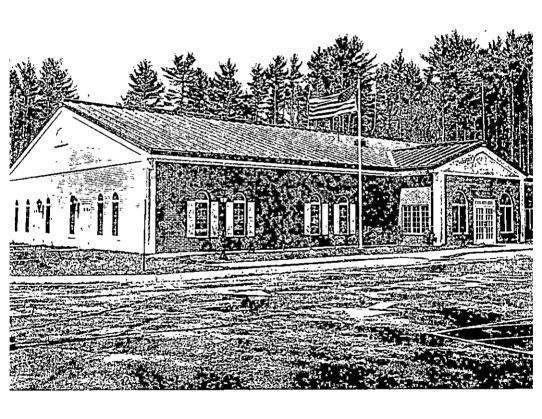

# 1992 Report of the Board of Selectmen

This year the Town managed to fiscally survive a very tight year by the use of some innovataive budget procedures.

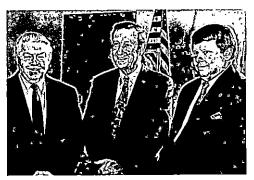
In 1992 the new housing units for the elderly (off Main Street at Heritage Circle) and the new Senior Center (located on the old Mello Farm property on Wally Krueger Way) were opened and formally accepted by the Town — long awaited and much needed facilities for our senior citizens.

The Fire Department received two new fire engines through a State grant which are the envy of many of the surrounding communities.

The Town also saw the opening of the Roche Brothers' Supermarket, a beautiful new market with many new features and a floor area much larger than the previous one.

The possibility of prison expansion at the MCI is being explored and should this go forward, the financial benefits could be of tremendous assistance to the Town. The State is offering \$10 million for 1,000 cells in the initial expansion phase and another \$20 million for 2,000 cells in the future. Many meetings and discussions will be held on these issues and other benefits to the Town will be explored.

The winter of 1992 saw the Town hit by some very bad weather. A December storm caused the loss of power to the entire Town. We survived the storm in good shape because of the fine work of our Highway Department directed by Andrew Bagas; our Fire Department, directed by Fire Chief Rod Walsh, our Police Department, directed by Chief William Ferioli and our School Department, directed by Superintendent Robert Blakeley. The Board congratulates them for their fine work.



Eileen Fitzgerald retired and was replaced by Marie Jennings as Secretary in the Selectmen's Office. Dick Brow, our part-time custodian was made a full-time employee of the Highway and was replaced by David Anacki. Selectman Peter Riordan was elected President of the Plymouth County Selectmen's Association and we congratulate him for a job well done.

The Board is grateful to all Town personnel who have worked so hard this year to make Bridgewater a Town we all can be proud to live in.

# Report of the Executive Secretary

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Bridgewater:

For the past several years I have been advocating to the Board of Selectmen that we must do more with less, that we must continue to explore the possibilities of shared services, and, that we maintain the type of quality government the citizens of Bridgewater have a right to expect. These are admirable and lofty goals and while this present Board of Selectman has made every effort to do so, it is becoming harder and harder each year.

The present budget, which is essentially level funded, does not allow for the proper maintenance of buildings and grounds, it does not allow for the expansion of much needed programs, supplies and equipment and, it does not adequately allow for proper compensation to the dedicated employees who work for the Town.

While we al recognize and understand the dilemma of elected officials, in particular the Board of Selectmen, in trying to satisfy the needs of a rapidly growing community with a very limited budget, we must also understand the reluctance of the citizens to approve increases in the amount of taxes they pay when their own personal incomes are not going up and in many cases may be reverting downward.

It is for these reasons then that I again call for the cooperation of all and urge the Board of Selectmen to continue to be in the forefront in bringing regional solutions to the problems now facing Bridgewater. New relationships must be formed with the State facilities that occupy so much of the land in Bridgewater. Cooperative agreements that identify the infrastructure problems and the joint ways to solve them must be forged in order that the entire Town may be allowed to grow and prosper jointly, and not at the detriment of one entity or another.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Selectmen and the Selectmen's Office Staff (Peg Mader, Leigh Norton, Patty Goss and Marie Jennings) for performing their many duties with courtesy, professionalism and dedication.

The future of Bridgewater is extremely bright, but it will take the cooperation and management of all to ensure that this growth is managed for now and for the future.

It was unanimously voted that the Town vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning July 1, 1992, in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 4, and to issue a Note or Notes therefor, payable within one (1) year, and to renew any Note or Notes as may be given for a period of less than one (1) year, in accordance with General Laws, Chapter 44, Section 17.

ARTICLE 7. It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Treasurer/Collector, with the approval of the Selectmen, to enter into a compensating balance agreement or agreements, for the fiscal year July 1, 1992 through June 30, 1993 pursuant to M.G.L. Chap. 44, Sec. 53F.

ARTICLE 8. That the Town vote to amend the Protective Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater as follows:

- 1. by adding the following to Section 2. Definitions:
  - 2.92 Junk, Article that has outlived its usefulness in its original form or which can no longer serve its original intended use.
  - 2.93 Recyclable material. Means a material which is
    - Not co-mingled or contaminated with significant amounts of inorganic waste or toxic constituents;
    - Handled in a manner which will not constitute a danger to the public health or safety or the environment;
    - Utilized as an ingredient or a feedstock in a process which will result in a beneficial use as a raw material or a finished product; and

- Not speculatively accumulated. A material is not speculatively accumulated if the person accumulating the material can demonstrate that:
  - 1. The material is potentially recyclable;
  - There exists a feasible means of recycling the material; and
  - During the calendar year the amount of recyclable material that is processed or transferred to a different site for processing equals at least 75% by weight or volume of the amount of that material accumulated at the site during the calendar year.

