater is certainly located in southeastern Massachusetts with access to Routes 24, 495 and 140. Routes 104/106, 18 and 28 intersect the Town Common, which measures as the biblical dimensions of Noah's Ark.

TRANSPORTATION: Buses to Boston — Daily; College Shuttle Bus — When in Session; Cape-Hyannis Rail Service — Summer; MBTA Commuter Rail — By 1991.

DAY CARE: Bridgewater-Raynham High School Bridgewater State College — Burnell School, Joyful Learning Center, School and Cedar Street, and East Bridgewater Family Y.

PUBLIC SCHOOL SYSTEM: K-6 in 2 schools, K-4 in 2 schools; grades 7-8 in junior high; 9-12 attend Bridgewater-Raynham Regional High School.

HIGHER EDUCATION: Bridgwater State College, a public institution conferring B.A. Degree.

PUBLIC FACILITIES & SERVICES: Gas available to parts of town and electricity to whole town. Town water to whole town; sewer is being extended to the outlying areas. Full time police department and full time fire department with modern equipment housed in one station. New public library open 6 days a week. Community supported ambulance. Cable television available.

TRASH COLLECTION: Transfer station; private services available.

HOSPITALS: Brockton Hospital — *Brockton;* Cardinal Cushing General Hospital — *Brockton;* Goddard Memorial Hospital — *Stoughton;* Morton Hospital — *Taunton;* St. Luke's Hospital — *Middleboro.*

## **1988 Report of the Board of Selectmen**

The Board of Selectmen is very pleased to make the following report to the citizens of the Town of Bridgewater. The year 1988 was one in which special efforts were made by the townspeople, town departments and town employees to focus on the town's natural resources and also to address issues related to the environment.

Voters of the Town approved the establishment of an Aquifer Protection District which will safeguard the Town's drinking water supply for future generations, especially as the Town continues to experience residential and commercial development. The River Cleanup project called attention to a great natural resource of the Town and the hard work of removing debris from the Town River was begun by members of the Conservation Commission and interested residents.


Also, money from the Superfund became available to clean up the hazardous waste site known as Canon's Engineering. Under the guidance of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and various state environmental agencies, this site will undergo extensive work aimed at restoration of this property.

An open space plan for the Town of Bridgewater was completed by the Town Planner, Richard Callinan, and submitted to the Conservations Services Department of the Department of Environmental Management. Development of the plan identifies the remaining parcels of land available for recreation, agriculture and conservation purposes. Acceptance of the plan by the state also allows the Town of Bridgewater to be eligible for discretionary funds which come from the federal government to the state and which are set aside for conservation purposes, river restoration and community development projects.

At the request of the Board of Selectmen, a solid waste study for the Town was completed by LEA Associates of Boston. This comprehensive document will serve as a guide for evaluating methods to deal with the disposal of solid waste.

Town Meeting voters approved a short term solution for the disposal of solid waste in their action to rezone a parcel of land for industrial purposes which is adjacent to the Halifax Landfill. The MacDonald site will need further state approvals before becoming operational for the residents fo the Town. The Solid waste Negotiating Team established to negotiate solid waste proposals for short and long term needs will continue its work in seeking a long term solution to this critical problem. While no environmentally perfect solution exists for disposing of the Town's rubbish, it is hoped that in the future a comprehensive approach to reducing the tonnage of solid waste generated by the Town can be implemented. Work in this area has already begun with a Leaf Composting Program developed by the Highway Department under the guidance of Highway Superintendent, Albert Beinati and Deputy Highway Superintendent, Andrew Bagas.

The Town must develop a recycling program to further reduce its tonnage of solid waste. Plans are underway to present a Source Separation Ordinance in the near future for the Town's approval. Even with approval of a local ordinance or by-law, implementation may be difficult if the State Department of Environmental Quality Engineering



(DEQE) is not forthcoming with technical assistance for communities in the Commonwealth, especially as such activities relate to the location of markets for recyclables.

While many hours were devoted to improving the quality of life for future residents of Bridgewater, an event occurred in the Town which honored those who have given so much to all of us and who are no longer with us. The War Memorial Committee, headed by W. John Nelson and Michael Maher, conducted a community drive to erect a fitting memorial to all veterans from Bridgewater who died in the service of their country. The Town Common now has a new addition, a striking black marble monument which contains the names of Bridgewater veterans who lost their lives in World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam War. It will serve as a permanent reminder to present and future generations of Bridgewaterites that much of what we enjoy in our town is because of others' sacrifices.

Town departments continue to experience the increasing workload that comes with growth and development. The Board of Selectmen recognizes the difficulty with which departments cope with this situation. The Police, Fire and Highway Departments have long since outgrown their present facilities. Fiscal constraints continue to stand in the way of providing adequate quarters to these departments but in the near future, it will be necessary to address this pressing problem. The Board wishes to remind residents that public safety departments in the Town are required to perform additional duties which many other communities are not required to do. The presence of two very large state institutions, Bridgewater State College and the Prison complex which is the largest in the Commonwealth, make great demands upon public safety departments in the Town which receive no financial compensation for services provided. The board of Selectmen will continue to pursue efforts at the state level with the assistance of our legislative delegation to see that the Town is compensated. The Board maintains a good working relationship with representatives of the college through the Town/Gown Committee and also works closely with officials of the Department of Corrections to address a variety of problems. However, it is becoming clear that in light of fiscal constraints facing our community, it may be necessary to curtail or perhaps eliminate vital

public safety services to both institutions if state assistance is not forthcoming.

For some time the Town has felt the impact of having a small commercial/industrial base as a source of revenue. In December of this year representatives of National Development Associates announced plans to develop a high fashion regional mall at the site formerly known as the Lakeside Corporate Center. This presents a significant opportunity for the town to expand its commercial/industrial tax base. As the Town grows, the need for additional services also increases while revenues grow at a much slower rate. Past attempts to override Proposition 2 1/2 have been unsuccessful.

With options for increased revenues becoming more secure, the Board of Selectmen is optimistic that a high quality commercial project such as the proposal by National Development will become a reality.

Town government and community events now reach into the homes of residents through Cable 8 News and other programs which are available through an agreement with Massachusetts Cablevision and the Town of Bridgewater. Overall, Cable Television has been a great success in the community and programs presented by a professional and sensitive staff of the station have provided an invaluable tool for communicating issues and events to a large audience.

The Town of Bridgewater is fortunate to have many residents who volunteer their time to various boards and commissions without recognition or compensation. Two individuals who have devoted many hours to informing the Town of its historical and cultural heritage deserve special recognition. Mr. Ken Moore and his son David Moore have in the last two years, educated many of us about the property known as the Stanley Iron Works. The father and son team, both local historians, are investigating potential uses for this site which for many years provided the main economic activity for the Town of Bridgewater. Hopefully, their dream to have this property restored and used once again will become a reality.

Finally, the Board of Selectmen owes a great deal to those who work in the Office of the Selectmen. The administrative and clerical staff perform their duties with courtesy, professionalism and dedication. Mr. Frank Maher, who serves as the Executive Secretary for the Town has earned a solid reputation in a short time for his professional capabilities as well as his communicative skills, both of which have served the residents and Town Departments extremely well. Mrs. Margaret Mader, Administrative Clerk; Mrs. Eileen Fitzgerald, Principal Clerk and Mrs. Drena Austin, Senior Clerk, all carry out the tasks associated with local government with great skill, courtesy and dedication. Their exceptional cooperative spirit in assisting the public with a variety of requests are appreciated by this Board more than we can say. Last but certainly not least, we are most fortunate to have the talents and experience of Town Counsel Robert G. Clark, III and Melvyn D. Cohen, Associate Town Counsel. Both individuals serve the Town with distinction and the Board of Selectmen is indebted to them for the many hours of service they have given to the town.

## **Report of the Executive Secretary**

This, my first full year as Executive Secretary, has been most rewarding and fulfilling not only on a professional level but also on a personal basis. The reception and cooperation afforded to me by the citizens has greatly assisted this office and that of the Board of Selectmen in attempting to carry out the many resonsibilities associated with government and administering the activities of a burgeoning community.

The Executive Secretary, a comparatively new position established by Town Meeting approximately three years ago at the request of the Board of Selectmen, is responsible for the day-to-day coordination of Town Government. The Executive Secretary, with the assistance of staff assigned to him, implements the plans, programs and policies as established by the Board of Selectmen.

This past year saw the completion of the half million dollar infrastructure grant which, in addition to supplying our safety departments with much needed capital equipment, enabled us to install handicap access to the Town Hall. Also completed was the renovation of the basement in the Academy Building which will serve as a Civil Defense shelter, also handicap accessible. The other highlights included: the receipt of an Energy Grant for the Fire Station; the establishment of an off-campus housing policy with Bridgewater State College; the institution of a downtown parking plan; the formation of a committee to study the feasibility of establishing a golf course at Chaffee Farm; and, the continuation of the efforts of the Solid Waste Negotiating Committee in their attempt to solve the waste problems of the Town.

In conclusion, while the past year may have been rewarding as measured by the amount of assistance this office has been able to provide to the general public, the upcoming years appear to be most exciting as the Town embarks on a series of proposals that promise to offer a solution to the economic and fiscal woes of the Town. The Board of Selectmen and the staff of this office are looking forward to working with those who have proposals before the Town in an attempt to resolve many of the issues that now confront us.

At the beginning of the second sentence thereof add the following clause:

"With respect to any district other than the Planned Development District if designated...."

At the end of the second sentence thereof add a new sentence to read as follows:

"With respect to the Planned Development District, if designated in the Tables by the letter "SP", the use may be permitted as a special exception only if the Planning Board so determines and grants a special permit therefor as provided in Section 9.6 of the By-Law, the Planning Board being designated as the sole special permit granting authority for Planned Development Districts."

So that the entire Section 6.2 of the By-Law shall then read as follows:

"6.2. A use listed in Section 6.3 is permitted as of right in any district under which it is denoted by the letter "Y" subject to such requirements as may be specified elsewhere in the By-Law. With respect to any district other than the Planned Development District, if designated in the Tables by the letters "SP", the use may be permitted as a special exception only if the Board of Appeals so determines and grants a

special permit therefor as provided in Section 11 subject to such restrictions as set forth elsewhere in this By-Law and such further restrictions as said Board may establish. With respect to the Planned Development District, if designated in the Tables by the letters "SP," the use may be permitted as a special exception only if the Planning Board so determines and grants a special permit therefor as provided in Section 9.6 of the By-Law, the Planning Board being designated as the sole special permit granting authority for Planned Development Districts. The letter "N" shall designate that the use is not permitted."

Article 38. It was unanimously voted that the Town transfer the funds remaining in the Elementary School Building Committee account to the School Building Committee Account, to be expended under its direction for the purposes for which said Committee was created by vote under Article 31 of the November 9, 1987, Special Town Meeting.

Article 39. It was unanimously voted that the Town petition the General Court for a special act of the Legislature to read substantially as follows:

"Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 53 of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, the Town of Bridgewater may establish in the Town Treasury, a guaranteed deposit fund which the Town Treasurer of said Town shall keep separate and apart from all other monies and in which fund shall be deposited any design review fees collected by the Conservation Commission, for plans filed with said Commission requiring design review costs. The principle and interest thereon may be expended at the direction of the Conservation Commission by said Treasurer to pay for all reasonable design review costs incurred by said Town in processing said applications including but not limited to, any professional consulting services. At any such application fees paid in excess of the cost incurred by the Town for design review shall be returned to the applicant by said Treasurer."

