

Frederick H. Balboni 1914-1996

It is a great honor to dedicate our 1996 Annual Town Report to *FREDERICK H. BALBONI*, a Founding Member and Chairman of the Zoning Appeals Board. Below is a fitting tribute to Mr. Balboni who served the Town of Bridgewater with distinction as a member of the board for thirty-nine (39) years.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town of Bridgewater:

It is both difficult and upsetting to be in a position to have to put into words thoughts about a person you have known for years (but knew very little about) and who passed on. The Zoning Appeals Board of the Town of Bridgewater has recently lost a very faithful, dedicated and longtime member of the board who became a friend, confidant and advisor to both the present members of the Board and those who have served in the past.

In memory of Frederick H. Balboni, Esquire, the founding member of the Zoning Appeals Board, we, the current members, would like the following entered into the permanent records of the Town of Bridgewater, as our memorial to Fred.

We may all try to dedicate ourselves, both individually and collectively, to the principles of community service, but few are as successful in their attempts as our late Zoning Board of Appeals founder and chairman, Frederick H. Balboni, Esquire. His years of dedication to the town of Bridgewater made him a very distinguished Senior Citizen. But who was Fred, the person? Sadly, we regret that we do not know more than we do know, but there are some things we know for certain. Fred never viewed his glass of life as half empty, but rather half full. And while he never knew all the causes of light and darkness, he would rather have lit a candle than to have cursed the darkness. We know not how many friends Fred had, but we do know that he left everyone better for his friendship. We do not know the true measure of perfection as a chairman of a board, but we do know that Fred, while maybe not perfect, was only human, and in his humanity was what a perfect chairman should be. To you, Fred, a distinguished military officer in the United States Army, a distinguished attorney and an eminent community loyalist, we would like to repeat for you the words of taps:

"For you, good friend, day is done, from the sun, from the lakes, from the hills, from the skies, all is well, safely rest God is nigh."

We say "tarra" and goodbye until we meet again.

#### MORE ABOUT BRIDGEWATER...

#### HISTORICAL DATA

#### Bridgewater, Plymouth County.

- 1656. June 3. Established as a town, "Ordered, that henceforth Duxborrow New Plantation bee allowed to bee a townshipe of yt selfe, destinct from Duxburrow, and to bee called by the name of Bridgewater, . . .". (Ply. Col. Rec., Vol. III, p. 101.)
- 1662. June 3. Certain land granted Bridgewater.
- 1675. June 1. Boundary line established, Court ordered "... to Run the line between Bridgewater and Middlebury". (Ply. Col. Rec., Vol. XI, p. 241.)
- 1691. Feb. 11. Lands between Bridgewater and Weymouth, called "Foords Farms", and parts adjacent annexed.
- 1712. June 10. Part included in the new town of Abington.
- 1770. Nov. 20. Part of Stoughton annexed.
- 1798. Feb. 8. Part of Stoughton annexed.
- 1821. June 15. Part established as North Bridgewater.
- 1822. Feb. 16. Part established as West Bridgewater.
- 1823. June 14. Part established as East Bridgewater.
- 1824. Feb. 20. Part appexed to Halifax.
- 1838. Feb. 23. Bounds between Bridgewater and East Bridgewater established.
- 1846. Mar. 20. Bounds between Bridgewater and East Bridgewater established and part of each town annexed to the other town.
- 1931. Apr. 21. Bounds between Bridgewater and East Bridgewater established.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to make this report to the citizens of Bridgewater:

In 1996, we welcomed back to the Board former Selectman Roger Provost. The Board continued to encourage communication and cooperation, not only with residents, but also with Town Employees, Department Heads and Town Officials. Reaching beyond this internally, we as a community have continued to build upon our relationship with Bridgewater State College (BSC) and Massachusetts Correctional Institute (MCI), working collectively as one community, to address our mutual concerns.

This past year, the Board was able to act upon the foundation built through fiscal management adding long due staff to our Town Departments. The financing requirements for our new school, library and upgrade of municipal services, together with the demands of continued residential growth, is a primary concern of this restoring of our budgetary process, implemented with the guidance of our Advisory Board and Department Heads. The Board is grateful for the assistance it has received and this will continue to be a significant priority for this Board.

For the first time in decades, all public safety departments were provided overdue personnel and equipment support. Through the efforts of the Police Department we were able to obtain a number of grants to enhance our operation efficiency and the Board appointed four new Police Officers. 1996 also saw the return of our K-9 Unit, the Fire Department has received much needed support. Following the long overdue replacement of necessary equipment for the Highway Department, vacancies in manpower levels were also filled and, through the assistance of Fire Chief Walsh and Police Chief Ferioli, the Enhanced 911 (E-911) System was activated this year.

Without question, changes being forced upon us due to residential growth and impending commuter rail have defined the period of this Board. Over the last year we have successfully negotiated and received one of the most comprehensive mitigation programs for any community to be affected by the expansion of commuter rail service. This has been accomplished through support from our constituents and clear definition of the impacts to be incurred. As a consequence to this, our water, sewer and transportation network has been greatly improved. Longstanding infrastructure needs have been addressed without significant impact upon our existing tax structure.

Continuing in our efforts to improve the operating efficiency of Town Government, the restructuring of our key departments and administrative services has opened a door for our valuable staff, who has responded through the submission of numerous grant proposals to resolve existing community concerns and enhance the pursuit of new opportunities.

For the first time, this Board has proactively addressed the need for balanced growth through Open Space management programs and Business development opportunities. In addition, the position of Transportation Management Coordinator and Bridgewater Transportation Management Agency, comprised of representatives from BSC and MCI, greatly increase our ability to manage traffic congestion within our community. During this past year, our efforts to provide the long needed neigh-

borhood alarm system for MCI facility were finally realized, together with the receipt of the \$3,000,000 in mitigation funds. At this time the Board of Selectmen, with the support of Town Meeting, petitioning special legislation to invest this money wisely, and establish a capital projects fund to meet our future needs.

While change is unsettling, we are very proud of the positive changes that we are seeing that we must provide to maintain our Town business in Bridgewater. To that end we established the position of Coordinator of Town Buildings, resulting in considerable savings to the budget. As we proceed, we are careful to ensure continued expansion of the services for our elderly beyond the Senior Center, which has seen more usage in 1996, than any prior year. This Board will remain committed to our goals progress. We proudly acknowledge that our accomplishments are achieved in part through the dedicated efforts of our staff with over 10,000 phone calls coming into our office annually. Procurement Officer Peg Mader had a very busy year in that role in addition to her other duties. We wish to thank Municipal Administrator David Canepa, whose experience and leadership abilities are so valuable to this Board. We also sincerely thank Peg Mader, Patricia Goss, Marie Jennings and Reneé Perry for their commitment to excellence. It is a great pleasure to work with them.



**ARTICLE 15.** It was unanimously voted that the Town amend Section 5.10 of the Zoning By-Law by inserting "lawful structure" in the first sentence after the first word "Any" and inserting the words "or structure" after the phrase "non-conforming use" Section 5.10 will then read as follows:

"5.10 Any lawful structure, lawful use of any structure, billboard structure and/or any or all of these may be continued although not conforming with the provisions of this By-Law, but, no such lawfully non-conforming use or structure shall be changed, extended or altered in any manner until a Special Permit has been granted pursuant to Section 11 of this by-law. Before granting a Special Permit, the Special Permit Granting Authority must find that such change, extension or alteration shall not be substantially more detrimental than the existing non-conforming use to the neighborhood.

"Exempt from the provisions of this section will be alterations or additions to those single family dwellings which do not comply with the minimum yard depth requirements as currently stated in this By-Law, provided they meet the following criteria:

- "1. Use of the alteration or addition will be limited to the principal use of the dwelling.
- The alteration or addition will come no closer to the lot lines than the existing dwelling at its closest point unless the existing setback condition so affected resulted for the issuance of a variance pursuant to Section 10 of Chapter 40A MGL."