# Police Department

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Bridgewater:

Although traffic accidents have increased significantly over that of 1991, this is the second consecutive year in which we have not had a traffic fatality. The overall crime rate for the Town remains close to that of last year.

During the year the Selectmen provided the needed monies from the Department of Corrections Funds to purchase a new Breathalizer and three new Mobile Data Terminals for the remaining marked cruisers.

Budget constraints continue to be our #1 problem. With the crossing guards gone, we have had to cover the most dangerous crossing with a police officer. Our department manpower has been reduced from 30 full time officers to 29. The funds from the court fine account, which were supposed to purchase new cruisers, have been utilized to offset severe budget cuts in the salary account. Yet we are in need of new cruisers again.

I am proud of the educational accomplishments of the officers of my department. To date, seven officers have Master's Degrees, six have Bachelor's Degrees and seven have Associate's Degrees.

My continued thanks to all department personnel and to the many Town Departments who have assisted us through the year.

# Fire Department

The Bridgewater Fire Department responded to a total of 3976 incidents: 1486 fire related incidents, 1418 medical incidents and 1082 general assistance/inspections/public service incidents. A total increase of 405 over Calendar Year 1991. For informational purposes we responded to 97 incidents at MCI Bridgewater Complex and 209 at Bridgewater State College. These facilities amounted to 8% of our total deployments, a 3% decrease from 1991.

Of the fire related runs 39 responses were third alarm responses for structures both residential and commercial. Remaining responses were for inside and outside investigations, motor vehicle accidents, woods fires, medical assists, HAZMAT responses, fires within buildings not classified as structural and miscellaneous unclassified runs. Our highest response area continues to be our Fire District Five, the western quadrant of the Town. The need for a sub-station is again apparent in this sector.

Through your efforts, and recognition of our equipment deficiencies, as noted in the 1991 report, Infrastructure Grant Funding was expended to purchase two 1250 GPM pumpers to replace three units that were not capable to meeting minimum standards. The new units were placed in service on 16 August. A grant from Bridgewater State

College in the amount of \$120,000.00 was used to refurbish Ladder 1 and it was completed on 26 November. As a result of the Boot Camp construction, we received from the Department of Corrections new Fire Alarm receiving units. One for Radio and one for our hard wire system. The cost was \$75,000.00 and it now enables us to extend our system to areas of Town not within the current wire circuits.

My thanks to the personnel of this Department and all Town Departments, Committees and residents for their cooperation and support. Special acknowledgement to our secretary Anne Boyd for dedication and loyalty on our behalf.

# Office of Planning and Community Development

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

This office continued to perform a variety of planning and community development services during 1992.

Through the use of the recently released 1990 U.S. Census, assistance was provided to the Town Clerk's Office in delineating seven new voting precincts within the Town. Relatively equal apportionments were made once institutional populations, namely those at MCI and on the BSC campus, were largely discounted from the tabulation as required under state law. Reporting errors concerning the on-campus population were discovered during the project which the Census Bureau later agreed to rectify. The Selectmen voted to endorse the new precinct plan in December.

Assistance was also provided to the School Department in securing funds through the Institutional Conservation Program. The funds are to support engineering studies designed to identify energy conservation improvements within the McElwain and Williams Elementary Schools. Recommended improvements qualify for at least 50 percent ICP Funding. Similar programs operated by public utility companies could conceivably support the remaining expense.

In addition, housing rehabilitation assistance continued to be offered to low and moderate income residents through funds received from the Massachusetts Small Cities Program. The success of the program qualified the Town to receive an additional \$52,020 in August. Work was completed on 29 homes during the year benefitting a total of 62 residents.

Another application for \$798,000 was submitted to the Small Cities Program in September. The request involved downtown revitalization, handicap accessibility improvements, establishment of a local food bank and housing rehabilitation assistance in both Bridgewater and East Bridgewater. After three successive years of participating in the Small Cities Program, the Town was informed in late December that its application, unfortunately, could not be funded.

In closing, I would like to thank the other staff members of this office, Richard Farris, Janice Flaherty, and William Potter, for their hard work and cooperation during this past year

## FACILITIES FOR THE PEOPLE

## **Highway Department**

As Superintendent of Streets, I am pleased to present the 1992 Annual Report to the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Bridgewater.

Our Town continued to grow during 1992. Six new streets were accepted by the Town, bringing a total of 25 streets accepted in the past five years, putting great demand on our limited resources.

During 1992, we were unable to schedule any major roadway improvements or maintenance projects because of budget constraints. We made emergency repairs to older existing systems as needed, illustrating the desperate need to renew and maintain our drainage and roadway infrastructure.

Resurfacing and chip sealing were also limited. We chip sealed on North Street, Pleasant Street Cut-off, and Cottage Street.

On Cross Street, a private developer installed 1,200' of drainage pipe at his expense as a condition of approval for the Legge Street Extension subdivision. We took advantage of this pipeline by installing and connecting catch basins on Cross Street. A binder course of pavement was installed with a minor widening of the roadway. Portions of Laurie Lane, Laurie Circle, and Alverona Road were also resurfaced.