Article 3. It was unanimously voted that the Town hear and act upon the Report of any Committee appointed by the Town and to continue such Committee as the Town deems appropriate.

Unanimously voted that the Town adopt the report of the Ad Hoc Committee and authorize the dedication of the addition of said Public Library as recommended by said report when addition is constructed. (Lorraine Daley Memorial Ad Hoc Committee)

Unanimously voted that the School Building Committee be continued.

Article 4. It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1988, in accordance with the provisions of the General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a Note or Notes therefor, payable within one (1) year, and to renew any Note or Notes as may be given for a period of less than one (1) year, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

**Article 5.** It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend Grants on behalf of the Town of Bridgewater.

Article 6. It was unanimously voted that the Town clarify its action taken under Article 6 at the Annual Town Meeting for the year 1987 to determine that such vote not contemplate or require any particular design but that such design be committed to the present School Building Committee (formerly the Elementry School Building Committee in Article 6) in compliance with an approved Educational Plan and Needs identified by the present School Building Committee and with the approval of the School Building Assistance Bureau, it being the intent of Article 6 as hereby clarified that an elementary school be constructed on the Mello Property.

Phinney, Registered Land Surveyor, Middleboro, MA." on file in the office of the Town Clerk, owner-Vincent Pedro and Bonnie J. Pedro.

**Article 14.** That the Town vote to accept Vera Drive as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater running easterly from Conant Street for a distance of 860 ft. more or less including cul-de-sac all as shown on a plan entitled "Vera estates definitive subdivision of land in Bridgewater, MA dated April 4, 1984, Scale 1"=50, Robert D. Sgarzi, C.E., Kingston, MA." on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

Defeated.

**Article 15.** It was unanimously voted that the Town Take No Action on Article 15. (Home Rule Petition — civil service exam for police officer re: Keith Derbyshire)

Article 16. That the Town vote to prescribe in the Town By-Laws the number of one hundred (100) registered voters as the number of voters necessary to constitute a quorum at Town Meetings, including Special Town Meetings, provided however, that seventy-five (75) registered voters shall be prescribed to be sufficient number to adjourn the same. Defeated.

A motion was made and duly seconded for reconsideration in hopes it would fail. Unanimous.

Article 17. It was Unanimously voted to Table Article 17. (Petition the General Court — pay over to Town Treasurer dog fees)

Article 18. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater, Article 1 - Town Meeting - Section 4, to read as follows:

#### Town By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater Article 1 Town Meeting

Section 4. Notice of every Town Meeting and Town Election shall be given by posting attested copy of the Warrant calling the same at the entrance to the Town Hall and in at least seven public places in the Town as follows: Precinct One-Scotland Congregational Church; Precinct Two-Public Library; Precinct Three-Post Office; Precinct Four-State College; Precinct Five-Academy Building; Precinct Six-Highway Department; Precinct Seven-Town Hall, and shall be posted not less than seven (7) days before the day appointed for such meetings for Annual Town Meetings and not less than fourteen (14) days for Special Town Meetings. Town elections shall be posted within seven (7) days prior to such election. The return of the officer, stating the manner of notice, shall be endorsed on the warrant and filed with the Town Clerk.

Article 19. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater to include the following as Section 15:

- 15. AQUIFER PROTECTION DISTRICT
- 15.1 PURPOSE: The purpose of this section is:

To preserve and protect the groundwater resources of the Town of Bridgewater:

To protect, preserve and maintain the existing and potential groundwater supply and surface water quality for present and future residents of the Town:

To prevent pollution of ground and surface water and water supplies:

To assure the continued availability of the water supply of the Town:

To promote and protect the public health, safety and general welfare.

15.2 ESTABLISHMENT OF THE AQUIFER PROTECTION DISTRICT

For the purposes of this By-Law, there are hereby established within the Town, certain Aquifer Protection Districts, consisting of the aquifer itself, the land above the aquifer, and the aquifer's most significant recharge areas. An Aquifer Protection District shall be considered as overlaying other zoning districts and shall be so identified on the Zoning Map of the Town of Bridgewater. Any uses permitted in the portions of the districts so overlaid shall be permitted subject to all the provisions of the Aquifer Protection District.

#### 15.3 USE REGULATIONS

In those portions of the Town within an Aquifer Protection District, the following activities are prohibited as a principal or accessory use unless otherwise noted. Where lawfully existing, such uses may continue but not expanded, altered or changed without obtaining a special permit under Section 15.5.

- (a) Disposal of solid wastes, other than brush and stumps.
- (b) Storage and/or transmission of petroleum or refined petroleum products except when stored within buildings which it will heat.
- (c) The disposal of liquid or leachable wastes, except normal domestic sanitary wastewater in quantities less than the proportion of 880 gallons per day per acre to a subsurface waste disposal system.
- (d) Industrial uses which discharge process wastewater on-site including any commercial and service uses discharging wastewater containing contaminants other than normal organic waste;
- (e) Open and/or leachable storage of road salt or de-icing chemicals;
- (f) The use of chemicals for de-icing unless deemed necessary for public safety by the Highway Superintendent;
- (g) Dumping of snow or street sweepings brought in from outside the Aquifer Protection District;
- (h) The excavation of land unless incidental to a permitted use;
- (i) The use of septic system cleaners which contain toxic organic chemicals;
- (j) The storage, treatment, generation or disposal 'of hazardous wastes as defined by the Hazardous Waste Regulations promulgated by the DEQE Division of Hazardous Waste under the provisions of Chapter 21 (c) M.G.L.
- (k) Automotive, truck or tractor repair shops, service stations, and contractors yards.

- (I) Except within a designated parking area which is solely used for public or employee parking purposes as required under Section 10, any outside parking of vehicles or motorized equipment for non-residential and non-agricultural uses.
- (m) The application of fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides for non-residential and non-agricultural uses unless approved by means of a special permit under Section 15.5 or involving either of the following specific uses:
  - Aerial application of Bactimose or Vectobac type product for the organic control of mosquito larvae.
  - (2) Spot application as deemed necessary by the Forestry or Highway Superintendent.
- (n) Storage or sale of junk or salvaged materials.
- (o) Subsurface storage tanks.
- 15.4 DIMENSIONAL REQUIREMENTS

The development of any lot within an Aquifer Protection District shall not leave less than 10,000 square feet of undeveloped upland (non-wetland as defined by Section 40 of Chapter 131, M.G.L.), nor shall said development render impervious more than 25% of any residential lot or more than 50% of any nonresidential lot. The remaining portion of said lots shall be covered by natural or planted vegetation and shall be left undisturbed.

15.5 SPECIAL PERMIT GRANTING AUTHORITY

Special permits may be granted by the Board of Appeals to allow the expansion, alteration or change of pre-existing nonconforming uses or for uses which may be allowed by special permit as noted in Section 15.3 to the maximum allowed by the underlying district. In cases involving pre-existing nonconforming uses, the Board of Appeals shall not grant approval unless it shall find that such a special permit application has been submitted in conformity with Section 15.6 and that the proposed expansion. alteration or change shall not be substantially more detrimental to the supply and quality of groundwater than the existing use. In cases involving uses which may be allowed by special permit, the Board of Appeals shall not grant approval unless it shall find that such a special permit application has been submitted in conformity with Section 15.6 and that the proposed use shall not be detrimental to the supply and quality of groundwater. If so deemed in both cases, the Board of Appeals may stipulate in their approval, safeguards on the use and on the development of the site to prevent or correct conditions harmful to the aquifer. tions harmful to the aguifer.

15.6 PROCEDURES

15.61 An application for a special permit required under Section 15.3 shall be submitted and received in a manner pursuant to the procedures set forth in Chapter 40A, M.G.L. and all amendments thereto as well as adherence to the Town's Zoning By-Laws. Special permits shall only be issued following public hearings held within sixty-five (65) days after filing of an application and its site plan with the Board of Appeals, five (5) copies of which shall forthwith be submitted to the Town Clerk by the applicant. The Town Clerk shall distribute said copies to the Planning Board, Conservation Commission, Board of Health and the Water and Sewer Commission. These agencies shall review the application and site plan and shall report their findings and recommendations for approval or disapproval together with reasons therefor and any additional requirements, to the Board of Appeals. Failure of any said agencies to report their recommendations within thirty-five days after receiving the application and plan, shall be deemed lack of opposition thereto. Final action shall be taken on such applications within ninety (90) days following the public hearing on said applications. The rights granted by special permit under this By-Law shall lapse if they are not exercised within two (2) years after the special permit is granted.

15.62 Special permit applications shall be accompanied by plans and any other materials or information which are required in the rules adopted by the Board of Appeals under Section 9 of Chapter 40A M.G.L. In addition to said rules, special permit applications shall include the following information:

- (a) A complete listing of the type and quantities of hazardous materials involved in the operation of the existing and the proposed uses.
- (b) A written plan outlining measures to be taken to secure and prevent the spilling and leakage of hazardous materials. Whenever appropriate, such measures shall be indicated on the site plan.
- (c) Evidence of conformance with DEQE permit requirements for industrial waste treatment and sewage treatment systems exceeding 15,000 gallons per day.
- (d) Water elevations and logs of borings driven to a minimum depth of 25 feet or refusal. At least three observation wells on the lot are required which shall be arranged to identify the direction and depth of groundwater flow.

Article 20. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater as follows:

Insert in Section 3.01 below the words "(See Section 14)" the words "Aquifer Protection District (See Section 15)."

Insert as the last sentence in Section 6.1 the sentence "The use of lands within an Aquifer Protection District shall, in addition, be subject to Section 15.3 of this By-Law."

Insert in Section 8.4 the number "(17)" after the heading in the last column which reads "Maximum % of Lot Coverage" and insert at the bottom of the footnotes the line "(17). Refer to Section 15.4 which supercedes other provisions stated herein for only those lands located within an Aquifer Protection District." Article 21. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Zoning Map of the Town of Bridgewater by designating the following described area surrounding the municipal wells near Carver Pond as an Aquifer Protection District.

Beginning at the intersection of Mt. Prospect and South Streets; thence east along the southerly side line of Grove Street to its intersection with Summer Street; thence in a southeasterly direction along the southwesterly side line of Summer Street to its intersection with Conant Street; thence along the northwesterly side line of Conant Street to its intersection with Winter Street; thence southwest along the northerly side line of Winter Street to the westerly side line of Bedford Street; thence in a northwesterly direction for approximately 5080 feet to the easterly side line of Forest Drive at its intersection with Pleasant Drive; thence in a northerly direction along the side line of Forest Drive to a point approximately 130 feet to the northwest of its intersection with Oak Ridge Lane: thence north approximately 2160 feet to the westerly side line of Starr Road at its intersection with Pleasant Street; thence in a northerly direction to the easterly side line of Aspen Drive at its intersection with Birch Street; thence in a northerly direction for approximately 1150 feet along the side line of Aspen Drive to a point; thence east for approximately 2280 feet to the southerly side line of Mt. Prospect Street at its intersection with Center Street: thence southeast along the southerly side line of Mt. Prospect Street to the point of beginning.