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 16.** It was unanimously voted that the Town oppose those efforts underway to evaluate the possibility of diverting the surface waters from the Taunton River Watershed to provide municipal water supplies for the City of Brockton, formerly referred to as the Taunton River Diversion Project.

The CIC will consist of five members who shall serve one (1) year terms; one member to be the then elected or appointed Treasurer of the town of Bridgewater to act as Chairperson; one member to be the Town Accountant to serve as Vice Chairperson; one member to be appointed by the Capital Planning Committee, one member to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, and one member to be appointed by the Advisory Committee. Any vacancy occurring shall be filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as the original appointment.

SECTION 3. The CIC will recommend to the Selectmen a long term funding strategy for Capital Improvement for the Town of Bridgewater. This will include, but not limited to, the interviewing of financial institutions and brokerage firms and the review of their ability to provide long term income producing investments. This interview and review is for the sole purpose of making recommendations to the appropriate boards and departments with regard to the funding of major Capital Improvements for the Town of Bridgewater.

SECTION 4. The CIC shall make investment recommendations to the Treasurer of the Town of Bridgewater with duplicate copies to be sent to the Capital Planning Committee and the Board of Selectmen.

SECTION 5. The CIC shall make recommendations on all sums of money in excess of \$25,000.00 received or to be received by the Town of Bridgewater unincumbered from either the Commonwealth of Massachusetts or the United States Treasury.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 39.** It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire by gift, purchase, or eminent domain, under the provisions of Chapter 79 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, or any other enabling authority, for municipal purposes, the land known and numbered Beech Street, Bridgewater, MA. purported to be owned by Kerry Lee Osborne Trust, Ernest R. Osborne, Trustee, and described as follows:

A parcel of land on the southerly side of Beech Street and the westerly side of Vernon Street abutting the Taunton River and containing approximately 20.22 acres. For title reference, see Plymouth County Registry of Deeds Book 3871, Page 445. See also Book 3511, Page 784;

also to vote to appropriate a sum the Town would raise from the tax levy or by borrowing under the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, or transfer from available funds or otherwise, and appropriate to the Board of Selectmen to pay for the acquisition of said land, or to be used for payment of land damages or other costs and expenses of such acquisition, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into agreements with private parties or state and federal agencies for financial and other assistance in connection with such acquisition, and to do all other acts and things necessary and proper for carrying out the purpose of this vote. Land to be used to upgrade Town's water supplies and/or the goals and objections set forth in the Town's Open Space Plan.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator. All posting of warrants was duly noted as required by the Town By-Laws – Article 1 as voted.

**ARTICLE 1.** It was unanimously voted that the Town accept the following streets as public ways in the Town of Bridgewater and accept the layouts as public ways of the following streets:

or any of them, or portions thereof, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen on or before November 5, 1996, and to authorize the Board to take by eminent domain, purchase, or otherwise acquire, any fee, easement or other interest in land necessary therefore, no appropriation being required.

**ARTICLE 2.** It was unanimously voted "Shall the Town, in addition to the payment of fifty percent of premium costs payable by the surviving spouse of an employee or retired employee for group general or blanket hospital, surgical, medical and other health insurance pay an additional or subsidiary rate?"

Unanimous.

ARTICLE 3. It was unanimously voted that the Town transfer the sum of \$537.00 from Account #1-910-102-5742, Workers Compensation, to Account #1-910-140-5791, Prior Year's Bill, for the payment of Hull & Liability Policy on Fire Department Airboat for the period April 5 through July 1, 1996.

**ARTICLE 11.** It was unanimously voted that the Town appropriate and/or appropriate and transfer the sum of \$35,000 from Account #82-145-3750-5961, Stabilization Fund Account to Account #1-192-108-5824, Renovation to Town Buildings.

Unanimous.

ARTICLE 12. It was unanimously voted to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey for consideration of \$1.00 to Paul L. Lamoureux and Melinda Lamoureux, or assigns, a perpetual easement over Town owned real property described as follows:

BEING a 5,083 square foot parcel of land situated off the southwesterly side of Vernon Street, Bridgewater, Plymouth County, Massachusetts as shown on a plan titled "Easement Plan, Vernon Street, Bridgewater, Massachusetts, Applicant/Owner: Paul L., Jr. & Melinda Lamoureux, Scale: 1" = 40', Date: 6-12-96", prepared by Michael J. Koska & Associates, said parcel of land being more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING at a stake with tack set for corner at the southwesterly corner of Lot 54 as shown a plan titled "Long Acres, Section II, Plan of Land in Bridgewater, Massachusetts Prepared For Arthur C. Chaffee, Jr., et al, Scale: 1" = 100', August 15, 1977" by Atlas Land Survey, Inc.:

THENCE SOUTH 70 04' 27" WEST, a distance of 33.89 feet to a point for corner;

THENCE NORTH 19 55' 33" WEST, a distance of 150.00 feet to a point for corner;

Said parcels are identified on plans drafted by Hayward-Boynton & Williams, Inc., Land Surveyors & Civil Engineers, 140 School Street, Brockton, MA. and labeled "Plan of Land takings in Bridgewater, MA. prepared for the Town of Bridgewater" and dated September 23, 1996; "Plan of Easements in Bridgewater, MA. prepared for the Town of Bridgewater, and dated September 10, 1996, and further to appropriate the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) to defray any associated right-of-way expenses and/or to acquire land parcels.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 14.** It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire six (6) (plus or minus) parcels of land and/or easements for the purpose of obtaining a secure and public right-of-way, in connection with the proposed construction of Pleasant Street, from Prospect Street to Elm Street and further, that the Selectmen be authorized to acquire these parcels, or other required parcels, through purchase, donations, eminent domain or other legal means. Said parcels are identified on plans drafted by Hayward-Boynton & Williams, Inc., Land Surveyors & Civil Engineers, 140 School Street, Brockton, MA. and labeled "Plan of Land Takings in Bridgewater, MA. prepared for the Town of Bridgewater", and dated August 26, 1996; and further to appropriate the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) to defray any associated right-of-way expenses and/or to acquire land parcels.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 15.** It was unanimously voted that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to acquire one (1) (plus or minus) parcels of land and/or easements for the purpose of obtaining a secure, and public right-of-way, in connection with the proposed construction of Pleasant Street, from Elm Street to Route 24; and further, that the Selectmen be authorized to acquire these parcels, or other required parcels, through

purchase, donations, eminent domain or other legal means. Said parcels are identified on plans drafted by Hayward-Boynton & Williams, Inc., Land Surveyors & Civil Engineers, 140 School Street, Brockton, MA. and labeled "Plan of Permanent Highway Easement, James Gable, Pleasant Street, Brockton, MA.", and dated August 20, 1996; and further to appropriate the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) to defray any associated right-of-way expenses and/or to acquire land parcels. Unanimous.

ARTICLE 16. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the General By-Laws as follows:

Article II. Section 14. Strike the current language and substitute in its stead:

When required by law or at the discretion of the Moderator, the entire Town Meeting shall be sworn in so as to be eligible to serve as tellers; the Moderator shall then call upon the entire Town Meeting for volunteers and to serve as tellers and, thereupon, the Moderator shall then and there choose the number of tellers which he believes to be appropriate.

Unanimous.

ARTICLE 17. It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the General By-Laws as follows:

**Article III. Section 3.** Strike the last sentence of this section and substitute in its stead:

After due consideration of the subject matter in each such Article, the Committee shall make such recommendations as it deems to be in the best interest of the Town, which may include a favorable recommendation, an unfavorable recommendation or no recommendation. Failure to make a favorable or an unfavorable recommendation shall be tantamount to deferring the matter to Town Meeting. Upon reaching a decision for all Articles, the Committee shall report its decisions to the Moderator at least five (5) days prior to Town Meeting and shall report its decision to the Town Meeting.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 18.** It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the General By-Laws by inserting after Article XXXVII the following:

#### ARTICLE XXXIX - MAINTENANCE OF STORM WATER DRAINAGE FACILITIES

Section 1. PURPOSE

The purpose of this By-Law is to protect the public health, safety and welfare by ensuring the routine maintenance of detention basins and other open storm water drainage facilities within subdivisions which have been approved under MGL Chapter 41.