Approximately \$80,000 in Chapter 90 monies were utilized to resurface Plymouth Street from Summer Street to Hayward Street. The project included installation of curbing and expansion of the sidewalk system.

As the Highway Department has been forced to reduce its budget over the past few years, our resurfacing budget for local monies, excluding Chapter 90, has been cut from about \$80,000 to about \$14,000 per year. By not expending monies for resurfacing maintenance, our roadway system is deteriorating rapidly. If funds are not restored soon, our roadways will need reconstruction rather than simple resurfacing. The cost of reconstruction will far outweigh that of resurfacing.

The winter of 91-92 was milder than normal. We had to sand the roadways on several occasions, but fortunately, we only had to plow three times. Because of the unpredictably mild winter, we did not over-expend our snow and ice budget. A severe winter would have resulted in more frequent repairs to keep our older equipment in reliable operating condition.

In early December, the first snow storm of the '92-'93 season descended upon us. Due to heavy rain mixed with the snow, flooding occurred all over Town. Electric lines were down for approximately 20 hours. Breakdown of our older equipment added to the woes of cleanup. During the storm, Water Street, Wood Street, and the Auburn Street Bridge had to be closed due to flooding. Extensive repairs were necessary to Auburn Street as the roadway was also partially washed out.

During 1992, Ronald Ladue was promoted to Foreman and has been doing an excellent job. Richard Perry was promoted to Heavy Equipment Operator to fiil Ron's position. This still leaves us with one unfilled Heavy Equipment Operator slot and two unfilled Light Equipment Operator slots.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and all other Boards, Departments, Committees and Commissions for their help and cooperation over the past year. I would also like to express my sincere thanks and appreciation to Deputy Superintendent Andrew Bagas, Clerk Lorraine Levy, and the entire Highway Department staff for their hard work and dedication.

# Forestry Department Shade Tree Management & Pest Control

As Superintendent of the Forestry Department, I am pleased to present the 1992 Annual Report to the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Bridgewater.

Beginning in July, at the start of the Fiscal Year, the Forestry Department was no longer funded in the Town Budget under the Insect Pest Department and the Dutch Elm Department. For simplification and for bookkeeping purposes, the Forestry Department is now known as the Shade Tree Management and Pest Control Department, funded under one account rather than two.

1992 was another productive year for our tree planting and replacement program. We obtained a MASS Rellef Grant for \$5,400 from the Department of Environmental Management. On Main Street, from the McElwain School to Mary Lane, 35 Columnar Sargent Cherry trees were planted along the grass strip between the sidewalk and roadway. Our total Main Street planting goal is now nearly 2/3 complete.

The Bridgewater Improvement Association again contributed generously to the Town for tree plantings and roadside beautification projects. At the intersection of Pleasant and Birch Streets, the Association provided Cleveland Pear trees, Arbor Vitae trees, and a ground cover of Rhododendron and Junipers. The Association also donated 100 Kousa Dogwood trees to residents of Pleasant Street for planting in their front yards near the roadside. The Forestry Department distributed the trees and assisted some residents with plantings.

Other Forestry Department tree planting projects included distribution of approximately 100 tree seedlings to local residents and replacement of roadside trees that were removed because of disease.

Mosquitos again were not a severe problem in 1992 as it was a dry year. We have limited funding for roadside spraying, but we cannot provide the level of service by aerial spraying that residents have previously enjoyed.

The Forestry Department continued to assist local residents with tree problems providing advice whenever it was requested.

During winter months, the Forestry Department assisted the Highway Department with snow removal and equipment maintenance. The Highway Department assisted the Forestry Department where necessary for projects such as roadside trimming.

I will provide the best service possible to the Town in spite of limited resources. Residents may call on us for any assistance within our means. New and replacement trees will continue to be planted.

I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen and all Town Departments who have supported and assisted us this year. I look forward to the challenges of the coming year.

## **Board of Library Trustees**

The year 1992 came to an exciting conclusion after months of dedicated work by supporters of the Public Library when the bond to raise \$750,000 for the Library Access and Expansion Project passed on December 19th. This vote assures the more than \$1 million raised by Library Trustees and volunteers in the past 18 months will be used for its intended purpose: to make the public library fully accessible to all; and, to fully serve the increasing information needs for people as we enter the 21st Century.

Bridgewater's population has grown from 13,000 residents in 1972, to 21,249 late in 1992. During the same time, our library collection grew from 38,000 to 88,000. This growth is adequate testimony to the need for building expansion.

Today's public libraries encounter challenges in services, specialization, space, and technology, all of which were hardly known years ago. The Board of Trustees recognizes its elected and legal responsibility in meeting two challenges of a modern library; access and space.

Over the past four years the Trustees and local citizens have conferred with architects, determined costs, decided on comparative stages of construction and fundraising tactics. This year, physical changes were begun. The parking area and its dangerous exit onto South Street have been altered. This was accomplished by the civic generosity of the R.J. Gabriel Construction Company which provided labor, and by Elisabeth and Stanton Davis who provided the materials. At the close of 1992, the expanded parking area and the one-way exit onto Church Street were functioning.