Article 22. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Zoning Map of the Town of Bridgewater by designating the following described area surrounding the municipal wells near the Matfield River and being predominantly north of High Street as an Aquifer Protection District.

Beginning at a point on the easterly side line of Bridge Street at its intersection with High Street; thence north along the side line of Bridge Street to the East Bridgewater Town Line; thence east along the Town Line to its intersection with Plain Street; thence south along the westerly side line of Plain Street to its intersection with High Street: thence northwest for approximately 460 feet along the northeasterly side line of High Street to a point; thence southwest for approximately 740 feet along the southwesterly side line of Mill street to a point; thence northwest for approximately 940 feet along the common boundary of Lot 12 and Lot 17 as shown on Assessor Maps 24 and 14 respectively to a point on the west bank of the Matfield River; thence northeast for approximately 580 feet tangent to the back of the river to a point; thence west for approximately 1670 feet beginning along the southwest boundary of Lot 18 as shown on Assessors Map 14 and beyond to a point; thence northeast for approximately 400 feet beginning along the common boundary of Lots 19 and 21 as shown on Assessors Map 14 and beyond to the northeasterly side line of High Street; thence northwest for approximately 380 feet to the point of beginning.

Article 23. It was voted to Table Article 23 until the recessed Town Meeting in June. (Historic Commission and Historic District)

A motion was made and duly seconded to recess the Town Meeting until June 6, 1988 at the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional High School.

Article 25. It was voted that no action be taken on this article. (Abandoned Vehicles, Junked Cars, etc.)

Article 26. This article was withdrawn without prejudice. (McIntyre's Dairy — rezoning.)

Article 27. This article was withdrawn without prejudice. (Plymouth & Mill St. — rezoning.)

Article 28. It was Voted that the Town pursuant to M.G.L. C.140, Sec.177A (4), to establish the annual fee for automatic amusement devices licenses, or any renewal thereof, at the sum of \$100.00 and \$50.00 for Sunday licenses.

Article 29. It was unanimously voted to establish a Bridgewater Iron Works Historic District, pursuant to M.G.L. C. 40C and to appear as ARTICLE XXXII in the By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater, which District shall consist of all land within 600 feet of the center line of High Street included in Assessors Map 10, Parcels 40 and 41 and Map 11, Parcel 3. 2/3 Vote required.

Section 3. Money paid over to the Town Treasurer under sections one and two above shall become part of the estimated receipts of the Town of Bridgewater.

Section 4. This act shall take effect upon its acceptance by the Town of Bridgewater.

MacNeill, Professional Land Surveyor - E.J. Flynn Engineers, Inc. Consulting Engineers, attached to the said option to purchase and to appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue the sum of \$300.00 to be expended by the Board of Selectmen in connection therewith.

Article 3. This article was withdrawn. (Revolving account – fees – solid waste disposal)

Article 4. It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell the property by the Town of Bridgewater, located on Standish Road, donated to the Town by the Bridgewater Credit Union as a Senior Center for such sum and upon such terms and conditions satisfactory to the Board of Selectmen and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver a deed therefor, and that proceeds thereof, other than those required to be collected pursuant to MGL, C. 44 Sec. 63A, be segregated and set aside from other funds of the Town to be used for a center for the elderly, said funds to be expended under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen subject to further appropriation by the Town.

Article 5. It was voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue the sum of \$346,000.00 to fund various collective bargaining agreements for Bridge-water School Department employees.

Article 7. It was unanimously voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue the sum of \$1,029.50 for prior years bills for Fire Department.

Article 8. It was unanimously voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from Water Receipts Reserve the sum of \$500.00 for a prior years bill for Water Tower Inspection.

Article 9. It was voted that the Town amend the voted passed under Article 21 of the Warrant for the November 10, 1986, Town Meeting to increase the appropriation for the costs of constructing a sewerage treatment plant, sewers and sewerage systems by the sum of \$500,000.00 in accordance with the capital improvement program and facilities plan addendum thereto on file with the Board of Water and Sewer Commissioners so that the vote passed under Article 21 under the Warrant of November 10, 1986, reads as follows:

"That \$12,000,000.00 is appropriated for constructing a sewerage treatment plant, sewers and sewerage systems in accordance with the capital improvement program and facilities plan addendum thereto on file with the Board of Water and Sewer Commissioners; that to meet this appropriation \$25,000.00 shall be provided from the \$25,000.00 transferred from available funds for such purpose by the vote passed under Article 4 of the Warrant for the November 14, 1977 Town Meeting, \$162,649.59 shall be provided from the \$162,649.59 transferred from unexpended funds for such purpose by the vote passed under Article 17 of the Warrant for the November 14, 1983, Town Meeting, \$283,000.00 shall be provided from the \$283,000.00 transferred from overlay surplus for such purpose by the vote passed under Article 7 of the Warrant for the May 20, 1986, Town Meeting, \$150,000.00 shall be provided from the \$150,000.00 paid to the Town for such purpose by Bridgewater State College, and the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to borrow \$11,379,350.41 under G.L. C. 44, Sec. 8 (15); that the Board of Water and Sewer Commissioners with the approval of the Selectmen is authorized to contract for and expend any federal or state aid available for the project, provided that the amount of the authorized borrowing shall be reduced by the amount of such aid received prior to the issuance of bonds or notes under this vote; and that the Board of Water and Sewer Commissioners is authorized to take any other action necessary to carry out this project."

**Article 10.** It was unanimously voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue the sum of \$39.02 for a prior years bill to New England Telephone Company for the office of Elder Affairs.

Article 11. It was voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue, the sum of \$2,000.00 for Self-Help, Inc. a non-profit agency which serves the needs of the Town's limited income residents.

**Article 12.** It was unanimously voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue, the sum of \$9,425.00 for a balance due on insurance premiums for the Town of Bridgewater.

**Article 20.** It was voted that the Town appropriate and transfer from surplus revenue, the sum of \$18,289.00 balance of the Town of Bridgewater's assessment for the Bristol-Plymouth Regional School District.

**Article 21.** It was unanimously voted that the Town accept an Equal Education Opportunity Grant by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Education for the Bristol-Plymouth School District in the sum of \$42,062.00 pursuant to the provisions of MGL, C. 70A, Sec. 5 for the purposes set forth in said Grant.

**Article 22.** It was unanimously voted to raise and appropriate from taxation, the sum of \$40,000.00 to the Advisory Committee's Reserve Fund.

Article 23. It was unanimously voted that the Town transfer the balance of the Senior Center Repairs Account No. 1-541-106-5248 to an account under the control of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 24. It was unanimously voted that the Town accept Palmieri Circle as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater, running northerly from Laurel Street for a distance of 475 feet more or less including cul-de-sac, all as shown on a plan entitled, "Palmieri Estates" definitive subdivision of land, Bridgewater, Massachusetts; owner, Marie A. and Michael E. Palmieri, dated March 26, 1986, revised August 7, 1986, Scale 1"=40', Hayward-Boynton & Williams, Inc. Engineers, Brockton, MA, on fiel in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 25. It was unanimously voted that the Town accept Evergreen Drive as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater, running westerly from South Street a distance of 745 feet more or less including cul-de-sac, all as shown on a plan entitled, Plan of Land in Bridgewater, MA, prepared for Paul H. Lyons, Irene B. Lyons, Bryant Brook Realty Trust, dated July 9, 1987, Scale 1"=60', Michael J. Koska & Associates, Civil Engineers and Land Surveyors, Acushnet, MA on file with the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 26. It was unanimously voted that the Town accept Kathy Circle as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater, running northerly for a distance of 985 feet more or less including cul-de-sac, all as shown on a plan entitled, "Kathy Circle," Plan of Land in Bridgewater in Bridgewater, MA, dated April 30, 1984, prepared for Raymond Ferrone, Scale 1"=40', Professional Land Survey, Easton, MA on file with the office at the Town Clerk.

Article 27. It was unanimously voted that the Town accept Southbridge Farms Way as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater, running easterly from South Street for a distance of 700 feet more or less, including cul-de-sac, all as shown on a Plan of Land in Bridgewater, MA prepared for Robert Todd, dated February 28, 1985, Scale 1"=50' Brant S. Haworth Associates, Civil Engineers and Land Surveyors, Taunton, MA on file with the office of the Town Clerk.

**Article 28.** It was voted that the Town accept Vera Drive as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater, running easterly from Conant Street for a distance of 860 feet more or less including cul-de-sac, all as shown on a Plan entitled, "Vera Estates," definitive subdivision of land in Bridgewater, MA, dated April 4, 1984, Scale 1"=50', Robert D. Sgarzi, C.E. Kingston, MA, on file in the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 29. It was voted that the Town accept Virginia Drive as a public way of the Town of Bridgewater, running southeasterly from Laurel Street for a distance of 620 feet more or less, including cul-de-sac, all as shown on a definitive subdivision Plan of Land, Bridgewater, MA, prepared for John K. Scanlan, dated February 21, 1984, Scale 1"=60', C.A. Pickering Associates, Inc., Civil Engineers Land Surveyors, on file with the office of the Town Clerk.

Article 30. It was voted that this article be withdrawn. (Karlie Lane)

Article 31. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Zoning Map of the Town of Bridgewater by changing from Industrial A to Residential A the easterly side only of Elm Street beginning at the corner of Pleasant and Elm Streets, going in a northerly direction for a distance of 5280 feet (1 mile) ending with the last single family dwelling on Elm Street and to include a setback to reach the border of Residential A, Industrial A and Residential B Zones as indicated on Zoning Map 5 of the Town of Bridgewater. That homes in this area will be allowed to be rebuilt for the life of the Zoning By-Law. These houses are to be built according to building codes in the Town of Bridgewater at that time.

A friendly amendment was made by Gerald Chipman, duly seconded to include the last two sentences of this article.

Article 32. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend its vote under Article 24 of the 1988 Annual Town Meeting establishing a Town Government Study Committee to expand the membership of the said Committee to include two at large members to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

Article 33. It was voted that the Town amend the agreement establishing the Bristol-Plymouth Regional School District Sec. 1 (c) entitled "Elected Members" by striking the existing paragraph and substituting therefor the following:

At the biennial state election, beginning with the year 1990, members of the regional school district committee shall be chosen by the voters in said district in district-wide elections with residency requirements as set forth in Mass. Gen. Laws, C. 71, Sec. 14E, as amended by C. 10 of the Acts of 1988. Each committee member shall serve for a term of two (2) years.

All other requirements of C. 10 of the Acts of 1988 with respect to the appointment of a regional district clerk, filing of nomination papers, etc. shall be as required for district-wide election with residency requirements. The School Committee shall remain with six (6) members, two (2) from Taunton, one (1) each from Bridgewater, Berkley, Middleboro and Raynham.

And further to amend Sec. 1 (E) by striking said Section and substituting the following:

The term of office of any elected member of the Bristol-Plymouth Regional School District Committee shall commence on the first Tuesday of January following the date of his/her election. They shall serve until their respective successors are duly elected and qualified in accordance with the provisions of Massachusetts Law and this agreement.