Section 2. DEFINITIONS

Detention Basins - A man-made basin-like structure which is designed to collect storm water runoff and detain it for a specified period of time.

Open Storm Water Drainage Facilities – Any man-made depression within a tract of land that is designed to direct and/or regulate the flow of storm water runoff (e.g. swale).

Routine Maintenance – The removal of debris and the periodic cutting of vegetation which would otherwise impede or alter storm water drainage flows. Maintenance within detention basins or other open storm water drainage facilities shall be typical and consistent with the maintenance of surrounding lands.

#### Section 3. REQUIREMENTS

Deed Restriction – The deed for any lot which will serve as the location for a detention basin or any other open storm water drainage facility shall specify that the lot owner or his successor, heirs or assigns shall be responsible for the routine maintenance of said basin or facility as defined herein. A copy of the deed with such a restriction, which has been recorded at the Plymouth County Registry of Deeds, shall be submitted to the Inspector of Buildings before a building permit is issued for the lot.

Maintenance – The owner of a lot which serves as the location for a detention basin or any other open storm water drainage facility shall be responsible for the routine maintenance of said basin or facility as defined herein.

#### Section 4. ENFORCEMENT

The Highway Superintendent shall be responsible for enforcing the provisions of this By-Law.

Any violations of this By-Law shall be subject to the penalties and procedures specified under Article XXXVI of the General By-Laws of the Town.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 19.** It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Protective Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater by deleting in Section 8.4, footnote 4 at the end of the second sentence the words "... not exceed two hundred (200) feet above the mean sea level" and by substituting in place thereof the words "... be less than two hundred (200) feet" so that the entire sentence would then read:

Wireless or broadcasting towers and other like unenclosed structures, may also be of greater height if so authorized by special permit from the Planning Board and provided said greater height, including any features attached thereto, will be less than two hundred (200) feet.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 20.** A motion was made and duly seconded to take No Action on this Article. (By-Law for Signs)

Voice Vote. Voted.

#### ARTICLE 21. It was voted that the Town amend the Zoning By-Laws as follows:

1. To Section 2.0 Definitions, add the following:

"2.96 Expanded Living Space (In-law living area) shall be limited to one bedroom of no more than 200 sq. ft. or two bedrooms of no more than 150 sq. ft. each. Total living area for expanded living space including bath, kitchen, living room, bedroom shall not exceed 600 square feet of living area. Unrestricted passage must be maintained on each floor level between units."

To Section 6.30.1. Accessory Uses, add the following:

10. Expanded living space (In-law living area) in single-family dwelling. See Sect. 2.94 for definition.

2/3 Vote required. For: 79 Against: 23 Carried.

**ARTICLE 22.** It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the Protective Zoning By-Laws of the Town of Bridgewater by inserting after Section 2.93 the following definitions:

#### Building Inspector, Section 3 as follows:

- 2.94 DRIVEWAY A travel way which accommodates vehicular circulation between a STREET and one adjoining LOT. Within residential zoning districts, such a way shall not be greater than 24 feet in width as measured at the paved surface of the adjoining STREET.
- 2.95 COMMON DRIVEWAY A travel way which accommodates vehicular circulation between a STREET and no more than two adjoining LOTS. Such a way shall not be less than 22 feet in width as measured at the paved surface of the adjoining STREET.

And further, to insert after Section 6.31.8 under the general heading of ACCESSORY USES AND OFF-STREET PARKING, the following:

(9. Common Driveways as defined under Section 2.95 and pursuant to Section 9.90)

And further, to insert after Section 9.80 under the general heading of SPECIAL PROVISIONS, the following:

9.90 COMMON DRIVEWAYS

#### 9.91 Purpose

. The purpose of this section is to ensure safe and adequate means of vehicular access to lots within the Town of Bridgewater that effectively serve the objectives of the Subdivision Control Law.

#### 9.92 Authority

The Planning Board shall serve as the Special Permit Granting Authority under this section. The Board may so authorize the construction of a common driveway as defined under Section 2.95 in any zoning district provided such means of vehicular access complies with the requirements and design criterion stated within this section.

#### 9.93 Requirements

- 9.931 In addition to other provisions within this By-Law, lots served by common driveways within residential zoning districts shall possess a minimum area of two (2) acres per dwelling unit. Such lots shall contain no less than 30,000 square feet, per dwelling unit, of contiguous non-wetland (ie upland) area as defined under Section 40 of Chapter 131 MGL.
- 9.932 A common driveway may never be used to meet the minimum required frontage distance of any lot.
- 9.933 A common driveway shall be located entirely within the lots being served.
- 9.934 The approval or endorsement of any plan under the Subdivision Control Law which show lots being served by a common driveway shall not be construed as a basis of approval under this section.

#### 9.94 Design Criterion

- 9.941 The centerline of a common driveway shall be located on the shared property line of the lots being served, unless the Special Permit Granting Authority determines that an alternative location would allow for safer traffic circulation along adjoining streets.
- 9.942 The layout and method of construction of a common driveway shall provide for safe access to the uses it is designed to serve as determined by the Special Permit Granting Authority. The Special Permit Granting Authority may also adopt specific regulations in this regard.
- 9.943 The length of a common driveway shall not exceed 1,000 feet as measured from the right of way of the adjoining street, unless the Special Permit Granting Authority determines that a greater length would not adversely affect public safety.

Unanimous.

**ARTICLE 23.** It was unanimously voted that the Town amend the zoning map of the Town of Bridgewater by adding to the Town of Bridgewater's Zoning Map the following:

Zone II Water District as delineated on zoning map, dated May 28, 1996, on file in the office of the Town Clerk and as voted under ARTICLE 32, at the June 27, 1994 Recessed Town Meeting, Section 15 – Aquifer Protection District 15.3 Definitions Zone II.

Unanimous.

A motion was made and duly seconded, it was voted to dissolve the town meeting. Meeting was dissolved at 8:23 p.m.

#### TOWN DEPARTMENTS

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Bridgewater:

The overall crime rate in all categories in 1996 and accidents dropped from 697 in 1995 to 600 in 1996.

Two Grants totaling \$300,000.00 (Copsfast last year and Cops Universal Hiring this year) have allowed us to add Christopher Shaw, a February 1996 graduate of the Plymouth Police Academy, and three of the four recruits that are attending the academy and will be graduating in March 1997 to the department. They are Anne Svizzero, Thomas Lagrasta, George Zanellato, and Robert Bailey. Three of the recruits are paid out of the grant. Officers Dean Ferioli and Stephen McGinn have been hired as part-time officers and are attending the Intermittent and reserve Academy in November.

Officer Thomas Lagrasta has replaced retired Officer Daniel Thompson who was injured in an accident while on the job in 1993. We wish his family the very best.

The department received a BYRNE Grant of \$16,325.00 for Digital Imaging Equipment. We also received a COPSMORE Grant of \$45,223.00 for a new computer system. DARE Officer Jack Hobson became certified in High School DARE. DARE is now taught in elementary, junior high and high school levels. We also received a \$13,000.00 DARE Grant this year along with a \$25,000.00 Community Policing Grant which will allow us to expand both programs. In December we also received two more grants totaling \$9,500.00 that will enable us to update other equipment.

In June Officer Carl MacDermott was selected as the Detective. Officer Michael Bois was selected to be the department's Juvenile Officer.

We instituted a new K-9 program in the fall. Officer Christopher Delmonte is the K-9 Officer and "Gorbi" is the department's newest recruit. They are both attending 14 weeks training at K-9 school.

Bridgewater went on-line with Enhanced 911 this fall. Laptop computers were installed in two of the cruisers giving the officers the same abilities and access to all in-house computers without leaving the cruiser.

Special recognition should go to Officer Daniel Brophy for all of his work on the many grants he successfully prepared for the department. Also to Sgt. Robert Irving and Officer Brophy for all the work, planning, and development of our new computer system. And also to Officer Joseph Demoura for all of his work in planning, designing and coordinating the remodeling of our Communications Center.