The Library accomplishments of 1992 happened because of the untiring and untold efforts of countless people too numerous to mention. More than ever before we have depended upon the skills and time of so many as we continue to raise funds. However some demand identification: the talented staff under the excellent leadership of Director Linda Wright, who give effort beyond their job specifications, the Friends of the Library, the administration of Bridgewater State College, many local commercial and industrial companies and, of course, faithful volunteers. All these great-hearted people served the Trustees' mission for the library to provide for the increasing demands only a public library can satisfy.

## **Library Director**

In all 154,766 people came to the Bridgewater Public Library in 1992. Since 1990, library transactions have continued to rise steadily. However, library visits (or the number of people actually entering our building per year) have decreased. This is directly attributed to the reduction in hours open forced by layoffs of library personnel in November of 1990. Particularly affected have been people who work outside of Bridgewater and High School students who primarly use the Public Library during the evenings and Saturdays. Unfortunately, usage data shows that a reduction in morning or afternoon hours would have affected a greater segment of the population. Although, most of the other personnel reduced in Town Departments in 1990 have been restored fully, none of the 5 library positions lost in 1990 have been restored to date.

Of the 16,445 people who hold Bridgewater Public Library cards, 21% are children under the age of 12, 13% are young adults between the ages of 12 and 17, 62% are adults between the ages of 18 and 59, and 4% are over the age of 59.

Reference staff directly answered, 9,407 questions from people seeking information to assist them in their jobs, continuing education, and personal endeavors. This reflects an 8% increase over last year's requests. Staff also handled 1,450 requests for periodicals through the Boston Public Library's telefax service, representing a 21% increase. A total of 12,266 reserves were filled and 591 interlibrary loan requests were processed for our users. We added 7,329 items to our collection in 1992.

During the year the library loaned 186,492 items to the public of which 90% were books and other print materials. In addition, 19,235 non-print items, such as compact discs, audiocassettes, videocassettes, computer software, and museum passes were loaned to the public. Items loaned from the Children's Room of the Library rose by almost 7% form 1991.

A total of 166 programs were held by the Library for the public attracting 5,792 people. Events for children accounted for 98% of the programs conducted in the Library. These programs included a series entitled "Books, Books, Books," which was sponsored by an Arts Lottery Grant through the Bridgewater Arts Council and matching funds from the Friends of the Library. The series featured a visit from noted children's author and illustrator Marc Brown in November during National Children's Book Week. The Library participated in the Massachusetts Summer Reading Program "Reach for It, Read!" A record-breaking 517 children participated in this program which had a sports theme. Altogether the children read 9,133 books or 33% more than during the previous summer.

In 1992 the Children's Room hosted 122 class visits bringing 3,351 pre-school and elementary school aged children to the public library for an introduction to our services and collection. There were 108 sessions of pre-school storyhours held during the year with a total attendance of 2,773.

The Capital Campaign raised over \$1.8 million for the Library's Access and Renovation Project. More than ever before the Public Library is grateful for its dedicated Board of Trustees, competent and caring staff, and tireless volunteers who have worked harder than ever on behalf of the citizens of our community to plan for the future.

## **Water Department**

The Water Department is facing new problems caused by the large amount of new construction in Bridgewater over the last several years and meeting the demand for water is becoming a concern.

Our average daily demand is now 2,249,384 gallons. For the year 1992, we pumped 821,025,049 gallons of water.

This year we are going to conduct a leak detection program and also introduce a conservation program to the public to help alleviate this problem.

We are in the process of obtaining the necessary permits from the State to develop a new water supply on Beech Street. Currently, work is underway to comply with DEP requirements to develop a well at that location. We are constantly exploring new sources of water and are drilling test points in several other locations within the Town.

During the year the Water Department has approved the water systems of 9 new sub-divisions and has installed 192 domestic water service connections. The service crew repaired 33 service leaks, 9 broken water mains, repacked 7 main line gate valves and replaced 16 old or broken fire hydrants. They also replaced 541 water meters.

I would like to express my thanks and appreciation for the cooperation of all Town Departments, the service crew and office personnel.

#### **Sewer Department**

To the Citizens of Bridgewater:

The Wastewater Treatment Plant has operated very efficiently this past year. The plant has received an average of 250,000 gallons of septage per month, which is an increase of about 65% from last year. Because of this septage increase, our goal in the coming year is to overhaul an old holding tank. This will not only handle our septage needs now, but also in the future.

We also had numerous sewer system problems which were handled by the plant and Water Department personnel.

The facility has treated over 300 million gallons of wastewater this past year with a 97% solids removal. There were 2.2 million gallons of sludge dewatered yielding 1000 cubic yards of compost.

Over this past year, plant personnel have given numerous tours to interested groups; one of which was the Boston University School of Public Health, which was made up of foreign dignitaries.

Plant personnel have also been involved with a river testing program for the Taunton River Watershed Alliance.

The Sewer Department is always looking to the future. We hope to implement programs that will help us to sewer streets in need of sewage, improve plant operation to keep costs down and yet improve the quality of the effluent into the Town River.

I would like to commend all the personnel in the department for the great job they have done this past year.

## Plymouth County Cooperative Extension

Cooperative Extension System was officially established by an Act of Congress in 1914. It's earliest beginnings were the Morrill Act of 1862 which established Land-Grant Colleges. Cooperative Extension is a nationwide network of over 3,100 offices, its practical research-based programs and funding connections with the United States Department of Agriculture, the State Land Grant University and county government make it a unique program. Extension offers a wide range of educational opportunities in agriculture, youth (4H) and volunteer development and critical issues that affect our lives.