Promptly upon appointment and qualifications of the members of the School Committee, the Committee shall, on the first Wednesday of January and each year thereafter, organize and choose by ballots, a Chairman, and a Vice Chairman from among its own membership. The Committee shall then fix the time and place for its regular meetings, provide for the calling of special meetings and specify the notice required for each of said meetings. Article 34. As amended by Gerald P. Chipman, Chairman of the Planning Board — Article 34 to read as follows:

It was voted that the Town amend the Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater by inserting as Section 8.5 the following:

"Any land used to satisfy the minimum area requirements for a buildable lot must consist of either 50% nonwetlands (upland) as defined by the Wetlands Protection Act, Section 40 of Chapter 131, M.G.L. or 10,000 square feet of upland, whichever is greater. The minimum area of non-wetland shall comprise a contiguous portion of the lot where any principal building for the site shall be located. A qualified botanist must delineate and flag the wetland on the lot. The wetland line, square footage of upland and the total area of the lot must be indicated on the plan submitted for a building permit"

And by adding Section 8.6 as follows:

"Notwithstanding other setback requirements, no building, except those specifically referred to in Section 8.4 footnote (14), shall be located within 50 feet of Bordering Vegatative Wetland, as defined by Section 40 of Chapter 131, M.G.L. The distance between the building and any wetland boundary which is less than 100 feet away must be indicated on a plan submitted for a building permit."

Article 35. This article was ruled out of order by Robert G. Clark, III. Town Counsel.

Article 36. It was voted that the Town accept a reconveyance of a land easement on Great Hill from the New England Telephone & Telegraph Company together with all improvements thereon.

Article 37. This article was withdrawn. (Yankee Celltell Company)

Article 38. This article was tabled. (Land off Broad Street for conservation purposes)

Article 39. This article was withdrawn. (Revolving account — Building Inspector)

A motion was made and duly seconded to adjourn.

# **PROTECTION FOR THE PEOPLE**

### **Police Department**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Bridgewater:

Motor vehicle accidents continue to dominate our statistics, climbing to an all-time high of 739 in 1988. The new growth in the Town and in the area, along with easy access to Routes 24 and 495, generates a tremendous amount of traffic. Until such time as our department manpower is brought to sufficient strength to enable us to effectively deal with the traffic increase and needed traffic lights are placed at key intersections to regulate traffic, traffic accidents will continue to remain high.

Along with traffic accidents, motor vehicle thefts increased sharply. Many of our statistics remained fairly even.

Raymond Wise, the new Parking Enforcement Officer, was hired in September of 1988 and officially began his new duties in October. In the three month period, October 1, thru December 31, 1988, 1867 parking tickets were issued. 1520 were issued by the Parking Enforcement Officer. He has taken quite a work load off the day officers.

Three new officers were added to our department in 1988. They are Robert Fernandes, Lawrence Bresciani, and Joseph Demoura. They replaced Officers David McGinn, Joseph Rosenfield, and William Sprague, who retired. Our department's strength remains at 1 Chief, 1 Lieutenant, 4 Sergeants, and 24 Patrolmen. This is quite low considering the demographics of our community.

In August of 1988, the Town of Bridgewater and the Boston Police Department signed an agreement allowing the Bridgewater Police Department access to their Mobile Data Terminal System. With funds from the Department of Correction's Infrastructure Grant we have ordered Mobile Data Equipment for our department.

At present, when an officer makes a motor vehicle stop and wishes to run a check on a license, registration, the operator of the vehicle or the vehicle, he must radio certain information to the police dispatcher who enters the info into the Leeps, N.C.I.C. Computer and then has to wait for the reply. When the information is received by the dispatcher he radios the requested information to the officer in the cruiser.

With Mobile Data Equipment, a miniature computer is placed in the cruiser. This computer is connected via radio to the Boston Police Department computer. The officer in the cruiser can access his own information without having to call the dispatcher. This will save valuable time and relieve the dispatcher of a large work load. We hope to be on-line with the new Mobile Data System by the summer of 1989.

In addition to Mobile Data Equipment, the department received the following equipment through the Infrastructure Grant; Two new cruisers, a new van truck has been ordered to replace the older 1983 van, 9mm Sig Sauer Semi-Automatic pistols, replacing the older 357 Magnum revolvers, a new generator to replace the old stand-by generator at the repeater station, a new video camera and night vision device.

Again I must bring to your attention the need for new facilities. We have inadequate parking for police vehicles, employees and the public. Quite often, at the change of the shifts, incoming officers have to park in the street for lack of spaces. We lack space for writing reports, interviewing and interrogations, and in the locker room. Our booking room, as well as our cell block, are inadequate. Our communication room, which is our nerve center, is in dire need of remodeling. It's too small, and to crowded to handle all the calls and work that takes place there.

In closing, I wish to extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to all of the officers and secretarial personnel who have worked hard to provide you with excellent service and protection, and to all of the other Downtown Departments, Boards, and Townspeople who have assisted and supported us throughout the year.

## **Fire Department**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Bridgewater:

The Bridgewater Fire Department, during 1988, experienced a year of continued accomplishments and increased services to the community.

We responded to a total of 3182 incidents during 1988; 1426 medical emergencies, 1231 fire incidences, and 525 calls for general assistance. This was a 3% increase over 1987, and a 19% increase over 1986. The growth of the Town is reflected in our response increases.

The programs planned in 1987 are now in operation. Each officer, in addition to his supervisory responsibility is tasked with at least one additional duty. These areas are Vehicle

Maintenance, Computer Services, Training, Inspectional Services, Emergency Medical Services, Pre-fire Planning, Fire Prevention and Education, and Preventive Maintenance. In addition several Firefighters are assigned additional duties to support the organization.

Fire Prevention and Pre-fire Planning activities are ongoing, and are the areas that, this coming year, will be prioritized for completion. Inspections and certifications of occupancies have increased dramatically and justify the assignment of the Deputy Chief to an administrative schedule. All residential, commercial and industrial construction must be approved by this Department. Continual monitoring is necessary to ensure compliance with Massachusetts General Laws and Fire Regulations.

Personnel have attended, on an on-going basis, training programs conducted by the Massachusetts Firefighting Academy, Federal Emergency Management Agency and Civil Defense. Daily in-service training has been accelerated to improve our state of readiness. During 1989 we will implement the three levels of Firefighter Certification as recommended by NFPA Standards.

Our computer system is now fully operational and proving to be the benefit that we had anticipated. All administrative and operational functions are now readily available. This greatly increases our efficiency and records keeping. We intend to expand our system this year and we did during the past year.

We received through a grant from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, monies to purchase a 1988 pumping engine, an air-respitory system (SCBA) and updated SCBA for our personnel. This amounted to \$170,000.00 for this Department. Through funding from the Boston Edison Company we have replaced approximately 70% of our communications system, updated our existing computer system and obtained various other items to support our operation. These two grants provided us with equipment that would have been unattainable through normal budgeting in such a short time frame.

We express our appreciation to Representative Jacqueline Lewis, the Board of Selectmen, and our own personnel, for their initiatives in these areas. Our appreciation to Mr. Clark Hyder and Robert Patterson, representatives of the Boston Edison Company, who worked with us to see that this Department, at this phase, is properly equipped to meet the emergency guidelines set by the Massachusetts Civil Defense Agency.

My appreciation to all Town Departments, Boards and Committees, the Citizens of Bridgewater, and the personnel of the Fire Department, whose enthusiasm, support and dedication are second to none.

Special thanks to Mr. Frank J. Maher, Executive Secretary, who so readily gave advice and counsel, and always there to assist and encourage.

To you, the Board of Selectmen, appreciation for your understanding and support of this Department.

We pride ourselves in providing vital services to the Town of Bridgewater and recognize our responsibility to protect life and property. To this end we are totally committed and willingly accept the challenge.

#### IN MEMORIUM

On February 20, 1988 the Bridgewater Fire Deprtment was saddened by the passing of Firefighter Charles E. Hathaway, a seventeen year veteran of the Fire Service. He had served in the Air Force during the Vietnam conflict and shortly after discharge was appointed to this Department. He is fondly remembered for his dedication to duty, professionalism and courage under adverse conditions. His comraderie, sense of humor, and concern for his fellow man are traits that all of us strive to emulate. This Annual Report for 1988 is dedicated to Charlie — our friend and brother.

The Building Inspector is responsible for overseeing conformance with the State Building Code and the Zoning Bylaws of the Town within the 28 square miles comprising Bridgewater. His office is located on the second floor of the Academy Building, sharing a large room with the Town Engineer, Planning Board, and Plumbing and Gas Inspector Departments. The Department has a total staff of two: The Building Inspector and a Principal Clerk.

As the above statistics show, 1988 was another active year for the Building Department. New single family dwellings were the focal point of the year, increasing by 40% over the previous year. Duplex construction dropped by 14%. Permits were issued for the last five 4-plexes in the Michael's Landing development. High Pond Estates, the Mobile Home Elderly Community off Pond Street, received permits for the first six units, including the sales office. The total of 165 new housing units exceeds the 1987 figures by 44 units.

Despite decreases in most other categories, the listed value of new construction rose by more than \$2,000,000.00 over 1987 values. Occupancy permits rose by 22. Certificates of Inspection remained the same, while stove permits increased by 11. Demand for stove permits increases as oil prices escalate.

In addition, each day is filled with requests from attorneys, real estate agents, potential developers, and homeowners, either seeking advice and interpretation or demanding enforcement. Assistance from the Town Law Department is sought for the most complex matters, but the majority of cases are handled by the Building Department staff. More than 50 cases were referred to the Zoning Appeals Board for hearings.

The future of the Building Inspector Department appears to be a very active one, in view of the proposed new shopping mall development, other commercial and industrial projects, and continued residential growth. As many townspeople are aware, the demands for services being placed on the Building Department have greatly outpaced the ability of its two dedicated employees to provide them, despite closing the office to the public on Wednesday afternoons for paperwork. Therefore, the Department is requesting a parttime Assistant Building Inspector and a part-time Senior Clerk to alleviate the backlog of present work and to assist in coping with what the future brings. The proposed restructuring of the present fee schedule in effect since 1981 should help to defray a sizable portion of the additional costs while bringing our fees closer to those charged by other towns.

In addition, the former "Lakeside Corporate Center" which was being developed by McNeil & Associates, is currently being developed as a shopping mall by the new owners of the property on Route 104 at Lake Nippenicket.

I was given the opportunity to inspect a similar shopping mall currently under construction in North Attleboro and came away with the feeling that if a similar mall was constructed in Bridgewater, it would be one of the best things that has happened in years in our Town. This office will be working, along with all other departments and boards, to ensure that this project becomes a reality.

At the same time, considerable time was spent on another "plus" project for the Town; namely, the Bridgewater Medical Center located off Bedford Street. Funding for this building is through the Conant Trust Fund; ground has been broken, foundations are in place, utility services have been started and completion is anticipated later this year.

This office has been involved with other Boards and Departments in various projects throughout 1988, and has enjoyed the splendid cooperation offered by all of them.

My thanks to all who have gone out of their way to assist me during the year.

### Office of Planning and Community Development

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Bridgewater:

During 1988, the Office of Planning and Community Development (OPCD) continued to belactive in the development of land use plans, grantwriting and matters involving zoning and subdivision control.