My continued thanks to all of the officers, the office staff and to the many Town Departments for their continued support.

#### BRIDGEWATER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Bridgewater Fire Department responded to a total of 3,360 emergency incidents: 1,810 fire related incidents, 1,550 medical incidents, and 477 general assistance/inspections/public service incidents; combined total 3,837. For informational purposes we responded to 150 incidents at the MCI Bridgewater Complex and 213 at Bridgewater State College. These facilities amounted to 11% of our total deployments for Fire and EMS.

Of the fire related runs 73 responses were third alarm responses for fires in structures both residential and commercial. Remaining responses were for inside and outside investigations, motor vehicle accidents, woods fires, medical assists, HAZMAT responses, fires within buildings not classified as structural, storm coverage and miscellaneous unclassified runs. Our highest response area continues to be our Fire District Five, the western quadrant of the Town. The need for a sub-station is again apparent in this sector. With the forthcoming MBTA service in 1997, the need for rapid response to areas in the eastern quadrant must be addressed and serious consideration be given for a sub-station in that sector. Rapid deployment is necessary. Personnel strength was addressed this year. Four individuals were appointed and commenced Recruit Training at the Massachusetts Fire Academy on 18 November. They will complete Basic Training on 3 February 1997 and be assigned to duty groups. This is the first increase in manning levels since 1977. Your support and decision to appoint new personnel will greatly impact our operational capabilities and public safety in our community.

Training continued throughout the year in HAZMAT, fire prevention, fire suppression and EMS standards. Three personnel have been trained to the Intermediate level of EMT, and one individual is currently in training. The new personnel will be brought to that level after completion of the Academy. More funding is needed for training so as to bring the Department to the standards mandated by the Federal and State Government.

My sincerest appreciation to the residents of the Town of Bridgewater, all Boards, Commissions, Committees and Departments for their continued cooperation, support and assistance.

To the personnel of this Department, a sincere "thank you" for your professionalism and dedication to this Department and our community. A "special thanks" to Mr. David A. Canepa, Municipal Administrator, for his understanding and assistance, and Ms. Anne L. Boyd, our Administrative Clerk, for her dedication and guidance.

#### DEPARTMENT OF INSPECTIONAL SERVICES

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Bridgewater:

I hereby submit my annual report for the Department of Inspectional Services for the calendar year 1996. Residential growth exceeded last year with 142 new single family dwellings. Permits for residential additions and alterations increased by more than 10% over the 1995 total. Commercial development still remains far behind. Construction continues on the town's long-awaited new elementary school situated at 500 South Street.

As the land supply diminishes, the potential impact of development on existing homes becomes a more critical issue. In the absence of a Town Planner and Town Engineer, responsibility for resolving these problems on existing town ways has shifted to the Inspectional Services Department. The majority of my time is spent resolving these matters along with a variety of zoning issues.

To help our department meet the growing needs of the town, in August we welcomed Robert Iafrate to our staff as a part-time Local Building Inspector. His knowledge and extensive construction experience have made him a valuable assistant and an asset to our department.

#### HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

I am pleased to present the 1996 Annual Report for the Highway Department.

The year 1996 began with a record breaking 100+ inches of total snowfall during the winter months. This surpassed the blizzard year of 1978. The Highway Department plowed our roadways a total of 16 times. Sanding operations for the minor storm events were practically a continuous process. The total appropriation for snow and ice control was \$57,100. Our expenditures were \$300,800. We received reimbursements from the Federal government in the amount of \$48,568 and from the State government in the amount of \$79,279.

The extreme winter conditions were costly in terms of wear and tear on our equipment, which is not being funded for replacement. Breakdowns of the older equipment were frequent and expensive. We are now spending more money on vehicle parts than on vehicles.

There were 13 new streets being accepted by the Town in 1996. Again, this growth increases the demand on our Department. The Highway Department is understaffed and under equipped, particularly in light of Bridgewater's accelerated residential growth.

Our major construction efforts for 1996 included a State funded Chapter 90 project for Flagg Street where drainage was completed. The road was pulverized with a new course of pavement installed. On Crescent Street, granite curbing and a sidewalk were installed. A drainage and road widening project began on Vernon Street between Pleasant and Prospect Streets.

We chip sealed Conant Street and a portion of Winter Street also using Chapter 90 funds. Numerous drainage repairs and improvements were made throughout the Town.

The town was again fortunate to have the services of supervised Boot Camp inmates to assist with labor intensive projects that we would have been unable to complete without them. For example, the Boot Camp inmates cleaned brush and debris from brooks and streams. This improves drainage and prevents flooding. The inmates also mowed cemeteries, raked leaves, and painted equipment for us.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and all other Boards, Departments, Committees and Commissions for their help and cooperation over the past year. I would also like to thank the Bridgewater Improvement Association for their contributions of time and funding. Finally, I would like to thank the Highway Department staff for their hard work and dedication.

#### FORESTRY DEPARTMENT

As Superintendent of the Forestry Department, I am pleased to present the 1996 Annual Report to the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Bridgewater.

Our tree planting and replacement program was again successful. We obtained a MASS Releaf grant for \$1,000.00 from the Department of Environmental Management. We planted 22 Flowering Callery Pear trees along Center and Mount Prospect Streets at the High School.

The Bridgewater Improvement Association and the Bridgewater Garden Club contributed generously to the Town for tree plantings and roadside beautification projects. This year's Improvement Association project was to give away Kousa Dogwood tree seedlings to residents of Bridgewater. The Forestry Department distributed the trees and assisted some residents with plantings. The Garden Club provided 500 concolor fir tree seedlings that were distributed to elementary school children as part of an environmental awareness program.

Other Forestry Department tree planting projects included replacement of roadside trees that were removed because of disease.

The Forestry Department continued to assist local residents with tree problems providing advice whenever it was requested.

During winter months, the Forestry Department assisted the Highway Department with snow removal and equipment maintenance. The Highway Department assisted the Forestry Department where necessary for projects such as roadside trimming.

I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen and all Town Departments who have supported and assisted us this year as well as the dedicated Forestry staff. I look forward to the challenges of the coming year.

#### WATER DEPARTMENT

The Bridgewater Water Department continues to aggressively pursue water quality issues, water demand issues and the upgrading of a very old distribution system. In October of this year, the Town had a pilot study done on the feasibility of constructing an Iron Removal Plant for the Carvers Pond Well field. Currently, the data is still being put together and a presentation will be put before the citizens of Bridgewater to see whether or not this Iron Removal Plant would be something the Town would want to bond and have constructed.

At the November 12, 1996 Special Town Meeting the Townspeople voted to allow the Town to transfer \$300,000.00 from the Water Receipts Reserve Account so as to replace 3,600 feet of old 8 inch Ductile Iron water main from Scotland Blvd. to the corner of Pleasant Street and Elm Street with 16 inch Blue Brute with 34 water service renewals and the replacement of 7 fire hydrants. In November of this year, the Town replaced 550 feet of 2 inch water main with 8 inch Blue Brute on Marianne Drive and renewed all the water services for the residents on Marianne Drive and added a fire hydrant at the end of this cul-da-sac. Also, as part of this Distribution Upgrade 450 feet of old Ductile Iron water main at the end of Vernon Street was replaced with 8 inch Blue Brute and a hydrant added the end of this line. The Water Department service crew continued their busy schedule as they repaired 13 water service leaks, 5 broken water mains, gutted and rebuilt 17 old fire hydrants, replaced 14 old fire hydrants with new ones, installed 44 new water services and replaced (11) eleven old Galvanized water services with new one (1) inch lines. The Department continued with its annual Leak Detection Program and has now had to take over the

The FY96 State Formula Grant for the amount of \$7,072 provided funding for the part-time Outreach worker. The FY96 State Incentive Grant for the amount of \$3,400 provided funding for the part-time Coordinator of Volunteers. A Grant in the amount of \$150.00 was awarded to Elder Affairs by the Bridgewater Cultural Council.