In Plymouth County the outreach office is located on High Street, Hanson. In Southeastern Massachusetts the other main Cooperative Extension Centers are located in Barnstable County and at the Southeastern MA Agricultural Center (also called the UMASS Cranberry Experiment Station) located in Wareham, MA. Satellite offices are located in Bristol; Dukes/Nantucket and Norfolk Counties. The State Extension Administrative offices are located at UMASS, Amherst. The Plymouth County Cooperative Extension office is open 8:30-4:30, Monday-Friday. Currently the local extension field staff consists of a County Director, two

4-H Youth Development Specialists, a Nutrition/Family Life Educator, and a Landscape/Nursery Specialist. A federally funded Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program which has been active in Plymouth County since 1969, is run under the auspices of Cooperative Extension. Currently, one supervisor, and three outreach educators work in this program conducting a very popular UMASS nutrition education certificate course in cooperation with county homeless shelters and key area agencies. #### Conservation Commission

1992 marked a significant departure from the relative inactivity of the real estate development market, over the previous two and a half years. Notice of Intent filings for new residential subdivisions and individual single-family lot development increased by more than fifty (50) percent over the previous year. However, inquiries and filings for commercial and industrial site development remained virtually non-existent and in line with previous years.

During the 1992 year, sixteen groups of Bridgewater residents have adopted various streams through the Adopt-A-Stream program of the Taunton River Watershed Alliance, under the coordinating directorship of Katherine Doherty, a member of the Bridgewater Conservation Commission. Titicut Reservation has been used by Boy Scout groups, the Army Reserve unit and several other groups during 1992 and continues to serve as a model conservation area that provides a good balance between recreational activities and reservation needs of the community.

In 1992, the Commission enjoyed the active services of its newest members, Janyce Woodward and associate member, Pauline Grenier.

#### **Old Colony Planning Council**

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Bridgewater:

As your representative to the Old Colony Planning Council, I am pleased to present this report on behalf of the Council for 1992.

This year, the Council launched a major initiative to conduct a series of forums on the topic of Regionalism for local elected officials and the members of the general public. The Council is supported in this effort by the Martin Institute of Stonehill College and other state, regional and county organizations. The thrust of the three forums is to increase awareness of what the options are in providing governmental services on an areawide basis; what cost savings

can be expected through inter-municipal cooperation; and, what alternative governmental structures are appropriate for consideration in Southeastern Massachusetts. These and other questions are expected to be considered as the Regionalism forums are held.

In 1992, the Old Colony Planning Council continued to serve as the designated organization for; elder services planning and programming in its responsibilities as the Area Agency on Aging (AAA); as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for Transportation and Transit Planning; and, as the Economic Development District (EDD) in coordinating strategies to improve the area's economic conditions. We are proud to report that the Old Colony Planning Council has the distinction of being the only regional council in New England to hold all of these official designations at the same time. In addition to these designated responsibilities, the Council is authorized by state statute as the regional planning agency to be concerned with a wide variety of areawide and inter-municipal concerns as they pertain to the physical, social and economic development of the District. The Council also assists its members municipalities with technical planning assistance, grant application preparation assistance and with information on local and regional trends by maintaining current socioeconomic data.

Each municipality is represented on the Council by one delegate and one alternate delegate. The Council members establish policy, develop the work program, employ the professional staff and determine the activities of the Council to be carried out by the staff. The Council meets on the last Wednesday of each month at 8:00 P.M. in the Council offices located at 70 School Street, Brockton, MA

#### **Solid Waste Action Committee**

The Solid Waste Action Committee (S.W.A.C.) formed by Town Meeting vote, was charged with developing a long term solid waste disposal solution for the Town. S.W.A.C. is committed to providing a Town-owned transfer station for the dual purpose of handling the Town's solid waste (trash) in a cost-effective manner and also providing a site for comprehensive recycling.

Previously S.W.A.C. obtained Town Meeting approval to apply for a Transfer Station/Recycling Center site assignment on Town-owned land located on the easterly side of Bedford Street.

S.W.A.C. wrote and submitted a thirty-one (31) page Environmental Notification Form (ENF) as part of the M.E.P.A. exemption process to the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs. This involved prior consultations with the state D.P.W. and the local Conservation Commission. After the E.N.F. was submitted, an official from the Executive Office of Environmental Affairs conducted an onsite inspection of the land with various Town officials and members of S.W.A.C. The Executive Office of Environmental Affairs exempted the site from the M.E.P.A. review.

In late July, 1992, S.W.A.C. submitted an eighty-four (84) page site assignment application to D.E.P., along with the required documentation. In September, 1992 S.W.A.C. requested a meeting with D.E.P. officials to discuss the status of our Town's application. Several subsequent meetings were held with D.E.P. to review the application. On November 16, 1992 D.E.P. formally requested additional documentation. The remainder of 1992 was spent in gathering these additional facts.

In 1993, S.W.A.C. envisions that the site assignment approval will be granted to the Town, so that the development and operation of this site can begin.

## **Zoning Board of Appeals**

The Zoning Board of Appeals respectfully submits this Report of its doings for the calendar year of 1992.