In addition to routinely assisting the Planning Board in the review of subdivision plans, the OPCD became principally involved in major development and regulatory proposals. Between January and April, the OPCD worked closely with the applicants of the Lakeside Corporate Center, McNeil and Associates, in formulating measures for mitigating potential impacts posed by the one million square foot industrial park. As a result, a comprehensive special permit decision was prepared for recommendation to the Planning Board that stipulated numerous infrastructural improvements, a site plan approval process and conditions upon the type and intensity of uses within the development. Recent proposals for a regional shopping mall on the site will equally necessitate careful evaluation of traffic congestion, public service demands, environmental impacts and affects on local economic conditions, especially within the downtown area.

The most significant change in local zoning occurred with the passage of the aquifer protection by-law at the Annual Town Meeting. The by-law created overlay districts around the High Street and Carver Pond wells in which uses potentially detrimental to the public drinking water supply were restricted. Recommendations were likewise offered on other major zoning articles presented at the November Town Meeting such as those dealing with solid waste disposal, wetland protection and upzoning of industrial land.

A draft was also completed in June for the Town's Open Space Plan. The plan indicated the need of protecting, if not otherwise acquiring, an additional 290 acres of conservation and recreation lands within Bridgewater over the next five years. Methods of serving this need were identified including sources for state and federal funding, use of conservation restrictions, establishment of a community land trust, regulations to protect environmentally sensitive lands and alternative forms of development that allow for the preservation of open space.

In addition, over \$730,000 in funding requests were prepared by the OPCD to the Massachusetts Small Cities, Strategic Planning and Municipal Advance programs. Such funding was sought to support the construction of the Bridgewater Senior Center, the preparation of a growth management plan and affordable housing efforts within the community.

Other activities during the past year involved preparation of an emergency response plan for accidents involving hazardous materials as well as production of new zoning, precinct and base maps for Bridgewater.

# **Plumbing and Gas Inspector**

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1988.

During 1988, the Plumbing & Gas Inspector Departments issued a total of 541 permits; 354 plumbing permits and 187 gas permits.

Compared with 1987 figures, the number of plumbing permits increased by 13% and the number of gas permits increased by 15%.

Since the continued growth in new housing construction is responsible for much of the plumbing and gas permit increases (building permits for housing units increased 36%), I anticipate an even busier year in 1989.

To insure that all work conforms to applicable Massachusetts codes, each project is inspected by the Plumbing & Gas Inspector. All work must be performed by licensed plumbers and gasfitters, who must file their application for permits at the Building & Engineering Office in the Academy Building.

My thanks for the cooperation of all Town Departments.

### **Civil Defense**

The year 1988 was a year of some turmoil, due to several factors. There was a disastrous fire at the surplus property warehouse in Taunton. It has now been refurbished and restocked in another building.

In addition, the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was moved from upstairs in the Academy Building to the new facility in the basement. Equipment is being installed as it arrives. Already installed is an entirely new telephone system was well as a FAX machine in the Civil Defense Office. The new EOC was completed by Boston Edison Company at no cost to the Town. This new location has an estimated Protection Factor (PF) of 93%.

Training seminars are constantly in progress and will continue until all Civil Defense and Emergency personnel are properly trained and equipped to act should any natural or man-made emergencies occur.

The year 1989 should be much improved due to the training and new equipment provided by Boston Edison Company.

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# FACILITIES FOR THE PEOPLE

# **Highway Department**

As Superintendent of Streets, I am pleased to present the 1988 Annual Report to the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Bridgewater for review.

The Highway Department is responsible for maintenance and improvements to our roadway network, which now encompasses nearly 170 road miles. Preventive road maintenance is critical because if maintenance is deferred to a later date, the cost becomes greater. Also, each year as new streets are accepted by the Town, our work load increases.

The Highway Department has been located on Spring Street since the 1940's. The original one room building is still in use, and has been expanded in piece-meal fashion over the years to the existing facility which is inadequate and overcrowded.

There are currently nineteen employees including the Superintendent, Deputy, Foreman, Clerk/Dispatcher, Mechanic; Leadman, (3) Heavy Equipment Operators, and (1) Laborer/Light Equipment Operators. The Superintendent and Deputy are resonsible for administration and management.

Unlike most Town Highway Departments, the Superintendent and Deputy perform all planning and engineering for capital improvement projects. The work force is talented and able to execute construction work that would otherwise be contracted out to a private firm. For example, we install drainage systems and perform preparation work for resurfacing projects. By acting as general contractor for major projects and hiring sub-contractors for specialty items only, we are able to save the Town tens of thousands of dollars each year on these essential projects. Other duties of the Superintendent and Deputy include review and inspection of new sub-divisions and large scale commercial developments for the Planning Board, pursuit of state and federal grants, development of by-laws and regulations to protect the Town's future interests, and advice and recommendations concerning the Town Ways to the Board of Selectmen and other Town Boards.

Typical services performed by the Department include snow and ice control, street sweeping, drainage system cleaning, patching of potholes, roadside mowing and trimming of brush, flood control and dam maintenance, and repair of regulatory and informational signs.

Burrill Avenue was reconstructed by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works. The Town paid for the design and engineering of the project which is necessary to expedite certain state projects.

The Town also reconstructed a sidewalk on School Street. The Main Street Revitalization project, funded through the Public Works Economic Development (PWED) program, was completed. Roadside trees were planted. Pending further available PWED funds, the project will be completed in its entirety to the West Bridgewater town line. Elm Street is our next target for a PWED grant when funding becomes available through the state.

Equipment currently consists of 7 dump trucks with plows and sanders, 3 dump trucks with plows only, a front-end loader, backhoe, catch basin cleaner, 2 street sweepers, sand screening plant, 2 sidewalk plows, air compressor, 2 pickup trucks, and various support equipment such as pumps, sprayers, hand tools, etc. As the Town grows and expands, the Highway Department continues to fall further behind in men, equipment and facilities. For example, we now have just seven sanding routes and vehicles to cover the entire Town in snow and ice emergencies. In actuality, we should have eight or more sanding vehicles for our existing road network.

A new garage capable of accommodating current and future expansion is desperately needed. The new facility should have necessary safety features now lacking such as welding room, oil and chemical storage room, vehicle lift bay, painting and wash bay, employee locker room, and drafting and plan filing room. Salt storage sheds, covered material bins, and general yard storage space is also needed.

The future outlook for the Highway Department is bleak unless a new facility is provided by the Town. Our work force and vehicle fleet should also be expanded to keep pace with growth of the Town. More importantly, as the Town accepts new streets and as the demands of our population grow, so should our capital improvements, preventive maintenance programs, equipment, and work force as reflected in our annual budget request.

I would like to express my sincere thanks to my entire staff at the Highway Department. Without their hard work, our accomplishments would be few.

I would also like to extend my sincere thanks and appreciation to the Board of Selectmen, all other Boards, departments, committees and commissions for all their help and cooperation over the past year.

In closing, I would like to thank Deputy Superintendent Andrew Bagas for his invaluable help throughout the year. His tireless approach to administrative and management duties have eased my burden considerably. Foreman Antone Almeida deserves special thanks for his dedication. Also, I wish to welcome our new Clerk/Dispatcher, Lorraine Levy, with whom I am very pleased.

# **Forestry Department**

### Dutch Elm and Insect Pest — Annual Report

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and to the Citizens of Bridgewater, I am pleased to submit the Forestry Department Annual Report.

The Insect Pest and Dutch Elm Departments combined together are the budgets under which the Forestry Department operates. The Forestry Department maintains trees located along public ways and on other Town owned property. Also, the Department controls insect pests that effect all trees within Town or that pose a health hazard to the public.

The Forestry Department has evolved from a branch of the Highway Department with one full time employee to a separate department with its own budget. The Forestry Department has grown over the past four decades to three full time Tree Climbers. Budget administration and day to day management of the Department is performed by the Insect Pest and Dutch Elm Superintendent.

Services provided year round by the Forestry Department include trimming of roadside brush and vegetation, removal of diseased and hazardous trees, planting of replacement trees, care and management of a tree nursery, mosquito control, poison ivy control, and bee and wasp removal. During winter months assistance is provided as needed to the Highway Department for snow and ice removal as well as for other emergency situations throughout the year.

During 1988, the Forestry Department acquired a new brush disk chipper to replace the 1967 Wayne Chipper. The new chipper is capable of chipping 12" diameter trees and is quick and efficient for our needs. Most importantly, it is safer to operate than the older model.

Other equipment includes a small dump truck, pickup truck, mosquito fogger, portable sprayer, chain saws, and hand tools. The Forestry is housed at the already overcrowded Highway Department garage.

The future outlook is for expansion of the working force to keep pace with growth of the Town. To improve services to the Town, an aerial lift bucket truck is needed. An operating facility with adequate storage and maintenance space is desperately needed.

# **Board of Library Trustees**

Thank you to the Friends of the Library for their assistance and support during the year. We are particularly indebted to Mariellen Smith, President of the Friends of the Library from June of 1986 to May of 1988. Also we are grateful to Kenneth Moore for volunteering countless hours of services in the Library's Historical Room. Thank you as well to the Bridgewater Garden Club for continuing to brighten the Library with floral arrangements throughout the year, as well as decorating the Library for the Christmas season. We deeply appreciate the assistance of the Bridgewater Fire Department for instructing and advising the Library staff on emergency procedures.

# **Public Library Director**

Significant increases in all areas of service to the public, coupled with major improvements in the provision of information by the use of new technology, made 1988 a very rewarding and challenging year for the Public Library.

Perhaps the most dramatic change in the Library has occurred at the circulation desk. On December 14th, the Library culminated four years of preparation by beginning to loan books on the automated computer system: ABLE (Automated Bristol Library Exchange).

In the summer and late fall, the Library participated in two projects funded by the Eastern Massachusetts Regional Library System and the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners to enhance the quality of reference service through the use of modern, up-to-date technologies. A computer workstation equipped with a compact disc player, modem and printer was installed. Major advantages of CD-ROM technology are the currency of information and the saving of shelf space. One compact disc holds the equivalent of approximately 20 large bound volumes of information. A telefacsimile machine was installed for the rapid delivery of periodicals from Boston Public Library to our Library. If Boston has the article in its collection, it can be transmitted to the Library in a matter of minutes. The following statistics clearly show the increase in all areas of library service for 1988.

- increased the number of bibliographic records available to library users by 257% through use of the ABLE system.
- filled 50 requests for periodical articles by telefacsimilie transmission from the Boston Public Library during the last guarter of 1988.
- responded to 7,914 requests for information, an increase of 431% since 1980.
- loaned a total of 147,882 items to the public, a 13% increase from 1987.
- loaned 135,459 books, a 12% increase from 1987.
- Ioaned 321 compact discs.
- loaned 4,565 videocassettes.
- loaned 1,440 phonograph records.
- issued 3,221 library cards, an increase of 7% from 1987.
- handled 23,996 interlibrary loan requests, an 8% increase from 1987.
- presented 463 programs for children which were attended by 11,196 people, a 14% increase from 1987.
- held 113 pre-school storyhours which were attended by a total of 2,541 people
- presented 15 Saturday and evening programs for children and their families.
- attracted 729 people to 44 children's film programs.
- hosted 234 visits from public and private school classes for a total of 5,365 children.
- entered 238 children in a Summer Reading program in which 2,482 books were read.
- added 6,991 items to the Library's collection.