There has been an increase in Home Delivered Meals and our volunteer drivers have been trained. Volunteers continued to conduct telephone surveys to seniors. A total of 4,062 volunteer hours and 76 volunteers provided in-kind services saving the town \$32,750.00.

A very successful Senior Expo was held in May at the Senior Center. This event was coordinated by the Outreach Worker and Volunteer Coordinator. The Senior Center played host to many speakers and programs throughout the year. Many new programs were added and existing services continued The monthly Crime Prevention Program continues to inform and educate our seniors.

Sincere thanks to Volunteers Bob Henrickson and Fran Shonio for their outstanding service throughout the year. Special thanks also to the following individuals and groups: Selectman Jeff Nangle (Liaison Officer), Senior Center Board of Trustees, Bridgewater Police Dept., Bridgewater V.N.A., Bridgewater State College, Garden Club, Boy Scout Troop #35 and Scoutmaster Peter Kondrotas, Cub Scout Pack #31 and Den Mother Noreen Prime, Cable TV, The Tri-Town Messenger, The Brockton Enterprise, The Bridgewater Independent, Radio Station WBET, Secure Horizons – Kim Halpren, Poetess Helen Carlson, Organist Alice Thayer and to all of the many many volunteers who have donated their time and services continuously throughout the year. ## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT BRIDGEWATER-RAYNHAM REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

This report, my third as Superintendent of the fully regionalized Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District, is submitted for your consideration. It was compiled by verifying the minutes of the School Committee meetings from January to December 1996.

Three hundred twelve members of the senior class participated in the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional High School graduation exercises in June. It gives me pleasure to report that over 87% of the class went on to post-secondary education. Those who graduated will enter what educationalist Peter Drucker calls, "the knowledge society" that requires higher literacy, more technical competence and lifelong learning.

The October 1, 1996 enrollment was 5,559 students. This reflects an increase of 104 students over the previous year.

Wishes for continued success followed Dr. Joseph L. Gilbert to Harwich, Massachusetts; while a warm welcome was extended to Dr. Joseph F. Connors as Assistant Superintendent of Schools. Dr. Connors has continued the evaluation and review of curricula. Dr. Connors, as educational leader, is a resourceful addition to our strong teacher, counselor, and support staff who are essential to the educational mission of the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School District. Also hired in 1996 was Mr. Robert O. McIntyre as Headmaster of the High School.

Construction of the new elementary school in Bridgewater was hampered by last winter's severe weather. The Assistant Superintendent for Business, Mr. Robert F. Blakeley, has worked with the Bridgewater Building Committee on this project, and we are all eager to occupy the new school.

The professional growth of staff is crucial to the efficacy of any school system. The design of professional development offerings in the District has been developed to address the elements and requirements defined by the Massachusetts Department of Education. To this end a wide variety of learning opportunities have been available to all teachers system-wide during the last school year.

The E.J. LaLiberte and M.G. Williams Junior High Schools celebrated their first annual Career Awareness Day during 1996. Many people in both communities donated time, and many students came away from the event with some ideas about different trades and jobs to pursue in the future.

Our efforts in obtaining State and Federal grants continue to be noteworthy as a total of \$696,722 will be forthcoming for the 1996-97 school year.

I would like to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of the following members of the Bridgewater-Raynham Regional School Committee: Mr. Arthur N. Wyman, Chairman; Mrs. Patricia Roland, Vice Chairman; Mr. Joseph Rebello, Secretary-Clerk; Mr. Mark D. Sanderson; Mrs. Mary Ellen Arabasz; Mrs. Susan M. O'Brien; Mr. James Nihan; and Mrs. Linda A. Dillon. These people take their responsibilities seriously and work extremely hard for the students of Bridgewater and Raynham.

In addition, I would like to extend my appreciation to the various School Site Councils and parent groups who work tirelessly for the students in the schools.

B.R.A.G.S., the Bridgewater Raynham Alliance for Great Schools, successfully launched the first annual dinner dance and fundraiser in 1996. Proceeds were used to purchase additional computers for the schools.

The efforts of R.A.V.E., Inc., the Raynham Association of Volunteers for Education, and all other volunteers in both communities have impacted the students, academically and socially by their services.

Reflecting upon 1996 events portrays a positive parent-school-community partnership that continues to work toward a pre-K through grade 12 curriculum with coherence and promotes a climate conducive to learning.

My sincere thanks to my administrative colleagues, the members of the staff, and the students of the District for their cooperation.

The 1995-96 school year at Bristol-Plymouth concluded with the graduation of 152 members of the class of 1996. Ninety-five percent of the graduates were immediately placed in jobs or went on to higher education. The school had a total enrollment of 766 students which included 40 post-graduate students in the Licensed Practical Nursing Program.

We have continued to increase the technological level of our programs utilizing Perkins grant funds. Graphic Arts, Auto Body, Machine Shop, Metal Fabrication, Mathematics, and Science received equipment upgrades as a result. The newly developed Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning program received initial approval from the Department of Education and opened in September.

The academic-technical curriculum integration project continued with the development of a comprehensive student portfolio system and the opening of a 24 station computer lab which is utilized by students at all grade levels.

Grant monies were utilized to develop and upgrade curricula in the areas of Commercial Art, Social Studies and Math. The Student Diversity program expanded by networking with six area high schools and the scope of the clinical component of the Community Health program was broadened by the inclusion of an adult day care center.

In closing, we would like to recognize and thank the long-time employees who retired during 1996.

#### PUBLIC LIBRARY DIRECTOR

As the use of information technology increased, use of the Bridgewater Public Library escalated. During 1996 we were able to begin offering the public free access to the Internet; add computer software on compact disks to our collection; and establish World Wide Web sites for both the Public Library and Municipal Town Government. In April we were pleased to restore Wednesday and Thursday evenings to our schedule of hours open to the public. A Teen Summer Reading Program was established for young people in grades 7 and up. In 1996:

- · 202,768 items were borrowed from our collection
- 122,298 (an average of 46 people an hour) visited our library
- 14,122 questions were handled
- 19,193 people held library cards from our library
- 742 groups used our meeting rooms

- 10,830 people came to library sponsored programs and events
- · 3,562 students from local schools visited
- 10,849 books were read by 834 youngsters and teens who participated in the summer reading program
- 7,708 items were added to our collection

The number of items loaned to the public was 15% higher than the previous year. The number of reference questions answered increased by 60%. Attendance at programs jumped by 79%. Without the continued efforts of a highly skilled staff who provide expert assistance with great dedication, these statistics would not have increased so markedly. We are also grateful to the numerous individuals who gave generously of their time to volunteer at the Public Library during the past year.

#### THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS SERVICES

This department continues to administer, through the Commissioner of Veterans Services, two distinct veterans programs: a Benefits Program for eligible veterans and/or their dependent and a Service Program for all veterans and/or their dependents.

The Benefits Program provides monetary aid for necessary living expenses and comprehensive medical care for veterans and/or their dependents who qualify. All cases of financial assistance under the Benefits Program must comply with Chapter 115 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, as amended.

The Service Program provides advice and assistance to all veterans and their dependents in obtaining benefits due them under Federal and State assistance programs. Federal Veterans Affairs Benefits considered in the Service Program include: compensation, pensions, rehabilitation, education, loans, medical and hospital care.

Three factors determine eligibility for veterans' benefits: service dates with a proper discharge; residency and need. Certain factors disqualify aid.

The veteran upon whom the application is based must have served in the Armed Forces at a time and for a duration established by Chapter 115. The veteran's discharge must have been Honorable, or, in some instances, "other than dishonorable."

Eligible veterans must have either entered the service from Massachusetts or have been a resident of the Commonwealth for three consecutive years prior to the application. Total income of the applicant must not exceed certain specified limits.

The cost of all appropriations for Massachusetts Veterans is shared by the state, 75% and Bridgewater, 25%.

Family members of a war veteran who is buried overseas are eligible to receive a commemorative photograph of the gravesite and historic information about the military cemetery where the veteran is buried. The process requires approximately four weeks and is free. An ABM application form 49 will be available when requested.