During the calendar year of 1992 there were a total of thirty-two (32) Appeals, requests for Variances and Special Permits. To process the thirty-two (32) Appeals the Zoning Board of Appeals held a total of forty-two (42) Public Hearings and in each Appeal or Request for Variance or Special Permit the Zoning Board of Appeals filed a written opinion setting forth its decisions and the reasons therefore. The Zoning Board of Appeals in each decision must set forth the reasons for granting or denying the Appeal or Request under current discussion.

The Zoning Board of Appeals made the following decisions:

Sixteen (16) Requests for Variances were Granted;

Seven (7) such Requests were Denied;

Four (4) Requests for Special Permits were Granted;

One (1) Request was Denied and;

One (1) Request was Withdrawn.

There were three (3) Appeals from the Decisions of the Building Inspector, all of which were Denied.

There was a drop-off of the number of Requests for Variances and Special Permits and Appeals due to the economic circumstances prevailing during the calendar year.

The Zoning Board of Appeals suggests that a review of Lot sizes and the effect of Lot sizes on the question of affordable housing.

It is further suggested that the Zoning By-Law be reviewed on the question of re-zoning if any in view of the economic circumstances and with a view to stimulating economic growth within the Town.

## **School Building Committee**

The Bridgewater School Building Committee is committed to a new school building plan which will meet the needs of our school children and which will improve the quality of life in our Town and the future of its children.

All of our schools are overcrowded. The system faces larger class sizes as the enrollment continues to increase. The McElwain School, build in 1912 to house 200 students, and the Hunt School built in 1918 to house 250 students, each house over 325 students. There is no available space for additional classrooms to alleviate the overcrowding or for the resources necessary to prepare students for today's society.

It is not feasible to upgrade the existing facilities due to their age, lack of land, and lack of reimbursement from the State for the upgrading. At the present time, the State will reimburse the Town 73% for the cost of building a new elementary school.

Before the end of this year, the Committee intends to present an elementary school building plan which will address the critical school space needs of our Town.

The Committee recommends to the Town Meeting that in order to eliminate duplication of effort, the current members continue their work and report at or before the next annual Town Meeting.

The general public is always welcome to attend our open meetings (we held no closed executive meetings in 1992) and we were pleased to have many of the Bridgewater citizens, recreational organization leaders and Friends of the Bridgewater Recreation Commission attend our meetings.

Each year the task of field assignments to various sports organizations' requests becomes more and more formidable. The limitations of available space and finances in our budget require a difficult juggling act to satisfy all. During 1992 we assigned field usage at Legion and Scotland Fields to the Babe Ruth League, Bridgewater Youth Soccer Association, Little League, Adult Men's Softball, Girl's Softball, Bridgewater-Raynham High School, Bridgewater State College, Shaws Sunday League, Over Forties Sunday League, Semi-Pro Cranberry League, and the Junior High School. In addition, many individual field usages were scheduled.

In closing, The Bridgewater Recreation Commission would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and many other Town officials who have given us valuable assistance throughout the years.

## **HUMAN RESOURCES**

## **Self Help Incorporated**

Self Help, Inc., is greater Brockton's and Attleboro's antipoverty agency dedicated to improving the quality of life of limited-income individuals and families, and making all segments of the community responsive to the needs of the limited-income, disadvantaged and minority.

During the program year, ending September 30, 1992, Self Help received a total funding of approximately \$9.4M and provided direct services to 42,641 limited-income households in the area.

850 Bridgewater households received direct services totaling \$180,980 during the program year 1992.

The total funding of \$9,387,675 does not tell the real value of human services delivered to the area as a whole. Self Help's funding enabled us to mobilize an additional \$2,549,611 of other community resources, such as contributions from the towns and volunteers. The gross value of Self Help during the past program year was \$11,937,286.

Self Help currently employs 200 individuals, many of whom are of limited income and minorities.

We feel that the year 10/1/91 through 9/30/92 was a successful one for us and very helpful to our limited-income population. We thank the many volunteers, Boards of Selectmen and their representative to our Board of Directors, Frederick Watson, Ill for helping to make our year a success.

#### **Veterans Services Department**

During the year 1992, the Department serviced a case load of 41 clients. There were 11 new applications and 10 terminations during this period. The year ended with a case load of 29 clients.

When possible and appropriate, we request our client to seek alternate sources of income such as Social Security, Supplemental Security Income, Workman's Compensation and private pension plans plus compensation and pension as administered by the Federal Government (Veterans Affairs Department). This office continues to make periodic audits and investigations to insure compliance with Chapter 115 of the General Laws of Massachusetts and Title 108 of the Code of Massachusetts Regulations.

This Department had the pleasure to assist in the State Bonus Program for eligible discharged Desert Storm Veterans who participated in the South West Asia Campaign and who received a Southwest Asia Service Medal and those who were ordered to active duty in support of Desert Shield.

The Veterans Services Department functions as a service to veterans with war time duty and their dependents seeking assistance in filing for compensation/pension and medical services that might be available to them from the Veterans Affairs Department. During 1990/1991 fiscal period, the Federal Government awarded Bridgewater Veterans and/or their dependents approximately \$43,000.00 on an annual basis and \$29,000.00 in retroactive payments. These dollars boost the per capita income.