### **Sewer Department**

This year the Sewer Department has been extremely busy with the construction of the new sewer treatment plant, which is, at the time of this writing approximatley 80% completed. Throughout the construction, the existing plant has had to remain in full operation and meet all Federal & State regulations. This has required a great deal of expertise on behalf of the plant operators and for this we commend them for their extra efforts.

The sewer moratorium which was imposed in 1973 will be lifted upon completion of the new treatment plant.

In the College Park area we installed a sewer lift pumping station to service the sewer mains that were installed last year.

In December, 1988 the first segment of the sewer main for the Conant Medical Center was installed. This main is being funded by the Conant Medical Fund, and is designed to include a new school and a senior citizen center on the Mello Farm property.

On December 31, 1988 Sewer Superintendent Robert E. Bois retired after 34 years of employment with the Town. He will be sadly missed by this department. Edward J. Smith an employee of eighteen years has been appointed to assume his responsibilities.

We would like to express our thanks and appreciation for the cooperation of all Town departments, our plant operators and our office personnel.

### Trustees for Plymouth County Cooperative Extension

Cooperative Extension is located on High Street, Hanson (on the grounds of the County Hospital). Cooperative Extension is a partnership of the United States Department of Agriculture, the land-grant college — the University of Massachusetts, Amherst and county government. It is a nationwide informal educational program.

County Agents are specialists in programs targeted to Agriculture, Communities, families and 4-H youth.

Staff consists of a director, two regional agricultural specialists, a community resource development specialist, two home economists, three 4-H agents and a split position, 4-H/home horticulture. In addition, Cooperative Extension administers a federally funded nutrition education program, The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program (E.F.N.E.P.), located in Brockton. This is staffed by a nutrition specialist and program assistants (5 full-time equivalents) who deliver the educational program to families with limited resources.

Cooperative Extension agents serve the public through planning and conducting educational conferences, workshops, phone call assistance, field visits and timely newsletters.

In our 4-H program last year 7,006 youth were enrolled, of that number 493 were enrolled in club programs, and 6,513 were exposed to 4-H through short-term projects. 560 volunteers assisted in conducting the county 4-H program.

Newsletters, free for the asking, are *Garden Clippings*, a monthly horticulture fact-filled publication; *So-Sew*, informational "how-to" letter for the serious home sewing; *Creative Living*, provides current information in the areas of clothing and textiles, human development, housing and home management. Newsletters for commercial agricultural enterprises are available (Small Fruit, Vegetables, Tree Fruits, Small Farms and Livestock).

During this past year 10,400 educational publication orders were requested by residents. Free soil pH testing was conducted, testing 247 samples. 144 newsletters were prepared and mailed to client groups. Your County Cooperative Extension office can be of service to you by calling 293-3541 or 447-5946, Monday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. - 4:30 p.m.

### **FUNDING STATUS REPORT**

In 11 out of 14 Massachusetts counties during the past 5 years, funding was changed from county based funding to a state allocation under the University of Massachusetts. Since 1914 counties had been the primary supporter of this program, with limited state and federal contributions. This model of major contribution by counties was only done in one other state, New York. Feeling that local budget control was working, the 3 southeast counties in Massachusetts, Barnstable, Bristol and Plymouth chose not to transfer their budgets to the state until such time as it was deemed necessary by county decision-makers. This year we were informed we should attempt a transfer.

Cooperative Extension felt the pinch when it was juggled during a difficult budget year for state and county. Over 24,000 petition signatures were obtained by 4-H'ers, clients, and residents concerned on the possible loss of our service. Ultimately, we were funded until June 30, 1989 by Plymouth County government, with plans by the state to assume funding starting next fiscal year.

My sincere thanks to friends, supporters, town officials and legislators for assisting us during these difficult budget negotiations and speaking out on our behalf through the media, letters, cables and calls to key decision-makers.

# **Zoning Appeals Board**

To the voters and taxpayers of the Town of Bridgewater the Zoning Appeals Board submits the following report of its activities during the calendar year 1988.

The Board conducted a total of seventy (70) hearings including continuances. Relief requested from the Board included requirements concerning frontage, setbacks, area and uses. The Board granted twenty-one (21) variances for the above. In addition the Board granted twenty (20) Special Permits as provided by the by-law covering a variety of uses. The remaining hearings resulted in denials of the relief requested.

During the past year, the Board held hearings dealing with a request for a Comprehensive Permit by Bridgewater Crossing under the provisions of the so-called "Snob Zoning" Act. The Board held six public meetings dealing with this application, which took approximately fifteen hours of time of each member. The requested Comprehensive Permit was denied and the matter is now under appeal before the Housing Committee of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

The Board also had three separate and distinct hearings concerning variances and Special Permits for the former Cooperative Shoe Factory on Spring Street. Different types of uses and mixed uses were proposed. The third proposal was granted which provides for commercial uses that are consistent with the intent and purpose of the zoning by-law.

With the continued growth of the Town, and increased building activity, it is expected that there will be a continued increase in the activities before the Zoning Appeals Board.

# **Conservation Commission**

1988 has been the busiest year in the history of the Board, with over 64 individual Project Notice of Intent filings and many requests for on-site inspections of wetlands areas. Due to this tremendous increase in growth, the Commission has been meeting from three to four times per month. We also expanded the hours of the part-time Conservation Agent, Mr. Wyatt Moor, and the part-time Secretary, Mrs. Pauline Grenier.

The Conservation Commission's primary duties are the protection of the Town's wetlands under Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act — General Law Chapter 131 Section 40. The remaining wetlands in Bridgewater provide our only source of drinking water and filter out contamination from road runoff, as well as provide natural flood storage.

Attempting to protect these wetlands at a time when our Town is undergoing an unprecedented building boom, has

been a most difficult task. The supply of non-wetland, or upland lots has diminished to a point where practically every new subdivision has proposed wetlands alteration. In order to regulate this increased growth, and preserve our natural resources, we have established a new set of guidelines, as well as active lines of communication with other Town boards and the general public.

In addition to the Commission's enforcement of the Wetlands Protection Act, we have expanded our activities into other conservation related areas. Under the guidance of our agent, we developed an Aquifer Protection District Zoning By-law which is designed to protect our drinking water supply from contamination. This by-law was approved and implemented in the Spring of 1988.

This year the Conservation Commission received a small contract from the Massachusetts Department of Fisheries, Wildlife, and Environmental Law — Riverways Program to conduct an initial study of the Town and Taunton Rivers in Bridgewater. Some of this money was used to purchase aerial photographs of the Rivers and their associated wetland systms. The Commission also joined the Adopt-A-Stream Program sponsored by the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife and organized several river clean-ups.

In the new year, we look forward to expanding Bridgewater residents' awareness of conservation issues and the importance of wetlands through educational programs for both the general public and for use in the school system.

# Industrial Development Commission

The Industrial Development Commission continues to receive reports from Bridgewater Energy Center on the progress being made toward founding an industrial park and a waste-to-energy co-generation plant on land adjacent to Massachusetts Correctional Institution. Final plans are being refined for an indepth presentation before a public hearing sometime in February or March of 1989.

The IDC has been charged with developing economic marketing strategies for the Town of Bridgewater. In that regard the IDC enlisted the aid of Management Science Department of Bridgewater State College to develop a broad demographic study of Bridgewater.

Assistance in this program was also requested from Metro South Chamber of Commerce and Plymouth County Development Council. Responses from these organizations have been most cooperative.

These studies when complete will be an estimate of future economic possibilities based on current trends. These studies will serve as an advantage in developing plans to seek desired corporate, business and commercial neighbors who will be able to broaden the Town's tax base.

This analytic endeavor should be complete and submitted to the Town for approval sometime in May, 1989.

# **Historical Commission**

The focus of the Historical Commission for the year 1988 was on the establishment of short- and long-range goals relative to our responsibilities. This report emphasizes a few of them.

- The need to record the histories of the many ethnic groups which made up the composition of Bridgewater in the period from the latter half of the nineteenth through the early decades of the twentieth century.

- The need for our public bodies to pay more attention to the protection of records and of gifts given to the Town for public benefit. We have completed an inventory of gifts to the Memorial Public Library Museum (Indian artifacts. Revolutionary and Civil War memorabilia included) to ascertain what happened to this priceless heritage at the time the Memorial Building was abandoned and present Library Building established.
- Need for restoration and care of the old abandoned cemeteries (especially Great Woods Cemetery at the State Farm) out of respect for those interred there.
- Copies were made of the Bridgewater Comprehensive Historic Resources Survey by Edward W. Gordon, Townscape Institute, one copy given to the Public Library and one copy for the permanent file of the Town Clerk's Office. The Public now has an opportunity to review the survey of homes and buildings and recommended historical districts.

One vacancy exists due to the resignation of Robert Dillman who gave dedicated service to the Town as a member of our Commission, J. Kenneth Moore, a member of the original Commission, was appointed to a second vacancy that existed.

# **Old Colony Planning Council**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Bridgewater.

As your representative to the Old Colony Planning Council, I am pleased to present this report of the activities of the Council for 1988.

During the year, the Council moved into its new office quarters located in the historic Brockton Edison Electric Illuminating Power Station building, located at 70 School Street in Brockton, MA. The facility will serve as the permanent home of the Council and enable the Council to provide more efficient services to its member communities. An Open House was held in early September for local and state officials to mark the event and visitors are welcome to view the restored building.

The program activities of the Council in 1988 were again concentrated on three major areas: Community and Economic Development; Transportation and Transit Planning; and, Elder Services Planning as the Area Agency on Aging. Council funding during the year increased slightly over the 1987 level due largely to additional financial support from the State Department of Elder Affairs for administering the Nursing Home Ombudsman Program in the region. State budget difficulties this year resulted in the termination of Regional Planning Agency grant funds used by the Council to address issues of regional concern. The Council is hopeful that this source of funding will be restored in the FY 1990 budget.

Housing production in the Old Colony region slowed during the year, but several major commercial developments were proposed or advanced in 1988 demonstrating a healthy area economy. Prospects for 1989 appear optimistic since indications from an OCPC study completed during the year show that the area has been reasonably successful in attracting growth firms.

In 1988, the Council proposed a Memorandum of Agreement by and among the communities of the Old Colony Planning Council which would establish a regional review process for developments having a regional impact. The process would give communities the opportunity to comment on proposed developments in neighboring communities that they would be impacted by although they do not have jurisdiction in granting approval to the project. It would establish an advisory, non-binding review process to assist local decision-making authorities in the review of major development proposals. The proposal has been generally well received and the Council is requesting local approval through town meeting action in 1989.

Specific technical assistance to Bridgewater in 1988 included:

- Strategic Planning Grant Preparation
- Traffic Counts
- Transportation Technical Assistance

The Council gratefully acknowledges the generous support and cooperation of its member communities, the participation and involvement of members of the Joint Transportation Committee chaired by Mr. John Yaney; the Overall Economic Development Committee chaired by Mr. Joseph Joseph; and, the Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee chaired by Ms. Barbara Farnsworth. The Council also recognizes the work of local boards and commissions and the many government agencies, public and private institutions and individuals who have assisted the Council.

### Bridgewater Ironworks Study Committee

The charge of this group was to find a way to preserve the site of Bridgewater's once great iron industry. At the same time it was given that due to budgetary restrictions this must be done at little or no cost to the Town.

An historic district package was approved by the voters at the Annual Town Meeting in June. Negotiations were begun with the owners and the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Management Bay Circuit Greenbelt, to secure funding for a partial acquisition of the site.