#### BRIDGEWATER HOUSING AUTHORITY

On August 9, 1996 Governor Weld signed into law the Final Regulation, 760 CMR 5.00, Eligibility and Selection Criteria for state-aided public housing and the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program (MRVP). The Eligibility and Selection Criteria regulation raises income limits and uses the federal method of imputing income from assets in determining eligibility and continued occupancy; another change unlikely just a few years ago. The result will be an economic mix in state-aided developments. This regulation does not govern the order of tenant selection for units in public housing known as 689 or Congregate. The Housing Authority has eight 689 units and 10 congregate units located in our new project at 10 Heritage Circle.

The deregulation of local housing authorities has been a major issue in 1996. This continued on several levels during the summer months. The Department of Housing and Community Development, formerly known as the Executive Office of Communities and Development, received notification they would be required under Executive Order 384 to undertake a thorough review of all regulations and take action to revise or repeal regulations as needed.

On December 6, 1996 a public hearing took place on the proposal repeal, adoption and amendments of seven state regulations and the modification of one regulation impacting state-aided public housing programs. To replace seven, the Department proposes two new regulations: 760 CMR 4.00 on the General Administration of Local Housing Authorities and 760 CMR 6.00 Occupancy Standards for State-Aided Housing. The regulation to be amended, 760 CMR 49.00, governs the Mass. Rental Voucher Program. The merger, modification and repeal of these regulations is part of the Department's effort to comply with Executive Order 384, which sunsets all outdated, inappropriate or duplicative items as of December 31, 1996.

The demand for housing has not diminished either for elderly or family housing. However, what will happen to low income housing in 1997 is another question. It is still too early to tell. But, profound change is certain. Not since 1974 have housing professionals been challenged with such prospects for wide-sweeping changes and reorganization in the programs being administered.




#### PARKING CONTROL OFFICE

#### FINANCIAL REPORTS

#### ASSESSORS' REPORT

For fiscal year 1997, the Town of Bridgewater has a total taxable valuation of \$973,364,600. composed of:

Residential	\$856,917,000.
Commercial	58,882,800.
Industrial	30,844,700.
Personal Property	26,720,100.
Total Taxable Value	\$973,364,600.

The total number of taxable parcels is 7,601 and 452 parcels of exempt properties. Exempt properties bear a value of \$184,108,200. The total valuation of all property both real and personal is \$1,157,472,800.

As required by law, Bridgewater completed mandatory revaluation and recertification for fiscal 1997. In many ways this was a difficult revaluation. The ever sharp increasing sales market necessitated the Assessors to increase property value and reflect market prices in order to gain certification by the Department of Revenue. Many of the previous stages in revaluation once done by the Department of Revenue are now the responsibility of Assessors Departments throughout the state. Because of the critical lack of working space and conditions in the Assessors office, this hampered many stages of the revaluation program.

The Assessors' Department is grateful for all of the generous and valuable assistance extended by Lorraine Reilly of the Department of Revenue Division of Local Services during the revaluation process.

The commitment of real and personal property taxes, along with apportioned sewer betterments and water and sewer liens were given to the tax collector on October 25, 1996 with a certified tax rate of \$14.84/1000. Tax rate for fiscal 1997 included the new school and library addition as well as teachers deferral.

Over the past year 70 parcels of property have been taken by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts — 39 parcels by Bridgewater State College and 31 by the Department of Corrections. This represents an estimated annual loss in tax dollar revenue to the town of \$69,307.00; and loss in taxable value of \$4,670,300.

In 1996 20,348 motor vehicle excise tax bills were generated with total valuation of \$68,158,932 producing \$1,422,180.43 in taxes. There were also 207 boat excise bills issued for a total of \$4,862.00.

The Board of Assessors wish to express their appreciation to the Assistant Assessors, Marie V. Amelotte and Vincent M. Damon as well as the Clerk Typist, Marie E. Strang.

I have also developed a written investment policy to clarify the position of the Treasurer's office.

This year I completed the new Elementary School bond issue and got the Golf Course bonding on track. To save issuance costs, I combined issues so the projects could share the cost of required legal opinion and printing of official statements, etc. This allowed more money to be spent on the project materials.

I would like to thank all other Town departments whose combined efforts have made our office run more efficiently and effectively.

The applicants have exercised their legal rights of appeal by filing a series of legal actions in the Courts. It is the Board's belief, that when all appeals are heard, the decision will be upheld.

Residential development continued unabated, with the Board having to consider many applications for Subdivisions and Approval Not Required Plans.

Commercial development, once again, proceeded at a slower pace.

As has been the case for more than the last twenty years, this Board has been more than aptly served by its Secretary, Mrs. Leslie Dorr. Mrs. Dorr's dedication and performance are well known to anyone who comes in contact with the Board, and once again we want to publicly acknowledge and thank her.

#### **ZONING APPEALS BOARD**

The Board is honored to dedicate its 1996 Annual Report to Frederick H. Balboni (1914-1996), Founder and Chairman of the Zoning Appeals Board, who gave 40 years of distinguished service to the Town of Bridgewater.

The Zoning Appeals Board respectfully submits this report of its activities for the calendar year of 1996.

During the calendar year of 1996 a total of thirty-seven (37) Appeals, requests for Variances and Special Permits were filed. To process the thirty-seven (37) Appeals, the Zoning Appeals Board held a total of thirty-one (31) Public Hearings and after each they filed a written opinion setting forth its decision and the reasons therefore.

The Zoning Appeals Board made the following decisions: Fourteen (14) requests for Variances were granted; nine (9) requests for Variances were denied; one (1) request for a Variance was withdrawn; six (6) requests for Special Permits were granted; four (4) requests for Special Permits were denied; one (1) request for a Special Permit was withdrawn. There were also two (2) Appeals made of decisions of the Building Inspector, both of which were upheld by the Board.

The Zoning Appeals Board operates under very strict guidelines specifically set forth in the Zoning Enabling Act, General Laws Chapter 40A. The Zoning Appeals Board can only exercise those powers which are granted by General Laws Chapter 40A. There seems to be a misunderstanding that the Zoning Board of Appeals may grant a Variance on any matter if the subject matter appears to be desirable. Contrary to the questions of desirability, on the question of granting or denying a request, the legislature under the provisions of General Laws Chapter 40A, Section 10, has set forth very stringent and mandatory statutory prerequisites. Unless all of the statutory prerequisites have been satisfied, the Zoning Appeals Board cannot grant a Variance. The Zoning Appeals Board has no discretion to grant a Variance unless all of the statutory prerequisites have been met.

The Board wishes to recognize and thank our secretary, Stephanie Ryan, for her professional and dedicated service, without which this Board would be unable to function.

#### WAGE AND PERSONNEL BOARD

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Citizens of Bridgewater:

In 1996 the Wage and Personnel Board continued its mission of balancing the needs of town employees with the board's fiscal responsibility to the taxpayers and citizens of Bridgewater.

To fulfill its mission, the Board recommended adjustments in salaries for positions that fall under the Wage and Personnel By-Law. These recommendations were made after much research, meetings with all concerned parties, and a public hearing. The Board's recommendations were approved at the Annual Town Meeting and went into effect July 1, 1996.

The Wage Board had two major goals in 1996. The first goal was to research the personnel classification and compensation plans in communities similar to Bridgewater. This research was used to develop a workable framework of comparison that would assist the Board in adjusting wages and classification of employees that fell under the Wage Plan.

The second major goal was the updating of all job descriptions of positions under the jurisdiction of the Board. To achieve this goal, the Board met on a one-on-one basis with all employees to review their job descriptions. In some instances, the descriptions dated back to the 1970's. At the meetings, the Board requested the employees to provide up-to-date descriptions of their duties and responsibilities. This information allowed the Board to file a job description that accurately portrayed the position in question. The new descriptions, combined with the other research by Board Members, allowed for adequate levels of compensation to be established.