#### **Veterans Graves Officer**

Town-owned cemeteries are cared for by the Town Highway Department on a routine basis such as mowing, raking leaves, removal of tree branches and limbs. Any restoration beyond these basic tasks is hampered by budget constraints. Boy Scouts have frequently offered their aid in a clean-up program in pursuit of community service awards. Perhaps some work force assistance from the Bridgewater MCI facility should be sought in order to achieve maximum restoration of walls, stones, monuments and heavy brush removal.

Approximately one thousand flags are purchased annually for the decoration of all veterans graves. Aged and otherwise torn and tattered flags are removed. The new flags are placed upon the veterans graves by the Boy Scouts of America and Veterans Organizations under the supervision of this department just prior to Memorial Day. Flags are placed at certain designated memorials.

Those flags deemed unserviceable are carefully collected and stored in a safe place and at a privately designated ceremony are respectfully destroyed in a dignified manner in accordance with the Flag Code of Ethics under the supervision of the Boy Scouts of America.

## **Housing Authority**

To the Citizens of Bridgewater:

In 1992 the Bridgewater Housing Authority reached another milestone in their endeavor to meet the demands of housing.

Although it was a very busy 1992 it was also a rewarding and positive experience for the Executive Director and the Board members who all worked tirelessly toward this final phase of completion in anticipation of assisting many of our senior residents.

In June an occupancy permit was issued for the 689 building at which time eight clients from the Dept. of Mental Health were tenanted. Subsequently in August the Housing Authority received an occupancy permit for the newly completed 667-3 building consisting of 40 elderly units and 10 Congregate units. All 40 units of elderly were leased on September 1, 1992.

The formal application process for the Congregate units continues. A coordinator from Old Colony Elderly Services has been working with the Housing Authority in anticipation of leasing the 10 units during 1993.

On October 23, 1992, the Housing Authority received notification from the Executive Office of Communities & Development of a regulation change in the 707 Rental Assistance Program. The Legislature determined that a new rental assistance program shall be available November 1, 1992.

Rental assistance in the Commonwealth has been a certificate-based program since 1966. The program was created by the Legislature as a way to help low-income households pay for their rent. Further, the Legislature determined that a new rental assistance program would be available November 1, 1992. That program would be known as the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP).

We thank the Selectmen, Police, Fire and Highway Departments for their assistance during the year.

## Office of Elder Affairs

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Advisory Board, Citizens of Bridgewater:

The Elder Affairs Office is a division of the Town government, the administration office for the Council On Aging, the focal point of information and referral for senior citizens. The Director is appointed by the Board of Selectmen and charged with specific duties.

The office staff is made up of the Director, clerk, senior aid, outreach worker and two nutrition workers. Volunteer registered nurse, volunteer computer expert, four volunteer commodity food helpers, and 14 volunteer Meals On Wheels drivers.

The Director introduced several new programs over the past year that have been well received by the seniors. Interaction between this office and the Aging Resource Network has been excellent. It has always been the duty of the Director to put programs, services and activities in place for the senior citizens of Bridgewater. Increases have been shown in transportation, senior lunches, commodity food distribution, telephone calls and Meals On Wheels.

There is a gap in the age groups which can be bridged with a little common sense, direction, and determination. Aging is not a crime — but neglect of the "aged," is a serious offense.

Achievements this past year include: moving into a new senior center, comfortably accommodating 250 people in the facility room, the hiring of a part-time (grant funded) Outreach Worker, a new workable council, ample exterior land for outside activities.

Statistics are documented on a monthly Director's report. Records are on file and up-dates on senior issues are printed in the monthly newsletter.

Thank you to the staff, volunteers, folks who have donated articles to the center, and senior citizens in general for your kindness, generosity and support over the past year and in times of great stress.

## Superintendent of Schools

To the Members of the School Committee:

I am submitting for your consideration the annual report of the Bridgewater Public Schools for calendar year 1992.

Our October 1st enrollment was 2,436, an increase of 57 students since the October 1991 enrollment, and an increase of 16 students from the close of school in June 1992. The latest enrollment projections predict 74 additional students by October 1, 1993, with continued growth over the next five years. As the enrollment continues to rise, class sizes, which are already high, will increase due to the lack of space and funding.

During the past calendar year, we received \$61,483 under the Emergency Education Assistance Grant which was used to purchase new Math, Social Studies, and English textbooks and computers. Under the Per Pupil Education Aid Program we were awarded \$237,900. These funds enabled us to purchase additional supplies; to hire four kindergarten aides, a guidance counselor, an additional classroom teacher and a health aide. A new contract agreement was reached with Bridgewater State College regarding the Burnell School. This will allow 350-400 Bridgewater students to attend Burnell through the 1998-99 shool year. These three factors have had a positive impact on the education of our children.

An article submitted by the School Maintenance Study Committee and approved by Town Meeting vote allowed us to recarpet and paint the interior of the McElwain School. No major capital expenditures occurred this year so our antiquated buildings continue to deteriorate. The parent

## Superintendent Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District

To the School Committee of the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District

This report, my fourth as Superintendent, is submitted for your consideration. It was compiled by reviewing the minutes of the School Committee from January to December, 1992. Also reviewed were the annual reports submitted by the administrators and department heads. All reports are available for review in the office of the Superintendent.

Two hundred eighty-five members of the senior class participated in the June 1992 graduation exercises. Over seventy-eight percent of the class continued education beyond high school.