In October we were informed that the historic district had been rejected by the state on a technicality. Although the project had won the support of the state we received word that all funds were frozen for the next year.

In December the Stanley Tool Company of Connecticut, former owner of the plant, presented the Town with an excellent painting of the property circa 1900. The coming year will be one of continued efforts in seeking new avenues to reach our goal.

# RECREATION

### **Recreation Commission**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Bridgewater.

In 1967 Chairman Gino C. Guasconi of the three member Playground Commission reported to Henry L. Cormier, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen in that year, concerning the continuing improvements being made including installing a merry-go-round in the children's play area, painting the Little League Field House, diverting a brook and obtaining fill to expand the area behind the Little League Field and obtaining a portable power mower so that work can be done at Scotland Field and other outside areas.

In the 22 years since that report, our Commission has grown to five members with Gino's daughter, Gina, as the chairperson and meets every first Monday of the month at the Upper Town Hall Building. All residents of the Town are welcomed and encouraged to attend our open meetings.

Several special meetings were convened during the year for in-depth work sessions for the Summer Youth and Swim Programs. 1988 was the first year that Harry Lehman did not direct the Swim Program at the State College. The program was not initially recommended for funding by the Finance Committee in their budget because of rumors that the college pool would be closed for maintenance. By special vote at the Annual Town Meeting, funding was approved to continue the program. Attendance increased from approximately 1,000 children and adults participating in 1987 to over 1,300. Several American Red Cross certificates were awarded to beginners, advanced beginners, intermediates, and swimmer categories. Again there was an increase in participation of children (ages 5-12) in the Summer Youth Program which included arts and crafts, weekly bowling and library trips, guest entertainment, and other field trips. For the second year in a row an added counselor was included on the staff.

With the continued grant support of the Arts Council, the Recreation Commission continued its Summer Band Program with Concerts on the Common. Legion Field, Scotland Field and the "Nip" Boat Ramp recreational facilities continued to be used to their fullest extent.

At its December 19, 1988 meeting, the Board of Selectmen made appointments from the Recreation Commission to the Chaffee Farm Ad Hoc Golf Study Committee: David Cox (Steering Sub-Committee); Thomas Arrighi (Land Use Development Sub-Committee); and James Campbell (Financial Sub-Committee) to work for a Bridgewater Community Golf Course.

This new year promises to be a very progressive one for the Recreation Commission. We hope to establish an Enterprise Fund for the Commission so that profits from sponsored functions can be returned directly to our account rather than the general revenue. We hope to establish a Golf Driving Range as an interim activity before establishment of the Community Golf Course. We look forward to the establishment of a Friends of the Bridgewater Recreation Commission organization and their support to enable us to attain worthwhile goals.

In closing the Bridgewater Recreation Commission would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and the many other Town officials who have given us valuable assistance throughout the year.

# **Council on Aging**

The Council meets on the second Thursday of each month at 7:00 P.M.; all are welcome to attend. Special meetings are called at the discretion of the Chairperson. All residents of the Town are urged to visit and become familiar with the on-going functions and services offered to the elderly by the Town. They are many and all encompassing. The Director of Elder Affairs, Mrs. Florence C. Henrickson and her Secretary, Mrs. Carla Medeiros, are available at the office during the hours of 8 A.M. to 4 P.M. daily, Monday through Friday. A telephone machine is available for offhour messages, 697-8618, the same number as used during office hours.

The function of the Council on Aging is one of consultation and advisement with the Director of Elder Affairs, Mrs. Henrickson; in service to the elderly, which encompasses everything from organized social daytime activities to group bus tours; individual transportation needs; personal requirements of broad dimensions; legal matters, etc. The ultimate goal is that the elderly members of the Town know that they are not alone but are the sincere concern of the society in which they live. # **Office of Elder Affairs**

1988 produced a year of great expectations and disappointments mingled with highs and lows. This office is the Administration Office for the Council On Aging Board. Located on a second floor is unfortunate for elders. Six locations for, normal operations is not advantageous. Our function is to serve the elders. Statistics are only a portion of our work . . . The Director wrote a grant that provided an office copier (\$4,633.00). The second grant (\$5,000.00) provided a part time Outreach Worker position . . . The director helped to write a grant (with West Bridgewater as a consortium) for the purpose of creating a Social Day Care Center for our elderly. The director also looked into joining a ten town consortium for the purpose of "Serving Health Information Needs of Elders." In another development we will soon have the Geriatric Mental Health Program available.

We were happy to become involved with The Student Internship Program, offered through the University of Massachusetts. Miss Debra Barnard was our first graduate student.

The Director paid her way to the National Council On Aging Conference in Washington, D.C. in April. Our seniors enjoyed ten special monthly trips this past year. Our Senior Day Banquet seated 300 seniors, who enjoyed a marvelous dinner, entertainment, bake sale, prizes, and socialization. The Senior Christmas Party was fun with games, drawings, music, door prize and a beautiful refreshment table.

### **Veterans' Services**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

The Department of Veterans' Services for the Town is located in the Academy Building and is open daily from 8 A.M. to 4 P.M. All veterans are welcome to call or stop by if they have any question or problem regarding Veterans' Affairs.

The primary purpose of the department is to provide assistance to veterans under the provisions of Chapter 115, of the General Laws. This service includes support and medical care while seeking other benefits to which the veteran and his family are entitled.

A new group of designated veterans is the Merchant Marine seamen who served from December 7, 1941 to August 15, 1945. They are thereby eligible to apply for V.A. benefits, Civil Service, crew members aboard U.S. Army and Naval Transport are also eligible. This office has had the privilege of assisting applicants and will continue to do so. Eligibility has to be determined on a case to case basis.

Bridgewater State College offers educational opportunities at the college level for veterans. The Veterans Affairs Office at the college is staffed with well trained and supportive personnel. The non-contributory G.I. Bill (V.N. Era) under Chapter 34 ends December 31, 1989 and it would be wise for any eligible veteran to apply without delay and not let this opportunity pass. A new "G.I. Bill" provides benefits to servicemen active, reserve force and National Guard who joined the armed forces since 1985.

# Self Help Incorporated

Self Help, Inc., is greater Brockton's and Attleboro's antipoverty agency dedicated to improving the quality of life of limited income individuals and families, and making all segments of the community responsive to the needs of the limited income, disadvantaged and minority.

During the program year ending September 30, 1988, Self Help received a total funding of \$11.5M and provided 492,328 direct services to the area's limited income individuals and families.

1,801 residents received 24,272 direct services totaling \$327,121 during the program year.

The total funding of \$11,438,433 does not tell the real value of human services delivered to the area as a whole. Self Help's funding enabled us to mobilize an additional \$1,190,466 of other community resources such as Commonwealth Service Corp. and local cities and towns contributions as well as volunteers. The gross volume of Self Help during the past program year was approximately \$12.9 million.

Self Help currently employs 250 individuals, many of whom are limited income and minorities.

We feel that the program year 10/1/87 to 9/30/88 was a successful one for Self Help, Inc., and very helpful to our limited income population. We thank the area's Mayors, Boards of Selectmen, town volunteers and your representative to our Board of Directors, Mr. Donald Shurtleff for helping to make our program year a success.

This, my fifth and final report as Superintendent-Headmaster, is submitted for your consideration. It was compiled by reviewing the minutes of the School Committee from January to December, 1988, Also reviewed were the annual reports submitted by the administrators and department heads. All reports are available for review in the office of the Superintendent-Headmaster.

Three hundred and thirteen members of the senior class participated in the June, 1988 graduation exercises. Seventyfive percent of the class continued education beyond high school.

In September, 1988, the school welcomed exchange students Alfonso Musitu from the Canary Islands and Martin Olsson from Sweden,

The October 1, 1988 enrollment was 1,303 pupils, up from the previous year's enrollment of 1,295.

The school district was informed in October of 1988 that four members of the senior class had been commended in the 1989 National Merit Scholarship Program.

In the athletic program, our girls' soccer, boys' soccer, girls' basketball, baseball, field hockey and girls' cross country teams earned championships in the Old Colony League.

Curriculum articulation meetings were held during the school year at the Regional High school with members of the regional faculty and their colleagues from the Raynham Public Schools and the Bridgewater Public Schools.

Please permit me to express my thanks and appreciation to the members of the Bridgwater-Raynham Regional comunity for their assistance and support over the years. Bridgewater-Raynham Regional is a school in which the citizens of our two communities can take much pride.

Parents are alerted to the fact that occasionally, because of severe weather or other emergency conditions, school may be dismissed during the day.

It is impossible for the School Department to notify the parents of over 2,200 children prior to an emergency dismissal. Therefore, we suggest that parents work out plans with friends or relatives to care for their children in anticipation of such emergency dismissals.

This report, which is the thirteenth that I have authored as the Superintendent of Schools, will be especially brief because of the limitations necessitated as a result of significantly increased printing expenses. Detailed reports submitted by the directors and principals are available in this office for further review.

Calendar year 1988 can certainly be described as very exciting, demanding, and challenging. The space limitations prevent a more specific description of all the significant activities. The major developments during the past twelve months have been:

- a. the rezoning of the school system which certainly attracted a great deal of notoriety, but when implemented proved to be a successful assimilation of all pupils in a genuinely acceptable manner.
- the rental of the St. Thomas Aquinas Parish Center thereby greatly alleviating overcrowded conditions in the other school facilities.
- c. the favorable conclusion of a new three-year collective bargaining agreement with the Teachers' Association.
- d. the establishment and recognition of a system wide parent group.
- e. the continued efforts to maintain and improve curriculum.

In conclusion, it is especially noteworthy this year that the dedication and energy of the staff of the Bridgewater Public Schools be recognized in this report. Their untiring efforts and extra time contributed to a very successful year. I would be remiss if I did not make note of the retirement of two teachers, Jane Dunn and Patricia Dooley, who retired after a combined twenty-nine years of service and the two members of my staff, Anne Norkawski and Ann Chruniak, who served a combined forty-five years.

The 1988 school year at Bristol-Plymouth was another successful one. This success was due to a great extent from the support of the city and towns which represent the district. The school, as usual, operated with an enrollment of 740 high school students. This is consistent with other years at Bristol-Plymouth.

Sixty-nine percent of the senior class participated in the cooperative program at the school and ninety-four percent of our graduates were placed in a job situation at the conclusion of their educational requirements.

The school continues to receive extensive support from the Division of Occupational Education and the total budget was reduced by \$3,390,451. from money received from the

State reimbursement. This has been of great value in maintaining the high standards of the school.

The School Committee authorized a Horticultural Program to be instituted at the school. A greenhouse was purchased and an instructor hired using Federal monies which funded the project. Also, the school received federal funding to hire an equity counselor in an attempt to increase the minority and female population.

Eighty-nine percent of the senjor class had successful coop work experience. Nine of the fourteen shops had 100% placement of their students in either immediate related work situations or extended education in their chosen occupation.