In 1997, the Wage and Personnel Board will continue its pursuit of its mission through research, meetings with employees, and cooperation with the other elected and appointed Boards and Commissions of the Town of Bridgewater.

#### BRIDGEWATER SENIOR CENTER TRUSTEES

The foyer will soon house the gift shop, which contains items provided by the Senior Center Crafters and the addition of mini blinds in that area will help to protect the handmade items from continuous direct sunlight, as well as keeping the area cooler in the warmer months.

Our thanks to all town departments that have cooperated with us in our efforts to carry out our responsibilities as Trustees of the Senior Center. Our thanks, also, to all the volunteers who have worked with us.

Again this year the Academy Lions have made a donation to the Bridgewater Senior Center Trust Fund. In addition, a group of volunteers have made monthly donations to the Trust Fund from the proceeds of family suppers held at the Senior Center. The Senior Center Supper Committee has donated \$2,700 through February, 1997, to the Trust Fund and are continuing to make monthly donations from the proceeds of the suppers and other donations received by the committee. The Senior Center Trust Fund was designated, in lieu of flowers, to receive donations from friends and family of the late Fred Yeaton. #### TOWN RIVER FISHERIES COMMITTEE

The mission of the Town River Fisheries Committee, a standing committee of the Taunton River Watershed Alliance, is to unify the restoration and management of the herring fishery along the whole 14 mile Town River, a major tributary to the Taunton River.

The TRFC is unique: it is an Ad-Hoc committee recognized by the Selectmen of Bridgewater and West Bridgewater as the Developer of Management Policy for the Town River herring fishery. The TRFC works under the direction of the Taunton River Watershed Alliance with guidance from the State Department of Marine Fisheries, Dam Safety, and other organizations knowledgeable on fisheries and rivers. There is no precedent for the TRFC to follow as it works out the challenges involved in restoring and maintaining the two dams and fish ladders on this river, restores the herring population, and develops a management policy to regulate their harvest.

The year 1996 was a good one for the Town River Fisheries Committee, as we continued to make progress in the restoration of the herring fishery.

During the year we petitioned the Massachusetts Division of Marine Fisheries for Home Rule of the Bridgewater section of the Town River. We were granted the Home Rule and a set of regulations was put into place so that both Bridgewater and West Bridgewater are now unified in regulating the management of the herring fisheries.

Since the formation of the TRFC, we have received a great deal of support from Ken Reback and the Dept. of Marine Fisheries. This year Ken and his crew lowered the top 3 sections of the Stanley Fish ladder on High St., Bridgewater, so that there will always be ample water in the ladder to insure the passage of herring.

Our long term goal of having a park and public fishery on the 4 acre island at the Old Stanley Iron Works became more of a reality as the Town of Bridgewater accepted ownership of this property. The development of this property remains as one of our future goals, as does the reclamation of the Arch St. dam in West Bridgewater and the High St. dam in Bridgewater. Our high priority project for the next year would be getting a working fish ladder in place on Plymouth St. at the old Jenkins Mill site on the Taunton River at Route 104 in Bridgewater. This site is a key component to upstream herring migration.

Our committee remains the same as we head into another year with Ray Wilcox as chair, Bob Fosdick as clerk and members Andy Bagas, Ron Ladue, Bill Tunewicz, Bruce Holmquist, Chris Iannitelli, Jac MacDonald and Bob Kominsky. Don Jenness is the Herring Warden in West Bridgewater and Gardner Pratt is the Warden in Bridgewater.

Every committee has its driving force behind it, and ours has been the Executive Director of TRWA, Kitty Doherty. We truly would not be where we are today without Kitty. To all our advisors, friends and liaisons we say thanks for all your support. Special thanks to the Board of Selectmen from Bridgewater and West Bridgewater and Ken Reback and his crew from Marine Fisheries. We also thank Taunton River Watershed Alliance for forming our committee.

Our meetings will continue to be open meetings and we encourage all interested parties to attend.

#### BRIDGEWATER FOOD PANTRY

The Bridgewater Food Pantry exists to provide an immediate emergency food supply to residents of the community where needed. The pantry receives a continuing supply of non-perishable food items from many sources; the annual food drive conducted by the U.S. Postal Service, Council of Churches, individual churches, food drives conducted by local business, food drives conducted by civic organizations and Boy and Girl Scouts organizations and finally individual citizens who wish to become involved.

A freezer was recently added, a donation from a major fast food corporation with a business found within our community. The freezer will allow perishable food to be stocked for distribution. The pantry receives a sizable cash donation annually from a major business located in our Town plus smaller donations from various other sources. These funds are used to purchase food vouchers which enable clients to obtain a needed variety of perishable food items to supplement their diets.

A total of 51 households were serviced during 1996, 112 adults, seven senior citizens over 60 years of age and 46 children under 18 years of age. Some of the same household units have been serviced multiple times during the year.

The Food Pantry is located in the Academy Building. Request for assistance should be made at the Department of Veterans Services on Tuesday thru Thursday during the hours of 9:00 AM-11:00 AM and 2:00 PM-3:00 PM.

The Food Pantry does not discriminate in matters of Race, Religion, Sex, Age and matters of health or handicap restrictions.

# REGIONAL RESOURCES

#### PLYMOUTH COUNTY COOPERATIVE EXTENSION

County Extension programs are carried on through Plymouth County in cooperation with UMASS Extension (Amherst) and the United States Department of Agriculture. The Cooperative Extension System is supported by County, Federal and State funds, and operates under Federal and State laws and agreements. Educational programs focus on four major program areas: Agroecology; Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation; 4-H Youth, Volunteer and Family Development, and federally funded Nutrition Education initiatives. Volunteer advisory groups work with staff on developing specific programs. Local citizens, appointed by the County Commissioners, serve as County Extension trustees, directing the overall program. Extension staff serve as a direct link with the University of Massachusetts. New research findings are translated into practical applications and shared with people and communities through workshops, conferences, field demonstrations, technical assistance, newspaper articles, radio and television. Publications, such as regular newsletters and booklets, fact sheets, and home study courses, bring information directly to those who need it. In April 1996, Marjorie Mahoney, 4-H Agent, retired after 34 years of service to Plymouth County working with area youth and volunteers.

In Plymouth County, the Extension outreach office is located on High St., Hanson. This past year an office was reestablished in the City of Brockton for the Family Nutrition Program, a special funded Extension grant. In Southeastern Massachusetts regional programs are conducted in cooperation with the Barnstable County Extension Program. Satellite offices of UMASS Cooperative Extension are located in Bristol and Norfolk Counties. UMASS Extension also operates the Cranberry Experiment Research Station, located in Wareham. Currently the county field staff consists of a County Director, two 4-H Youth Development Specialists, a Nutrition/Family Development Specialist, and a Landscape/Nursery Specialist. A federally funded Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program, which has been active in Plymouth County since 1969, is run under the auspices of Cooperative Extension. Currently one supervisor and two outreach educators work in this program; last year Nutrition Educators worked with 18 county groups enrolling 257 limited income participants in the UMASS 12-lesson Certificate Course. A three-year Water Quality Grant continues with work in the Taunton River Watershed Connections Project. A new Family Self-Sufficiency Project began this year in cooperation with 17 county-based housing authorities; Bridgewater State College and UMass Amherst. As your representatives to the Old Colony Planning Council (OCPC), we are pleased to present this report on behalf of the Council for 1996.

The Old Colony Planning Council is one of thirteen regional planning agencies in Massachusetts, authorized by state statute to prepare plans for the physical, social and economic development of their respective regions. OCPC is the only regional planning agency in Massachusetts to be designated as an Area Agency on Aging. In this responsibility, the OCPC manages federal Older Americans Act funding for elder services in the fifteen communities in the Council's regular planning district plus eight additional municipalities that constitute the elderly services planning and service area. The OCPC is also designated as an Economic Development District by the U.S. Secretary of Commerce for coordinating economic development activities within the OCPC District. Lastly, the OCPC is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for Transportation and Transit Planning for the region. We are proud to report that the Old Colony Planning Council has the distinction of being the only regional council in New England to hold all of these official designations at the same time.