The October 1, 1992 enrollment was 1,377 pupils, up from the previous year's enrollment of 1,352.

The school district was informed in October of 1992 that five members of the senior class had been commended in the 1993 National Merit Scholarship program, and two students, Johnny Chang and Martin Boyden are semi-finalists and under consideration for a finalist position.

In the athletic programs, our girls' basketball, tennis and field hockey teams, as well as the boys' basketball team, earned championships in the Old Colony League.

A major activity at the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District was the completion of the self-evaluation carried out by the staff in preparation for the March 21 through 23, 1993, visitation by a team of educators from the New England Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

A series of curriculum articulation meetings was held during the school year at the Regional High School with members of the regional faculty and their colleagues from the Raynham Public Schools and the Bridgewater Public Schools.

My sincere thanks are extended to my administrative colleagues, the members of the staff, and the student body for their cooperation and assistance; to the members of the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School Committee for the confidence placed in me; and to the citizens of Bridgewater and Raynham for their continued support.

We shall continue our commitment to excellence.

#### HEALTH

#### **Board of Health**

Home building picked up in Town last year as evidenced by the number of sewerage disposal applications that were approved by the board. There were one hundred ninety-eight approvals. One hundred seventy-three percolation tests were witnessed by the Agent and there were fifty repairs to existing systems. These activities returned nineteen thousand three hundred dollars to the Town.

Seventeen thousand six hundred thirty-one dollars was also received from various permits and four thousand six hundred thirty-four dollars from late payments of the rubbish disposal user fee.

A rabies clinic was held at the Highway Department garage in May and one hundred thirty dogs and cats were inoculated. The Board would again like to warn all pet owners that a rabies epidemic may soon arrive in Massachusetts. A law passed by the legislature last year requires that all cats be inoculated for rabies because of the greater danger involved for cats in contacting this disease.

A flu clinic was held again last year at the Senior Housing Community Center in October. Two hundred seventy-nine elders received the vaccine. Dr. George Gagne has continued to volunteer his services for the clinic.

The Town unfortunately went out of the rubbish business at the end of November when the board ran out of funds to pay for disposal. This board made a sincere effort to continue to provide rubbish disposal to the residents but it was to no avail. The board is continuing to support the Solid Waste Action Committee's attempt to site a Transfer Station on Bedford Street in the hopes that some future Town Meeting will fund it.

## Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Statistics can be mind boggling as we compare the growth of the Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association. Ninety one years ago in 1902 our income was \$863 and in 1993 we project our income to be \$990,900. The salary for our nurse in 1902 was \$765 and our staff salaries in 1993 are estimated to be \$615,000. Percentage-wise it was far more expensive to operate the Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association in 1902 than it is today. We have come a long way, not only, in home care statistics but also in the quality and sophistication of home health care.

Again we report growth in services delivered to the residents of Bridgewater of thirty nine percent over the previous year. Our commitment to prevention and health education has been responsible for our health clinics and conferences and the Tenth Annual Health and Fitness Fair. The dollar value of these non-reimbursed services is approximately \$65,000.

There has been growth in the number of personnel serving our Agency. We have a staff of thirty two paid employees, a governing Board of twenty-three and an advisory staff, the Group of Professional Personnel of seventeen. Statistical reporting, reimbursement and referrals have been improved with our computer and FAX machine.

The financial support of Bridgewater, the donations to the Friends of the Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association, the contributions of the business houses, the Old Colony United Way and the Conant Trust Fund have helped us balance our budget. We could not have done it without you.

At this time may I extend to each of you who contribute time, energy and money in support of the Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association our sincere appreciation.

## William H. Conant Community Health Center

The Trustees welcomed a new child care facility to the Conant Center in 1992. Sunshine Daycare Center, an established day care facility located in West Bridgewater, moved their operation to the Conant Community Health Center in November. Having to vacate their Spring Street School site on August 31, 1992, the daycare center sought a new location. With plans underway to close the Early Childhood Learning Center at the Conant Center, the two organizations worked together to bring about this transition ensuring a continuity of child care to the current enrollment.

Sunshine Daycare Center provides preschool, daycare, after school and toddler playgroup programs to children ranging from age 15 months to 9 years.

The Adult Day Health Program, operated by New England Sinai Hospital and Rehabilitation Center, completed their second year at the Conant Center, providing daily care for those with disabilities or illnesses in the greater Bridgewater area. The Center offers skilled nursing, rehabilitation, educational counseling, social and recreational services and meals to participants as well as transportation to and from the Adult Day Health Program.

The Bridgewater Visiting Nurse Association continues to develop and expand as the need for home care services grows in the community.

Community health programs and nursing education continue to be the focus for Healthcare Educational Resources. Their services include certification programs in Adult, Infant and Child CPR, First Aid and Tot Lifesaver. Continuing Education Units for Registered Nurses and Licensed Practical Nurses are awarded at many inservices offered throughout the year. Participants in their programs include group and family day care providers, local school personnel and town coaches, parents, health care providers and many safety conscious organizations throughout Massachusetts.

In fiscal 1992 the Town implemented the quarterly tax bill system which has been carried over into fiscal 1993.

The upcoming year will implement the required revaluation of all properties both real and personal for Certification by the Department of Revenue.

There were also 17,680 motor vehicle excise tax bills which generated a total of \$943,415.88 in excise tax commitments.