The parents of Bristol-Plymouth students should be recognized for their untiring efforts and cooperation in supporting the progress of the school. They, the members of the Advisory Board, School Committee and interested citizens of the community make Bristol-Plymouth an outstanding vocational high school in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

## **Bridgewater State College**

Dr. Robert J. Dillman was Acting President at the beginning of 1988, and was succeeded in August as Acting President by President-Emeritus Dr. Adrian Rondileau, who was asked by the Board of Trustees to return to the campus following Dr. Dillman's departure for a college presidency in West Virginia. Dr. Rondileau, who had been President of Bridgewater from 1962 to 1986, will remain as Acting President until July, 1989, when Dr. Adrian Tinsley is scheduled to become the college's tenth president.

Among the highlights of 1988 at Bridgewater State College was the establishment in February of the "Massachusetts Hall of Black Achievement." The first inductees to the Hall, which honors the achievements of Black and Cape Verdean citizens who were natives of the Commonwealth, included early civil rights activist W.E.B. Dubois; Louis Temple, inventor of the toggle harpoon which revolutionized the whaling industry; Charlotte Hawkins, medical pioneer; and abolitionist Frederick Douglass.

In July of 1988 the college received the most substantial gift from a private donor in its history. Mr. Stanton Davis arranged for the Davis Foundation to provide a \$500,000.00 grant to the Bridgewater State College Foundation to help the college improve its ability to raise funds from private sources. We are exceedingly grateful for this very significant gift. In December, Dr. and Mrs. Adrian Rondileau made a \$25,000.00 gift to the Foundation to support the advancement of the Arts, Sciences, and Humanities at the College. Also in 1988 a significant community service — the Bridgewater Arts and Lecture Series, a project of the Bridgewater State College Foundation — continued bringing outstanding lecturers and cultural events to BSC for the enjoyment of the campus and area communities. In the fall of 1988, for example, the series brought famed historian Arthur Schlesinger to the college to discuss his relationship with the late President, John F. Kennedy, and later, in December, the world-renowned Handel and Haydn Society appeared at Bridgewater to perform "The Messiah." In the spring of 1989, entertainer Pearl Bailey and best-selling author Father Andrew Greeley will be appearing.

Construction continued on schedule for two new residence halls, which will open in September, 1989, and house approximately 392 students.

A serious state-wide budget crisis began to have an impact on the college in 1988, and measures were taken to help the school cope with a budget reduction of over \$1.4 million from its appropriation. Among other steps, the college was forced to decline admission to nearly 500 qualified students last September.

We at the college look forward to 1989 with optimism that the budget crisis will be resolved and we look forward to welcoming Dr. Adrian Tinsley as our next President.

# HEALTH

## **Board of Health**

The year 1988 was, as usual, a busy one for the Board of Health.

New and proposed construction in Town is continuing at a high rate as evidenced by the 304 percolation tests performed with \$13,840 received in fees. There were 183 disposal applications approved for new buildings and 33 repairs on existing systems that generated a total of \$6,970 to the Town. \$3,952 was received for various licenses and permits.

A Flu Clinic was held in November and 156 residents were inoculated.

A Rabies Clinic was held in May and 95 dogs received the anti-rabies shot.

In August a new Health Agent, Richard Simmons, was appointed to replace Mrs. Nancy Koska. Nancy elected to resign so as to be with her firstborn child. Nancy served the Board meritoriously for the eleven years she held the position and the Board appreciated and relied on her expertise.

The Town's solid waste disposal problem may have received temporary relief due to the rezoning article passed at the fall Town Meeting. The Town's household rubbish will be disposed of at no cost to the taxpayers for a minimum of three years if the extension into Bridgewater of the present Halifax landfill is approved. It will also provide additional income to the Town from out of town rubbish. It is hoped that a long term solution to the problem will be provided during that three year period by the several proposals that are in the preliminary stage.

## Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Health care, in particular, home health care is headline news these days. Our national leaders have included health care as a major concern. They emphasize delivery of services, long term health needs and seek sources of funds. Catastrophic health care is on the national agenda. The funding is controversial.

Our programs designed to support good health and physical fitness include three daytime clinics, an evening clinic and a well child clinic. With the growing emphasis on physical fitness we are holding annually a Health and Fitness Fair, where we provide screening tests, a health evaluation and many satellite programs related to fitness. These programs are non-reimbursed for residents of Bridgewater. During fiscal year 1987-1988 we have provided the following services:

Community services have included participation in the Health/Fitness Fair, the Fuel Assistance Program and Cancer Screening. Red Cross Certified Baby Sitting Classes have been conducted. In addition monthly health conferences have been held at Hemlock Drive and St. Thomas Aquinas Parish Center and an Evening Health Conference at the Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association Headquarters for the 18 to 60 year old group and those who cannot attend daytime conferences. 339 clients were seen at these various conferences; 144 at the Health/Fitness Fair and 27 children at the Well Child Clinics.

Non-reimbursed services delivered during the fiscal year had a dollar value of \$25,402.00.

Contracts have been made with Home Health and Child Care Services, Inc., Rehabilitation Services, Inc., MA Easter Seal Society, Gilmar Associates, Dupre Nursing Associates, Olsten Health Care Services and James Williston, M.Ed., CCC-SP, for therapists and home health aides; and agreements with North Atlantic Medical Services and VNAMI Care for sick room equipment and supplies.

Clinics... The professional staff and volunteers from the Board of Directors have assisted with the health conferences and clinics for hypertension, lead poisoning, diabetes, glaucoma, influenza and TB Mantoux testing.

Accreditation . . . The Agency is fully certified by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Department of Health.

Administration ... governing the Agency is a volunteer Board of Directors (24) assisted by a volunteer Group of Professional Personnel (17), representing business and professional men and women as well as consumers.

Professional Staff... includes Ann P. Kirkpatrick, BSN, Supervisor/Administrator; and the following registered professional nurses: Jeannette Irving, RN, BS, alternate supervisor and senior nurse, Carol Bowen, RN, MED, Denise Cotter, RN, Diane Glass, BSN and Kathryn Heimerdinger, MSN. Mary Lou Babin serves as secretary and Philip Casey as statistician-billing clerk.

### Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 1988.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of 23 Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the Town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

1988 was a year of significant challenges. Many of the concepts, equipment, and procedures implemented over the last five years were tested by unusual summer heat and record July rainfall. Trap collections of flood-water mosquitoes were at a ten year high across much of New England. In Plymouth County, efforts aimed at immature larval mosquitoes reduced populations significantly. Followup ultra low volume spraying reduced adult populations to tolerable levels in a short time. The technology and procedures that are in place now are far more effective and efficient than those of a decade ago. Special efforts were put forth by the field crews who worked in the excessive heat.

The threat of the mosquito transmitted disease Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) was low in 1988. There was some concern that this season's surge in summer flood-water mosquitoes (Aedes vexans) might result in transmis-

sion of the virus to people, and some additional spraying was done. Virus was recovered from bird feeding mosquitoes, but no horse or human cases occurred. The recurring problem of EEE in Southeastern Massachusetts continues to ensure cooperation between this Project and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health.

Other significant developments including an increase in membership. The Town of Kingston joined the regional project on July 1, and began receiving the same services as other member towns. In addition, our systematic trapping program was expanded in all towns beginning July 1, thereby providing more complete information on which to base control decisions. Finally, a specially designed tracked vehicle has been acquired which makes possible inspections of the more remote and inaccessable areas.

The figures specific to the Town of Bridgewater are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Bridgewater residents.

1. Insecticide Application. 3,424 acres were treated using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in May and the last in September.

Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes, and other standing water areas. Inspections continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. Last year a total of 227 inspections were made to 47 catalogued breeding sites.

1A. Aerial Application. Larviciding woodland swamps by airplane before the leaves come out on the trees, continues to be very effective. In Bridgewater this year we aerially larvicided 560 acres.

Finally, we have been tracking complaint response time, that is the time between notice of mosquito problem and response by one of our inspectors. The complaint response time in the Town of Bridgewater was less than three days.

2. Water management. During 1988, crews removed blockages, brush and other obstructions from 1,300 linear feet of ditches and streams to prevent overflows or stagnation that can result in mosquito breeding. This work together with machine reclamation is most often carried out in the fall and winter.

3. Machine Reclamation. 5,741 linear feet of ditch was reconstructed in Bridgewater using one of the Project's three track driven backhoes.

4. Mosquito Species. Aedes vexans was the dominant mosquito collected in the Bridgewater trap. Other important mosquitoes collected included *Culex pipens* and *Culex restuans*.

We encourage citizens or municipal officials to call our office for information about mosquitoes, mosquito-borne diseases, control practices, or any other matters of concern.

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# **Report of the Board of Assessors**

The year 1988 has seen growth in the Town of Bridgewater. There were 457 building permits in 1988. There are 91 single family dwellings; 24 new duplex dwellings; 5 attached 4 unit single family dwellings; 7 manufactured homes. In commercial buildings, permits were issued for 3 new buildings and 1 industrial accessory building. For the complete breakdown of permits issued refer to the report of the Building Inspector. All the permits will be listed, measured and valued.

The Assessors' Office has a new in-house computer system. All of the changes in property ownership and updating on new construction are now done in the office on the computer by Vincent Damon and Marie Amelotte. The computer was programed by (ACONE) Appraisal Consultants of New England, and after all updating is complete the new values are generated, along with several reports pertinent to assessing. This should facilitate the next revaluation which will start in 1990.

Even though the assessors had the tax rate figures completed in October 1988, they were asked to wait for the November Town Meeting, due to town business, to set the fiscal 1989 tax rate.

The increase in new land splits and buildings made it necessary to have a full-time assessor. At the organizational meeting of the Board, Mr. Anthony Anacki, Chairman, was unanimously voted as the full-time assessor, by Mrs. Rose Bevis and Mr. Jack Welby the other members of the Board.

The Board of Assessors welcomes to their full-time clerical staff, Marie Anderson. Miss Anderson had been employed on a part-time basis for three years while in school.

The Board of Assessors wish to express their appreciation to Marie V. Amelotte, Administrative Clerk; Vincent M. Damon, Principal Clerk and Marie E. Anderson, Clerk Typist, for their dedicated service to the Board and for having been courteous and helpful to the public at all times. Thank you, to all other departments who assisted us during the year.

## **Report of the Collector**

The 1988 report of the Collector's office is herewith submitted.

Motor Vehicle Excise taxes have continued to increase as the Town and the number of multi-car families expand in number. As people move and do not leave forwarding addresses it becomes difficult to collect excise taxes in a timely manner, necessitating interest and demand charges persuant to M.G.L. Chapter 60A Section 2. The Collector's office turned over to the Treasurer \$53,166.14 in these interest and demand charges alone, in addition to the excide taxes collected which totaled \$829,750.81. It should be noted that as recently as Fiscal Year 1982, the total amount collected in excise tax was \$396,748.39; the volume in six years has more than doubled.

Due to the numerous property sales and mortgage rewrites, the Collector's office had 683 requests for Municipal Lien Certificates resulting in revenue of \$14,765.00 also turned over to the Town Treasurer. Although the Town's population has increased tremendously, the staff of the Collector's office has remained the same for 14 years. It is extremely difficult to work in the cramped quarters we share with the Treasurer's Department. I wish to commend my Assistant Collector, Irma Sankunas, for her excellence in performing the many varied duties required. Lorraine Conti has left the Collector's department and works part time in the Treasurer's department. She has been replaced by Marjorie Newey.

Suggestions, comments, or inquiries pertaining to this office are cordially welcomed. Office hours are 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, closed all day Wednesday to catch up on paper work but for your convenience, open Monday evenings 7:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.