In addition to the designated responsibilities, the Council is concerned with a wide variety of areawide and inter-municipal concerns as they pertain to the development of the Planning District. The Council also assists its member municipalities with technical planning assistance, grant application preparation assistance and with information on local and regional trends by maintaining current socio-economic information. Each member community of the Council is represented by one delegate and one alternate member. The Council members establish policy, develop the work program, and employ and oversee the activities of the professional staff. The Council meets on the last Wednesday of each month at 7:30 PM in the OCPC offices located at 70 School Street, Brockton, MA.

In 1996, the Council re-elected John G. Mather of Halifax as President of OCPC; Eldon F. Moreira of West Bridgewater as Council Secretary; and, Joseph P. Landolfi of Stoughton as Council Treasurer. Daniel M. Crane serves as Executive Director of the Council.

The Council gratefully acknowledges the generous support and cooperation of its member communities, the participation and involvement of the members of the Joint Transportation Committee chaired by Stephen Baker; the Overall Economic Development Committee chaired by Joseph P. Joseph; and, the Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee chaired by Doris Grindle. The Council also recognizes the work of local boards and commissions and the government agencies, public and private institutions and individuals who assisted its efforts.

# OLD COLONY PLANNING COUNCIL AREA AGENCY ON AGING

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Residents of the Town of Bridgewater:

The Delegate and Alternate to the Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging (OCPC-AAA) Advisory Committee are pleased to present this report of the Area Agency on Aging activities for FY 1996.

#### NARRATIVE STATEMENT:

The OCPC-AAA is responsible for the planning, coordination and funding of elderly services under Title III of the Older Americans Act in the 23 community region served by the program. The OCPC-AAA, in conjunction with input from the 23 community Advisory Committee, has focused its efforts on developing a comprehensive network of services and programs which are responsive to the full spectrum of elder service needs. In collaboration with local councils on aging and other elder service provider agencies, the OCPC-AAA provided grant funding for the following programs and services in Fiscal Year 1996:

- Senior Center and Outreach Programs Home Health and Respite Services In-Home Mental Health Services Services for Elders with Disabilities Transportation Services Legal Services Emergency Intervention Services Congregate and Home-Delivered Meals Nutritional Education and Counseling Services to Families and Caregivers Long-Term Care Ombudsman Services
- More than 354,000 units of service were provided to 10,395 unduplicated elders throughout the region.

In addition to providing funding for the services listed above, the OCPC-AAA also used funding under Title III-F (Disease Prevention and Health Promotion) for the provision of Nutritional Education and one-to-one Nutritional Counseling. The OCPC-AAA also used funding from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health for the provision of Prostate Cancer Awareness and Education presentations at various locations. A total of nine (9) educational presentations were conducted, serving 353 elders from throughout the region.

The AAA Advisory Committee Delegates and Alternates play a key role in the development and support of elder services and programs in the region. The Advisory Committee, consisting of representatives from each of the 23 communities, assists the AAA in assessing elder needs, recommending funding priorities, and recommending sub-grantees to provide Title III services. The support and cooperation of the local communities and Advisory Committee members is acknowledged with gratitude by the Old Colony Planning Council Area Agency on Aging.

#### WOMANSPLACE CRISIS CENTER

Womansplace Crisis Center provides emergency and long range counseling services, intervention services and support groups for survivors of rape and sexual assault and their families, and victims of domestic violence. Professional and volunteer staff provide crisis counseling, medical and legal liaison, advocacy and support services to hundreds of rape victims and their families annually. A 24-hour hotline is available for continual access to the program's staff.

Rape Crisis services reach a client population which is 95% females and 45% under the age of 22. Of those who seek assistance for sexual assault, nearly 70% are victimized by individuals they know. During the year, over fifty community education programs reach more than 1,500 residents. In addition, training programs are offered to area social workers and other mental health professionals to assist in the improved referral and treatment of rape and sexual assault victims.

The domestic violence component, which serves battered women and their children throughout the Greater Brockton area, provides 24-hour hotline services, crisis counseling, bilingual individual and group counseling, temporary shelter, legal and housing advocacy for women and their children. Over five hundred individuals receive assistance from the program's staff and volunteers annually. This includes shelter services for women and children. Over 5,000 calls annually are handled through the emergency hotline. Multi-cultural staff are available to meet the needs of all clients. The program offers a comprehensive childcare component, which includes structured group activities, out-of-school tutoring, recreation and counseling services. Services are coordinated with area police departments. Training and education are offered to local hospitals, public safety staff, schools and community organizations in Brockton and the ten surrounding towns.

We made specific outreach to organizations in your town in FY 96 as part of a public awareness project and served 438 Bridgewater State College students and other residents in educational sessions.

Womansplace Crisis Center provided services to 12 rape survivors, their families and friends and answered 84 hot-line calls from Bridgewater residents.

#### SELF HELP INCORPORATED

Report to the Town of Bridgewater:

During the program year ending September 30, 1996, Self Help, Inc., received a total funding of approximately \$8.6M and provided direct services to 17,202 limited income households in the area.

In the town of Bridgewater SHI provided services totaling \$137,788 to 229 households during program year 1996.

The total funding of \$8,615,509 does not tell the real value of human services delivered to the area as a whole. Self Help's funding enabled us to mobilize an additional \$1,258,647 of other community resources such as, contributions from the towns, volunteers, donations of space, and private donations in the form of goods and services. Therefore, the gross value of Self Help, Inc., during the past program year was \$10,143,470.

Self Help currently employs 248 individuals, many of whom are of limited income, minorities, and who reside in our service area.

We feel that October 1, 1995 through September 30, 1996 was a successful program year for us because we were able to assist as many limited income individuals and/or families as we did, in spite of the challenges and uncertainties with which we were faced, and decreases in funding we experienced.

We thank all the volunteers, Board of Selectmen, and their representative(s) to our Board of Directors, representatives of the limited income sector, and representatives of the private sector for helping to make Fiscal Year 1996 a success.

#### ABOUT SERSG

The mission of SERSG is: "To serve as a catalyst and implementer for member communities to act jointly to solve governmental problems or to deliver services to their citizens more effectively or efficiently."

#### **SERSG IN 1996**

1996 was SERSG's fourth year of operation and was one of solid accomplishment and growth. SERSG continued to prepare and supervise joint procurements of various goods and services for its member communities. Its largest procurement was for DPW supplies and services totaling more than \$6.9 million. The SERSG communities saved approximately \$600,000 on this procurement alone over what other communities are paying for comparable goods and services that they purchase individually. Similarly, SERSG communities enjoyed a 62% savings off catalog prices when buying office supplies' under the SERSG procurement.

SERSG also assisted municipalities in preparing to efficiently implement drug and alcohol testing programs for municipal commercial motor vehicle operators mandated by the recent Federal Omnibus Transportation Employee Testing Act. SERSG also continued its annual program of in-service training for municipal employees and continued to keep its members abreast of change — particularly change having regional implications. Among issues being monitored actively by SERSG this year are de-regulation in both the telecommunications and electric utility industries. Cities and towns are significant users of electrical power and de-regulation may provide attractive opportunities for the exercise of group purchasing power.

#### LOOKING FORWARD

I believe SERSG's future is bright with promise. There are many opportunities and advantages in banding together with neighboring communities to solve certain common problems and to provide certain goods and services to your citizens.

SERSG in 1997 will continue its basic procurement and training mission. It will also continue to follow actively on behalf of its members de-regulation, particularly electric utility de-regulation. At the suggestion of its members it is currently evaluating initiatives involving emergency water service, regional collection of household hazardous products and recycling. It may seek a Special Act of the Legislature to confer on it public corporate status — largely to facilitate the grant application process.

In closing, I want to thank, on behalf of the SERSG Board, all of the citizens, employees and local officials who have been so helpful to me and SERSG in the past year. SERSG's promise for 1997 remains "to serve as a catalyst and implementer for member communities desiring to act jointly to solve problems or to deliver services more effectively or efficiently."
